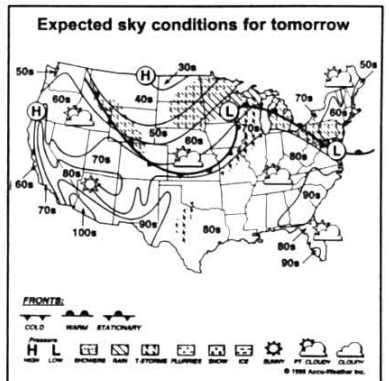

Board of Trade
CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybeans futures prices were sharply higher early today on the Chicago Board of Trade amid continuing concern about planting delays in the Midwest.

Investors shrugged off a report earlier this week that showed good progress in corn sowing, focusing instead on continued cold and wet weather from Missouri through Iowa. Traders also were betting the Agriculture Department's supply-demand report due out Friday would show continued strong demand and dwindling U.S. stockpiles.

Wheat futures were buoyed by continued concern about planting delays in the northern spring wheat area. An early harvest is needed to relieve what is expected to be one of the tightest supply situations in 50 years.

Soybeans futures gained on the grain rally and on rumors China is seeking 1 million tons of South American soybeans.

Wheat for July delivery rose 12 cents to \$5.83 a bushel; July corn rose 6 1/4 cents to \$4.69 1/2 a bushel; July oats rose 5 1/2 cents to \$2.56 1/2 a bushel; July soybeans rose 6 1/4 cents to \$8.25 a bushel.

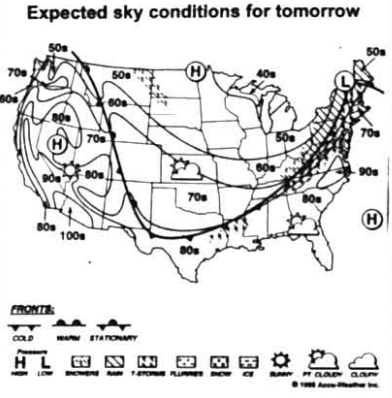

The low forecast, the first for the soon-to-be harvested crop, shows many growers abandoned acres that were damaged by the driest winter since 1896. Growers have walked away from 11.2 million acres, the highest since a government program in 1983.

Corn opened lower, then turned mixed, amid profit-taking after a 20-cent-per-bushel rally in the past two sessions in old crop. The USDA report was considered mostly neutral, but reduced reserves for 1995-96 could push up old crop prices.

Corn stocks were believed to be at 22-year lows until today, when the USDA announced reserves were lower than they have been in almost 50 years.

Rain in the eastern Corn Belt has delayed spring planting, but the department expects corn plantings to be higher than indicated in March because Midwestern growers will plant corn on abandoned wheat acres. The figure rose from 79.9 million to 81 million acres.

The department projected a corn crop this year of 9.7 billion bushels, up 27 percent from last year, because of increased acreage. The forecast is based on trends and planted acres, not on real conditions.

Teen faces charges in deaths of two adults, two toddlers

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — A teen-ager faces murder charges in the deaths of two adults and two little boys whose decomposed bodies were found in a remote cabin. The children were apparently left to starve after the adults were shot to death, authorities said.

Shaun Wilkins, 19, apparently knew the victims, authorities said. The killing was gang-related, said Darren Whiten, state Department of Public Safety secretary, but he would not give details.

Wilkins was arrested Saturday and charged with four counts of murder. He was held without bond.

The bodies of Johnny Ray Garcia, 4; his brother, Matthew Gene, 3; their mother, Cassandra Sedillo, 23; and her boyfriend, Ben Anaya Jr., 17, were found April 14 at the cabin near Torreon, N.M.

Medical examiners said the bodies had been there at least a month.

Anaya and Sedillo were shot to death, while the children died of starvation and dehydration, likely within a week, autopsies showed.

White said investigators believe whoever shot Anaya and Sedillo knowingly left the boys to die.

"It is our understanding that he (Wilkins) knew the kids were in the home," White said.

