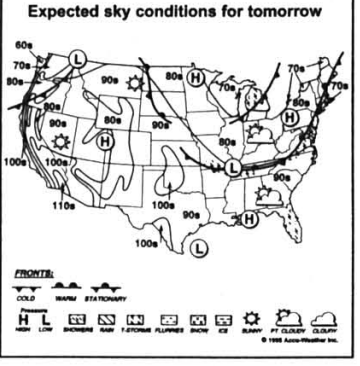

**Board of Trade**  
 CHICAGO (AP) — Corn futures prices continued to climb this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade after last week's Agriculture Department reports suggested increased corn acreage still could not satisfy purchasers.

Farmers responded to hot demand and this spring's record prices by planting 14 percent more corn than they did a year ago. But with corn stockpiles on June 1 lower than they have been since 1973, current demand could leave bins with only two to 12 days' supplies when corn starts arriving at grain elevators in September. Stockpiles usually contain 90 days' worth of corn at harvest.

Soybean futures edged higher in sympathy with corn and on ideas that lingering hot weather in the Midwest would stress crops.

Corn for September delivery gained 10 1/4 cents to \$4.08 1/2 a bushel; expiring July corn hit a contract high of \$5.32 a bushel before retreating to \$5.25 — an 8 1/4-cent gain. August soybeans gained 2 1/4 cents to \$7.74 1/4 a bushel; September wheat rose 1 1/4 cents to \$4.84 a bushel; September oats gained 3 cents to \$2.16 a bushel.

 NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were higher at midday, with technology shares continuing to rebound, the Dow Jones industrial average up 22.90 to 5,677.53, down from a morning gain of nearly 35 points.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by an 8-to-7 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 153.70 million shares.

The NYSE composite index was up 1.04 at 360.24, and the Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 2.27 at 672.90.

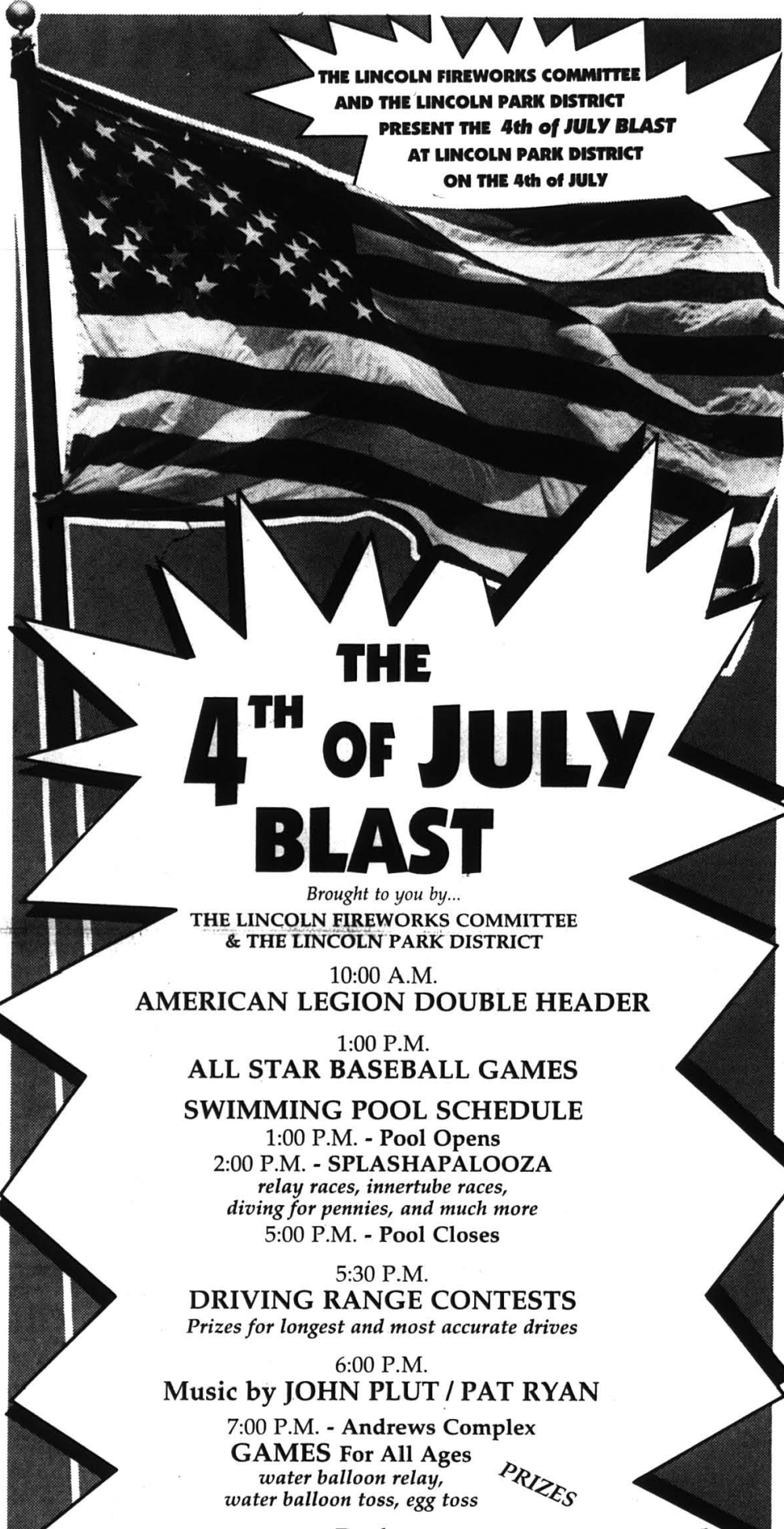
She attended Millikin University in Decatur and completed her bachelor of arts degree in biology at the University of Illinois and a master's degree at the University of Wisconsin.

