

CHICAGO - His neighbors described Gregory Clepper as helpful and mannerly, but police said they have evidence that this young man exploded in deadly violence at least a dozen times.

Clepper, 28, has signed writciepper, 28, nas signed writ-ten confessions in the slayings of 12 prostitutes on Chicago's South Side, Cook County State's Attorney Jack O'Malley said

The bodies were left in alleys

and garbage bins, although in one case, Clepper stashed a body in a closet until he could get his mother to help him move it, po-

Clepper was being held with-out bond on 12 counts of first-degree murder and three counts

orgagravated sexual assault.

Clepper lived on a quiet street, in the house where he grew up. Neighbors said that despite his habit of smoking crack cocaine, he was polite and personable. sonable

Clepper killed the women be-ween 1991 and last week when they became angry with his re-fusal to pay them for sex, police

Clepper's mother has also admitted to helping him dispose of one of the bodies, police said. Anita Hodges, 23, a neighbor,

said Clepper used drugs but she always thought of him as "just a regular guy" who helped her carry packages into her house. She said she was not surprised that someone could get away

with killing prostitutes for so

long.
"You can walk around the "You can walk around the corner and find a (prostitute) just about anywhere." Hodges said. "These are like street women — they were prostitutes, they were into drugs — they weren't that important as people. If they were girls from the suburbs they would have been on the news and (police) would have been trying a lot harder to find them."

Clepper had worked a few

jobs but spent much of his time with neighbors on South Carwith neignbors on South Car-penter Street, on a quiet residen-tial block populated mostly by older people, said Lois Crane, 59, who has lived on the street for 31 years.



WASHINGTON months into its mission, a spacecraft sent to study the sun from afar is telling astrophysicists there is no such thing as a quiet time when solar activity is low. In fact, its pictures show the sun's surface in continuous mo-

tion and action at this time, when the sun is almost exactly in the middle of its 11-year cycle - supposedly the low point

of activity.
"We like to use the sun as an example of a minimum activity star, which is pretty dead, with nothing interesting happening on a global scale," said Dr. P. Brendan Byrne. "We need to revise that view."

Byrne, assistant director of Armagh Observatory in North-ern Ireland and a world authority on magnetic activity, was one of five scientists at a briefing Thursday at the National Aeronautics and Space Administra-

The Solar and Heliospheric Observatory spacecraft, known as SOHO, was specifically designed to observe the sun when solar disturbances are at a minimum. The last peak was in 1990 and the next is in 2001.

The spacecraft has 12 telescopes and other science instruments - three from the United States and nine from Europe — for its \$1 billion mission: to solve the mystery of how heat in the sun's interior is transported to the solar wind.

Scientists plan to probe the sun's interior via sound waves coming to the solar surface by oscillations and variations in brightness. This new method, called helioseismology, is analogous to using earthquakes to study the Earth's interior.

Teen faces charges in deaths of two adults, two toddlers

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — A teen-ager faces murder charges in the deaths of two adults and two little boys whose decomposed bodies were found in a remote cabin. The children were apparently left to starve after the adults were shot to death, authorities said.

Medical examiners said the bodies had been there at least a month.

Anaya and Sedillo were shot to death, while the children died of starvation and dehydration, likely within a week, autopsies showed.

White said investigators believe whoever shot Anaya and Sedillo knowingly left the boys to die.

Bill would be gambling issue on ballot

SPRINGFIELD. A House SPRINGFIELD — A House committee approved legislation Tuesday to place an advisory referendum on the November ballot asking voters whether they want a say before gambling is expanded in their communi

But the sponsor of the legislation said there are no guarantees the bill will be called for a vote in the full House or the Senate during the waning hours of this

ourning the waning hours of this spring's legislative session.

"There are some members who support gambling and its expansion who perceive this as an impediment," said Rep. Peter Roskam, R-Wheaton. There

Roskam, R-Wheaton. "There are others who are very strongly anti-gambling who perceive this as throwing in the towel." Gambling opponents have been lobbying lawmakers for more than a year for a statewide gambling referendum that is considered a stronger bill because it would have a binding. cause it would have a binding

Gambling opponents have been lobbying lawmakers for more than a year for a statewide gambling referendum that is considered a stronger bill because it would have a binding effect.

effect. The legislation advanced Tuesday would permit state residents to have a say on whether gambling should be expanded in their own communities, rather than anywhere in the state

Roskam rejected an attempt by Rep. Joel Brunsvold, D-Milan, to amend the bill to permit dock-side gambling at riverboat casi-nos along the Mississippi River.

"I am against the expansion of gambling and dockside is expansion," Roskam said.