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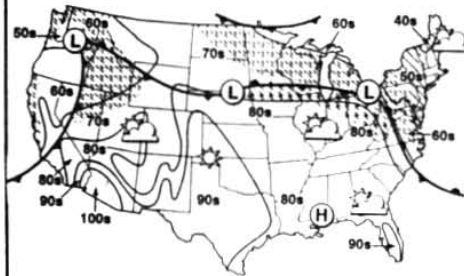

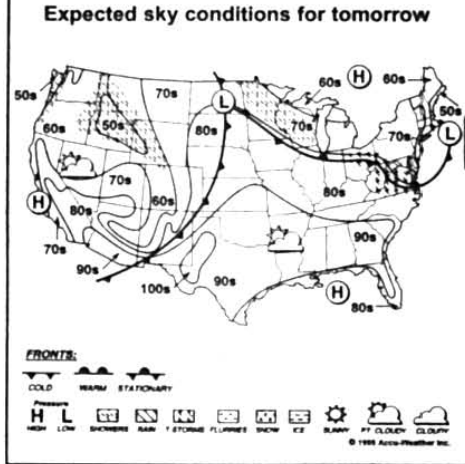

Art institute's 'copy' is a genuine Raphael work

CHICAGO — It always seemed like a good copy. But after a trip abroad and months of examination, curators at the Art Institute of Chicago say they have identified a chalk drawing as the work of Renaissance master Raphael.

"It's a miracle," said Douglas Drueck, curator of the museum's department of prints and drawings.

The chalk drawing of an up-raised hand and partial arm has been in the museum's permanent collection for more than 50 years and was considered a copy of a lost drawing by Raphael for the right hand and arm of Christ in "Transfiguration," the last of his great paintings.

But curators took another look at the work as part of a project to re-examine and catalog every drawing in the permanent collec-

tion. Last November, Konrad Oberhuber, a Raphael scholar who previously had seen and passed over the drawing, was asked to take another look at it.

Oberhuber changed his opinion.

He recommended the drawing be taken to England to be compared with a large collection of Raphael's work at Oxford University.

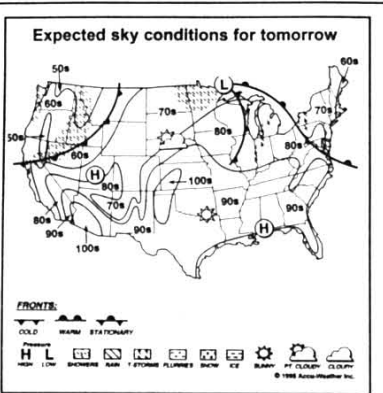

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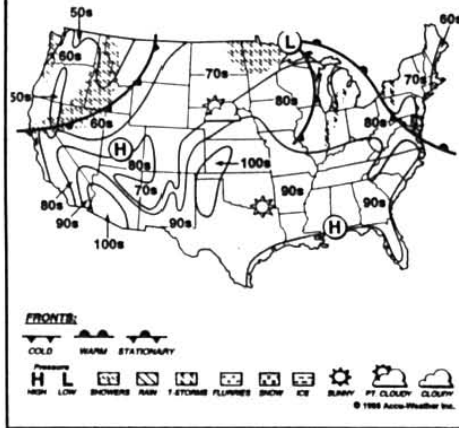

Bill would be gambling issue on ballot

SPRINGFIELD — A House committee approved legislation Tuesday to place an advisory referendum on the November ballot asking voters whether they want a say before gambling is expanded in their communities.

But the sponsor of the legislation said there are no guarantees the bill will be called for a vote in the full House or the Senate during the waning hours of this spring's legislative session.

"There are some members who support gambling and its expansion who perceive this as an impediment," said Rep. Peter Roskam, R-Wheaton. "There are others who are very strongly anti-gambling who perceive this as throwing in the towel."

Gambling opponents have been lobbying lawmakers for more than a year for a statewide gambling referendum that is considered a stronger bill because it would have a binding

Gambling opponents have been lobbying lawmakers for more than a year for a statewide gambling referendum that is considered a stronger bill because it would have a binding effect.

effect. The legislation advanced Tuesday would permit state residents to have a say on whether gambling should be expanded in their own communities, rather than anywhere in the state.