**Union vote ends labor feud  
at Charleston trailer factory**

WESTFIELD — Locked-out workers at Charleston's Trailmobile plant looked forward to returning to their jobs after overwhelmingly ratifying a new contract, ending a five-month labor dispute.

"Now, we want to show the world we are the No. 1 trailer builders," Mike Lewis, chairman of the union's bargaining committee, said Monday night.

About 70 percent of 792 members of Local 7591 of the United Paperworkers International Union voted in favor of the three-year pact, but no exact bal-

loting breakdown was available, Lewis said.

Tim McDonnell, the company's vice president and general counsel, said maintenance workers would be back later this week with production employees beginning to return to work as early as next Monday.

"We are pleased, and we're ready to get back to work," he said.

Temporary workers hired during the lockout will be gone, McDonnell said.

Union and company negotiators hammered out the agreement last week.

**Mine closing will put 400 out of work**

ALBERS — Almost 400 people will lose their jobs because Exxon Coal USA Inc. plans to close a coal mine here.

The Monterey No. 2 mine provides coal only to PSI Energy Inc., an Indiana utility. Exxon Coal said Tuesday it had reached a tentative deal ending its contract with the utility.

Exxon Coal filed a \$300 million lawsuit against PSI in 1993 when the utility tried to break its contract, which would have expired in 2002. The two companies settled out of court the next year, and PSI continued to buy Monterey No. 2 coal.

