PEORIA — CPC Interna-tional's plan to settle a price-fixing lawsuit for \$7 million could be "a big blow" to Ar-cher Daniels Midland and other targets of the lawsuit, an antitrust expert says.

announced the proposed deal Thursday. If the plan is approved by U.S. District Judge Michael M. Mihm, CPC would be the first of five companies to settle the massive lawsuit involving high-fructose corn syrup, the main sweetener in

syrup, the main sweetener in most soda pop.

ADM could face a tougher trial or higher settlement costs because of the settlement, especials cially if CPC agrees to cooperate with the plaintiffs, said Univer-sity of Illinois law professor

"Even if they're not going to cooperate with the plaintiffs it's a big blow because the plaintiffs now have a \$7 million war chest to fight the lawsuit," said Ross, a former antitrust lawyer for the Justice Department. "But if this is the floor and everyone else would be able to settle for around \$7 million, that's better

The Peoria case brought to-gether more than a half-dozen lawsuits against corn syrup mak-ers filed in the wake of a federal price-fixing probe. Decatur-based ADM, the main target of that probe, recently settled a similar price-fixing lawsuit in-volving the livestock feed supplement lysine for \$25 million.



Audit says Million Man March organizers still owe \$66,000

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

WASHINGTON washington — it cost slightly more than \$2 million to put together the Million Man March last October and more than \$66,000 in unpaid bills remain, organizers said Friday in eleasing a long-awaited audit of the event.

The Rev. Benjamin Chavis, national director of the Million Man March, said the audit by a Chicago-based certified public accounting firm proves that the day of spirituality and atonement for black men was a success.

"The amount, \$66,000, compared to the overall expense of over \$2 million is a very, very small percentage," Chavis said in an interview after a news conference where the audit was reviewed.

"With over 95 percent of the bills paid, that is a remarkable

An audit was not required. But Chavis and Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan, who called for a march, promised to make one public.

Bolling & Hill, a minority-owned certified public accounting firm in Chicago, where the Nation of Islam is based, did the audit, Chavis said.

Total expenses were approximately \$2 million, including more than \$581,000 spent on

That leaves organizers with a debt of \$66,283, which Chavis said was owed to various vendors, some of whom are awaiting final payment. Some vendors are owed, Chavis said, because they didn't bill until this year.

They also promised to donate about 10 percent of the sum collected on the National Mall, which amounts to about \$25,000, to the District of Columbia. That hasn't been paid, but Chavis said the pledge would be fulfilled.





Illinois and Ohio farmers will be out around the clock, trying to catch up on planting before the weekend deadline. They also want to beat rain that could fall by Sunday — again saturating fields have been muddy all sesson.

All other contracts fell on forecasts for 80- and 90-degree temperatures to sweep the Midwest over the next few days, drying up mushy ground and spurring crop

Wheat futures slipped in sympathy with corn and on the seasonal downtrend during harvest months of June and July. The market also fell on hot weather, which bodes well for harvesting in Kansas and growing in the Southern Plains.

Soybeans for July delivery slumped 4 cents to \$7.87 a bushel; July corn gained 4½ cents to \$4.76 a bushel, while September corn fell 1½ cents to \$3.88½ a bushel; July wheat fell 3 cents to \$4.99½ a bushel, and July coats fell

434 cents to \$2.351/2 a bushel.

Cattle futures were mostly higher and hog prices lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange

Live June cattle fell .02 cent to 62.25 cents a pound, but the August contract rose .05 cent to 65.22 cents a pound. August feeder cattle rose .38 cent to 60.20 cents a pound. Live June hogs fell .77 cent to 58,70 cents a pound, and July frozen pork bellies fell 1.15 cents to 69.60 cents a pound.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were higher at midday as a Federal Reserve report on the economy didn't sound any new alarms on inflation.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 34.72 at 5,662.75, breaking out of the narrow, nervous range that has characterized this week and last.

Declining issues outnumbered advancers by a slim margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 166.49 million shares, down slightly from Wednesday's midday pace.

New law targets school enrollment

SPRINGFIELD — A new state law is aimed at ending any free rides for parents who enroll their students in the wrong school district.

Gov. Jim Edgar earlier this week signed into law a measure that makes it a misdemeanor to knowingly enroll a child in a school district in which they are not authorized to attend. Those found guilty can face fines of up to \$500 and up to 30 days in iail

The move puts teeth into a law that allows a school district to charge tuition for students who don't live in the district,

said Rep. James Durkin, R. Westchester.

The same misdemeanor penalty would apply for intentionally giving false information about residency to get a pupil enrolled in a school where he is incligible without paying tuition, said Durkin, a co-sponsor.

For years, schools have been required to charge tuition to students who do not live in the district, but there was little penalty for violation, said Kim Knauer, Illinois State School Board spokeswoman.