Roskam rejected an attempt by Rep. Joel Brunsvold, D-Milan, to amend the bill to permit dockside gambling at riverboat casinos along the Mississippi River.

"I am against the expansion of gambling and dockside is expansion," Roskam said.

The House Executive Committee's vote on the referendum in the final days of this spring's legislative session represented one of the few votes lawmakers have been allowed to take on

gambling-related issues this year. Gov. Jim Edgar said Tuesday that House Speaker Lee Daniels, R-Elmhurst, and Senate President James "Pate" Philip, R-Wood Dale, haven't budged in their opposition to increasing taxes on the profitable riverboat gambling industry.

Edgar said he is still trying to convince GOP legislative leaders to support the tax, which

would bring in \$65 million to help balance the state budget.

"I always put it on the table. They always take it off," Edgar said of the tax. "It appears they don't want to do that now."

Both Daniels and Philip have said since the start of the legislative session that they do not intend to consider any gambling-related proposals. Instead, members of the House and Senate plan to create a task force that would evaluate all gambling issues and report back to the legislature by the end of the year.

With an eye on the fall election, GOP leaders are trying to avoid too many controversial votes before they wrap up their work and leave Springfield, possibly as early as today. (\$22)

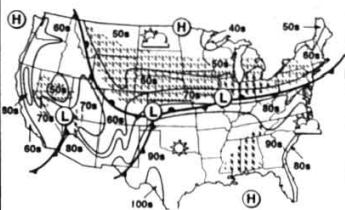

Pollen count goes through roof

SPRINGFIELD — Spring has finally sprung, and it's the reason for the runny nose and watery eyes you're waking up with each morning.

Experts say the central Illinois pollen count of late is through the roof, thanks to warm temperatures and bountiful sunshine encouraging a healthy growth of grass.

"Grass pollen is the second most common cause of hay fever after mold spores," said Dr. Glennon Paul, medical director of the Central Illinois Allergy and Respiratory Clinic in Springfield.

Paul said mold spores ran high a few weeks ago when farmers preparing their fields for planting stirred up spore-laden dust.

Molds will come to the fore again in late July through mid-November, when sky-high humidity helps them be fruitful and multiply.

But for now, it's grass causing all the misery.

"Pollen from grass has been running about 1,000 grains of pollen per cubic meter of air since last week," said Paul, noting that's extraordinarily high. "Normally, it runs about 250 to 300 grains per cubic meter."

Paul thinks the reason for the

super-high pollen counts is the weather.

"Until last week, it was cold and rainy, which kept the grass from pollinating," he said.

By all indications, the grass is now making up for lost time.

Paul's staff tracks pollen counts daily via an air-monitoring device perched 10 feet off the ground in front of the clinic's Miller Street offices. He said it provides the only local air monitoring in Springfield.

Paul predicted the grass pollen counts will probably stay high through mid-June.

But don't despair. There are some things you can

do to lessen your misery, according to Dr. Janet Despot, director of allergy at Southern Illinois University School of Medicine.

"You can stay inside in the air conditioning," she said.

If that's not practical, there are good over-the-counter allergy medications, such as Dimetapp, that will fight off hay-fever symptoms without making you too drowsy.

Despot warned that over-the-counter decongestant nasal sprays are effective but can be addicting.

"They shrink the blood vessels in the nasal passages, which helps relieve hay-fever symptoms," she said.

But after a few days of usage, the sprays begin to irritate nasal tissue, which causes further swelling. More spray knocks this down, but the swelling keeps recurring over a shorter and shorter period, Despot said.

Follow dosage directions exactly, she advised, and never use the nasal sprays for more than four consecutive days.

Prescription anti-allergy medications such as Seldane can be very effective, Despot said.

Or, if you're sniffling and miserable every year around this time, check with your doctor about allergy shots.