The House Executive Committee's vote on the referendum in the final days of this spring's legislative session represented one of the few votes lawmakers have been allowed to take on

gambling-related issues this

Gov. Jim Edgar said Tuesday that House Speaker Lee Daniels, R-Elmhurst, and Senate Presi-dent James "Pate" Philip, Rdent James "Pate" Philip, R-Wood Dale, haven't budged in their opposition to increasing taxes on the profitable riverboat gambling industry. Edgar said he is still trying to convince GOP legislative lead-

ers to support the tax, which

would bring in \$65 million to help balance the state budget. "I always put it on the table. They always take it off," Edgar said of the tax. "It appears they don't want to do that now."

Both Daniels and Philip have said since the start of the legislative session that they do not intend to consider any gambling-related proposals. Instead, mem-bers of the House and Senate plan to create a task force that would evaluate all gambling is-sues and report back to the legis-lature by the end of the year.

With an eye on the fall elec-tion, GOP leaders are trying to avoid too many controversial votes before they wrap up their work and leave Springfield, possibly as early as today. (5/22)

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

Pollen count goes through roof

SPRINGFIELD — Spring has finally sprung, and it's the reason for the runny nose and watery eyes you're waking up with

each morning.

Experts say the central Illinois pollen count of late is through the roof, thanks to warm temperatures and bountiful sunshine encouraging a healthy growth of

"Grass pollen is the second most common cause of hay fever after mold spores," said Dr. Glennon Paul, medical director of the Central Illinois Allergy and Respiratory Clinic Springfield.

Paul said mold spores ran high a few weeks ago when farmers preparing their fields for planting stirred up spore-laden

Molds will come to the fore again in late July through mid-November, when sky-high hu-midity helps them be fruitful and multiply.

But for now, it's grass causing

But for now, it's grass causing all the misery.

"Pollen from grass has been running about 1,000 grains of pollen per cubic meter of air since last week," said Paul, not-

ing that's extraordinarily high.
"Normally, it runs about 250
to 300 grains per cubic meter."
Paul thinks the reason for the

super-high pollen counts is the weather.

"Until last week, it was cold and rainy, which kept the grass from pollinating," he said.

By all indications, the grass is

now making up for lost time.

Paul's staff tracks pollen
counts daily via an
air-monitoring device perched
10 feet off the ground in front of
the clinic's Miller Street offices. He said it provides the only local air monitoring in Springfield.

Paul predicted the grass pollen counts will probably stay high through mid-June.

But don't despair.

Medicine.

"You can stay inside in the air conditioning," she said.
If that's not practical, there are good over-the-counter allergy medications, such as Dimetapp, that will fight off hay-fever symptoms without making you too drowsy.

Despot warned that
over-the-counter decongestant
nasal sprays are effective but
can be addicting.

"They shrink the blood
vessels in the nasal passages,
which helps relieve hay-fever
symptoms," she said.

But after a few days of usage

But after a few days of usage But after a few days of usage, the sprays begin to irritate nasal tissue, which causes further swelling. More spray knocks this down, but the swelling keeps recurring over a shorter and shorter period, Despot said. Follow dosage directions exactly, she advised, and never use the nasal sprays for more than four consecutive days.

Prescription anti-allergy

Prescription anti-allergy medications such as Seldane can be very effective, Despot said.

Or, if you're sniffling and miscrable every year around this time, check with your doctor about allergy shots.

Investigators say they found a half-full can of gasoline with the cap off at the McCluskey home, along with oil lamps.

McDonald's execs glowing over sales of deluxe burger

OAK BROOK — McDonald's Corp. executives say the fast-food giant's new Arch Deluxe quarter-pound cheeseburger has surpassed the Big Mac as its most successful new product introduction. troduction.

Michael Quinlan, the company's chief executive, on Thursday said initial sales of the quarter-pound burger that comes with lettuce and tomato and optional bacon has surpassed expectations.

"It's a blockbuster in-troduction," Quinlan said after the company's annual shareholders meeting at its Oak Brook, III., headquarters. "We're thrilled with it. It's surprised even us."

Executives declined to reveal initial sales figures, but Quinlan said the sandwich is being purchased at a higher rate than any other product introduced in the company's history. And more than half of the Arch Deluxe buyers are getting the more expensive bacon version that has 34 grams of fat and half the average daily recommended sodium intake.

The company also is testing chicken and fish sandwiches that come with lettuce and tomato on the same potato-flour bun available for the Arch Deluxe.

Those products could be rolled out nationwide depending on the results of the testmarketing and analysis of whether the Arch Deluxe is bringing in new business.


