Prosecutors pursuing massive telephone billing scam at SIU-E

EDWARDSVILLE — For two years that ended last April, students from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville used a four-digit code that told the university's computer to bill the university for the call.

Madison County State's Attorney Bill Haine says he intends to press forward with prosecution of a massive telephone scam.

But legal and telecommunications experts say it may be next to impossible for prosecutors to prove which students took part in the fraud.

The university ended up with \$1.1 million in phone bills and offered amnesty to students who would come forward and repay the school. Nearly \$400,000 has been promised to the university.

"The prosecution of these cases is quite difficult," said Frances Feld, a spokesman for the Communications Fraud Control Association in Washington D.C. "They are lengthy and very costly to prosecute because it is hard to prove who made the call."

Haine replied that most cases he prosecutes present problems and that any problems with these cases will not stop him.

"These are serious wrongs," Haine said. "To take advantage of the college and the people of Illinois offends me as a citizen. It's not just theft, it is theft with insult — it is arrogance and greed combined."

Explosion rocks another steel mill

GARY, Ind. — Less than a week after a deadly blast rocked a nearby steel mill, an accident at the U.S. Steel Plant here injured three workers, one of them critically, authorities say.

The accident occurred when molten metal in the company's No. 13 blast furnace — the steel maker's largest unit — broke through the furnace walls about 7 p.m., said Ernie Glenn, spokesman for USX. Two workers were burned, and Glenn said it's still unclear whether they were splashed by the metal or simply burned by its extreme heat.

"There's no indication of any explosion, but the resultant fire did damage the area," Glenn said. "We are investigating both the extent of damage and the cause."

Maria Dennie, 39, of Gary suffered second-degree burns on her face and hands. Dennie, who also suffered smoke inhalation, remained in critical condition Wednesday morning at Loyola University Medical Center in Maywood, Ill.

She was airlifted from Gary's Methodist

Hospital Northlake Campus to Loyola's burn unit with John Uher, 56, from Valparaiso. He suffered second-degree burns on his hands as well as smoke inhalation, but was upgraded from serious to fair condition Wednesday morning.

A third worker, 44-year-old Melvin Taylor of Gary complained of neck pains and was admitted to the Gary hospital, where he remained in stable condition Wednesday morning.

Three to four other workers were treated by U.S. Steel medics, Glenn said. Local managers were not available for comment, and Glenn said the investigation was continuing.

"I was about three-quarters of a mile away when I heard it. It was just a big boom, you know?" said Edward Valade, a trucker who was unloading materials when the accident occurred.

The accident is the second at a northern Indiana steel mill in less than a week. An explosion last Wednesday at Beta Steel Corp. in Portage killed three employees and

injured nine others. The explosion, which was caused by a defect in a pressurized tank, shut down Beta indefinitely.

Investigators have said it could take up to two months to find out why the Beta Steel tank exploded.

Tuesday's accident at U.S. Steel crippled Gary Works' largest furnace, but the company will continue to make steel there with three remaining furnaces, Glenn said. It is not known how long No. 13 will be shut down.

No. 13 is the largest of four furnaces at the Gary Works, and among the three largest in the country. It provides hot metal to two oxygen-steel making shops. To support the ironmaking process, Gary Works has four coke batteries. Liquid steel from the furnaces is directed to the plant's four slab-casting lines.

On April 5, 1995, an explosion knocked Gary Work's smallest blast furnace, No. 8, out for several months. No U.S. Steel employees were injured in that blast.

Only one minor injury reported in huge Joliet blast

JOLIET — Authorities today were trying to determine what caused a huge explosion at a construction site along the Des Plaines River that blew out windows five miles away and could be heard for 24 miles.

Only one minor injury was re-

ported.

Fire ripped through a barge about 6 p.m. Tuesday, sending smoke, flames and debris into the sky.

"That fireball kept growing, 200, 400 feet high, 100 feet wide," said Chris Casarez, who was working in the Sheffield

Steel Corp. mill about 100 yards away from the explosion.

"It just kept coming. Debris was falling everywhere like a hailstorm. Soot from the walls and roofs kept coming down. There was glass all over the place."

Will County Sheriff Brendan

Ward said that 18 boxes of dynamite were on the barge, which was used for drilling and construction, but that officers did not know what caused the explosion.

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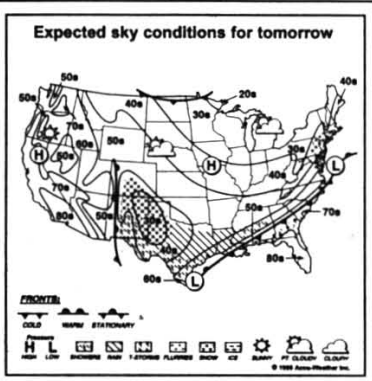

Police say teens made murder plans

PALOS HILLS — Three teenagers detailed on paper their plans to bludgeon three people to death and planned practice sessions before carrying out the crime, police said.

"I think this has shocked everybody that has investigated this case — myself and everybody else," Police Chief Paul Madigan said Wednesday as he detailed the charges.