Teen-ager accused of murder claims he escaped fire with 2nd-story leap

QUINCY — Michael McCluskey says he escaped the fire that killed his family by jumping from a second-story window, but witnesses in his murder trial suggested his injuries did not support that story.

A firefighter battling the Dec. 8 blaze fell from a similar height and suffered a broken elbow and hand.

Dr. Stuart Pyatt testified that he examined McCluskey after the fire and found only minor cuts and bruises — none of them on the soles of his feet, as might be produced from a 15-foot drop.

McCluskey complained of a sprained ankle, but Pyatt said he found no swelling or tenderness.

McCluskey, 15, is charged with arson, aggravated arson and three counts of murder in connection with a fire that killed his father, Terry; mother, Barbara; and 4-year-old brother, Ben.

A parade of witnesses have said McCluskey offered conflicting versions of where and how the fire started.

"If it were true, you'd say the same thing word for word. If you say something different, you're not telling the truth. You don't have to be a lawyer to figure that out," said Lloyd McCluskey, the boy's uncle.

Investigators say they found a half-full can of gasoline with the cap off at the McCluskey home, along with oil lamps.

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and wheat futures prices edged lower early today on the Chicago Board of Trade amid disappointing export sales. Soybeans futures rose as continued rain in the Midwest raised fears of

planting delays.
 The Agriculture Department pegged weekly corn export sales at 375,000 tons — dramatically lower than in recent weeks and indicative that foreign demand may be waning amid prices that have doubled in the past year. The slide was tempered by USDA word today that an undisclosed source had bought 104,000 tons of corn.

Traders shrugged off possible flooding in the western Corn Belt, where planting is more than 80 percent complete. Conditions have finally improved in eastern areas, where farmers are finally returning to soggy fields.
 Wheat, which has been hit with difficult growing weather, dropped on low exports as well as an improving hard red winter wheat crop. Progress reports indicated some wheat though dead because of cold and dry weather actually will be harvested.

Soybeans futures rose on ideas heavy rainfall will delay early planting

Corn for July delivery fell 2 1/2 cents to 4.84 cents a bushel; July soybeans rose 1/4 cent to \$7.97 1/2 a bushel; July wheat dropped 5 1/4 cents to \$2.27 1/2 a bushel; and July oats rose 1 cent to \$2.27 1/2 cents a bushel.

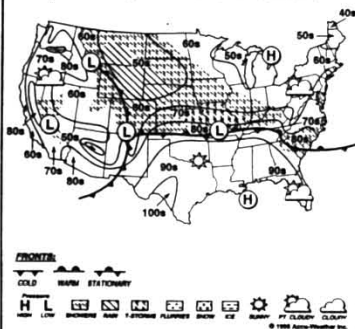

OAK BROOK — McDonald's Corp. executives say the fast-food giant's new Arch Deluxe quarter-pound cheeseburger has surpassed the Big Mac as its most successful new product introduction.

Michael Quinlan, the company's chief executive, on Thursday said initial sales of the quarter-pound burger that comes with lettuce and tomato and optional bacon has surpassed expectations.

"It's a blockbuster introduction," Quinlan said after the company's annual shareholders meeting at its Oak Brook, Ill., headquarters. "We're thrilled with it. It's surprised even us."

Executives declined to reveal initial sales figures, but Quinlan said the sandwich is being purchased at a higher rate than any other product introduced in the company's history. And more than half of the Arch Deluxe buyers are getting the more expensive bacon version that has 34 grams of fat and half the average daily recommended sodium intake.

The company also is testing chicken and fish sandwiches that come with lettuce and tomato on the same potato-flour bun available for the Arch Deluxe.

Those products could be rolled out nationwide depending on the results of the test-marketing and analysis of whether the Arch Deluxe is bringing in new business.

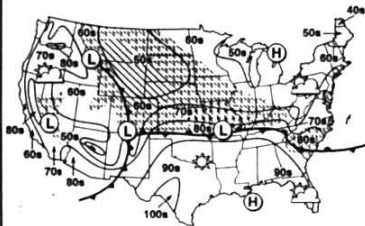