Madigan said a 16-year-old boy and a 14-year-old girl are accused of plotting to kill the girl's mother, the mother's live-in boyfriend and the girl's 11-year-old sister. The alleged plot was uncovered before it could be carried out.

The plot was revealed when another 16-year-old boy told police about it while he was being questioned about an auto theft last week, Madigan said. The stolen car was to be used as a getaway car, he said.

Madigan said the teens wrote down details of their plan. He said a ledger and 30 to 40 pages of notes were turned over to police by one of the teen-ager's parents.

"The Plan," as the teen-agers called it, contained a cover-up story in case they were caught and detailed practice sessions to simulate killing by beating a couch with baseball bats, Madigan said.

All three teens were charged as juveniles with three counts of conspiracy to commit murder and one count of auto theft.

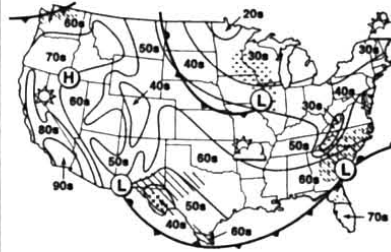

Judge orders Illinois murderer to hang

ST. JOHN'S, Antigua — John Earl Baughman wanted jurors to believe he married clumsy women.

He said his first wife, who was strangled and set afire, accidentally started the fire by tipping over a stove. He was acquitted of her death in 1985.

But 11 years later and 2,400 miles away, another jury rejected his claim that his second wife had stumbled while trying to pick up a love note he had tossed to her on the roof of an eight-story hotel.

Jurors believed prosecutors, who said Baughman, 54, of Orlando Park, Ill., pushed 55-year-old Velerie Joyce Baughman to her death. The nine-member jury deliberated just 2½ hours before convicting Baughman of murder on Thursday.

A judge sentenced Baughman to hanging, the mandatory sentence for murder in this former

British colony. No execution date was set, and Baughman's lawyer said he would appeal.

Baughman stood with his hands clasped tightly in front of him and stared at the judge as the jury foreman pronounced the verdict. Baughman did not speak before he was taken to Antigua's only jail.

Two civil engineers disputed Baughman's contention that his wife stumbled and fell. They testified that, given the position of the body when it hit the ground, a horizontal force — such as a push — must have caused Mrs. Baughman to fall.

The 99-foot fall broke every bone in her body, a forensic pathologist testified during the trial.

Her relatives were in the packed courtroom Thursday, holding hands and weeping silently.

"It was a victorious day for us, and justice has been

served," Mrs. Baughman's son, Ron Delaurier, also from the Chicago area, told reporters.

Another of Mrs. Baughman's sons, Victor Delaurier, of Palos Heights, Ill., testified his mother and her husband argued frequently in the 18 months before her death.

"I think now we're free to deal with the loss of our mother," he said after the verdict and sentence were announced. "We were scared he'd come back. And we've been angry for so long."

A former policeman in Homewood, Ill., Baughman was acquitted 11 years ago on charges of murdering his first wife. Gertrude Baughman, 36, was found severely burned in the couple's garage in Matteson, Ill., on April 21, 1984.

In 1970, Baughman was charged with shooting police Sgt. Dean Pence, 32, whose bullet-riddled body was found in a ditch in Will County.

**Cabrini
test project
scores success**

CHICAGO — At first glance, the building at 1230 N. Burling doesn't look that much different from its neighbors in the huge and crime-plagued Cabrini-Green housing project, but a closer inspection reveals clean walls and corridors.

The elevators work, the toilets flush and the morning water in the showers is hot.

"People here show they really care about where they live," said resident Taris Rule. "This is our house, and we all work to keep it clean."

It wasn't always that way.

Ten years ago, 1230 Burling was much like the other Cabrini-Green high rises — with graffiti and garbage in the hallways, the stench of urine in the elevators and gun-packing gangbangers in the parking lot.

It was the violent crime problem that sparked the change in the building.

One of the residents, Cora Moore, contacted a St. Louis activist named Bertha Gilkey, who began teaching the people of 1230 Burling how to take charge of their own building and their own lives.

On one day in 1986, 10 residents of the building — nine women and one man — finally decided they'd had enough and they pushed the gangbangers out physically.

"Some of us were big women," recalled one of the activists, Arlene Williams. "We really shoved them right out the door and every day after that we sat downstairs to make sure they stayed out."

It was the first tenant-run patrol in the history of the Chicago Housing Authority.

The desperation tactic worked, and led to further activism by the building's residents. Some of them even enrolled in training courses for building management.

Today, Williams is president of the Resident Management Corporation, which is in charge of the 15-story building's \$6 million annual budget. Since 1992, the RMC, rather than the Chicago Housing Authority, manages 1230 Burling.

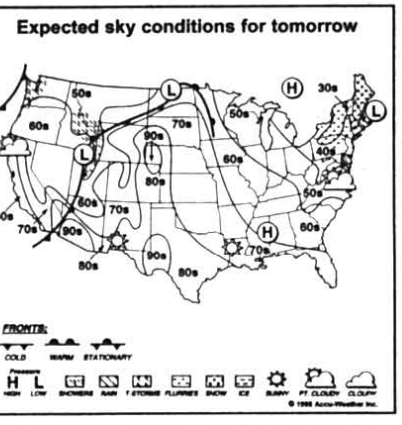

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were mostly higher at midday as the market continued to steady from Monday's sell-off on worries about rising interest rates.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 13.01 at 5,581.36. The famed barometer of big U.S. companies lost more than 88 points on Monday, having slid as much as 140 earlier in that session.

Most broader indicators were positive today.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by more than 3 to 2 on the New York Stock

Exchange, where volume came to 193.14 million shares, about even with the previous session's pace.

The technology-heavy Nasdaq composite index was up 3.19 at 1,108.85 as issues in that hard-hit sector rose again, having cushioned the market's fall on Monday amid new buy recommendations from analysts.

The NYSE composite index was up 0.16 at 345.18 and the American Stock Exchange's market value index was up 3.14 at 573.62. But the Standard & Poor's 500 list down 0.49 at 643.75.

"There was obviously some money raised (in Monday's sell-off), and it's being put back to work today," said Bob Dickey, technical analyst for Dain Bosworth Inc. in Minneapolis, noting that most money managers can't sit with a large cash position and must find new investments.

On Monday, stocks dropped sharply at the open in reaction to Friday's government report showing that 140,000 jobs were created in March — more than double what many analysts expected.

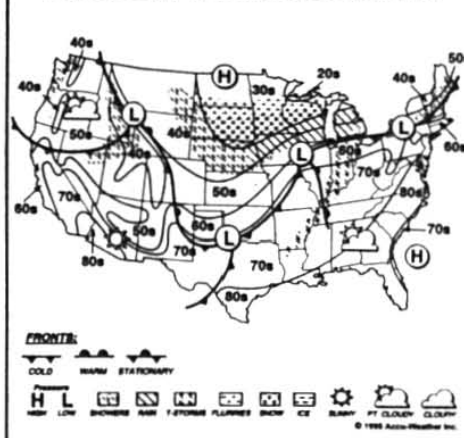

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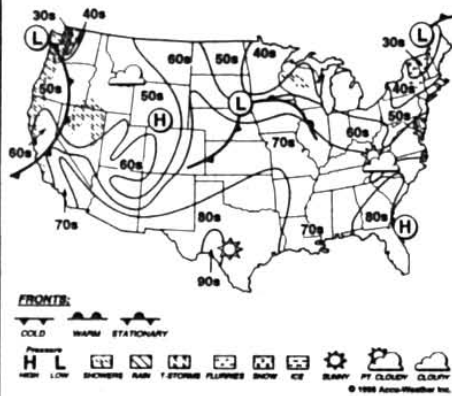

Examiner: Police officers shot deaf man six times

CHICAGO — Eric Smith, the 22-year-old deaf man who died while fighting with Forest View police officers along an interstate last week, was shot six times, according to the Cook County Medical Examiner's Office.

Smith was shot three times in the front, twice in the back and once in the wrist.

A state police report on the shooting should be completed within several days, said state police Maj. Robert Johnson. He said findings may be revealed next week after his office submits a formal report to the Cook County state's attorney's office.

Smith, of Joliet, died last Tuesday during a rush hour fight with officers Peter Bernal, 31, and Robert Lawruk, 53.

His grandmother had flagged

down police. She had been arguing with Smith as they drove along Interstate 57 southwest of Chicago.

An eyewitness supported police claims that the officers were fighting for their lives when they shot and killed Smith, who was 6-foot-2-inches tall and

weighed 250 pounds.

His relatives acknowledge that Smith fought with police, but they said police needlessly shot the former wrestling star to death while ignoring their pleas that he was deaf and could not understand their orders.

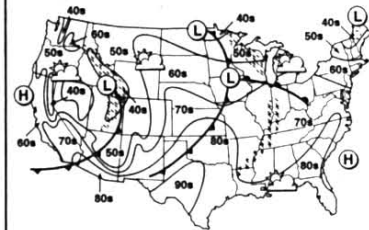

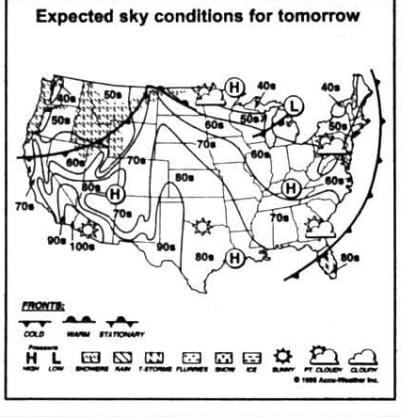

He was being held on \$75,000 bond in the Kane County Jail.

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


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

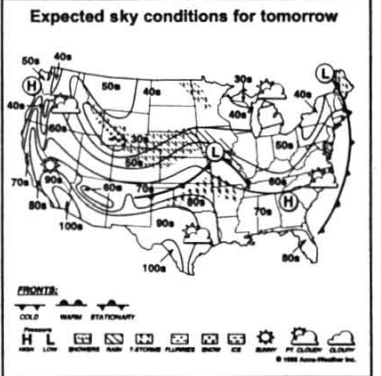