About 330 union and 65 salaried employees will lose their jobs, Exxon said. Most will be let go by early August, but about 80 people will stay on for about four months past August to salvage equipment and close the

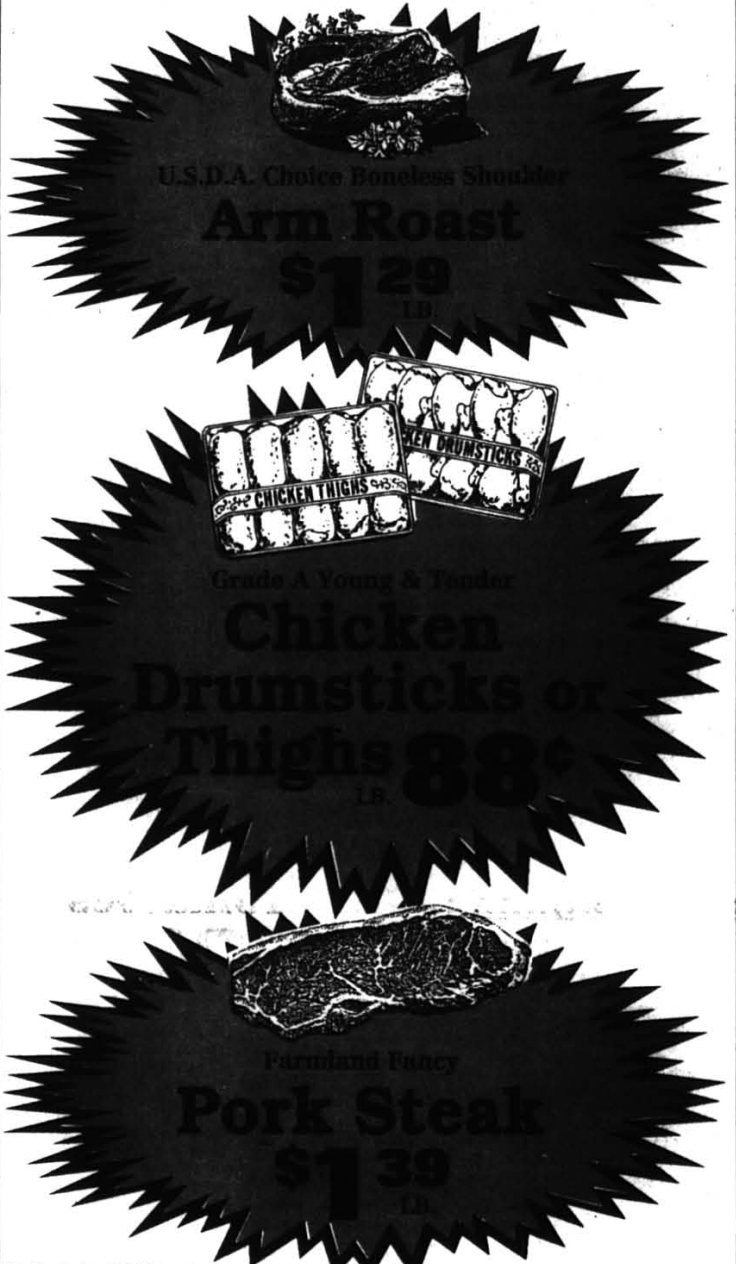

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois gaming officials say they don't know what provided the biggest competition for two Joliet riverboat casinos this June — three new riverboats in northwest Indiana or the unstoppable Chicago Bulls.

An Illinois Gaming Board report released this week shows adjusted gross receipts — total income minus payout to gamblers — were lower in June 1996 than in June 1995 at Joliet's Empress Casino and Harrah's Joliet Casino.

But gaming officials say it's

too early to tell how last month's casino openings in Gary, Ind., and Hammond, Ind., will affect Joliet. They say June, a usually slow month, was slowed further by a Bulls championship run that kept many people glued to their television sets.

"We know that attendance declined any time there was a Bulls game," said Adrienne Levatino, spokeswoman for the Illinois Gaming Council, the industry owners' group.

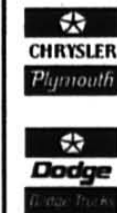

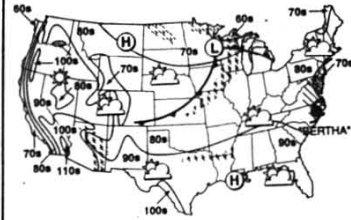

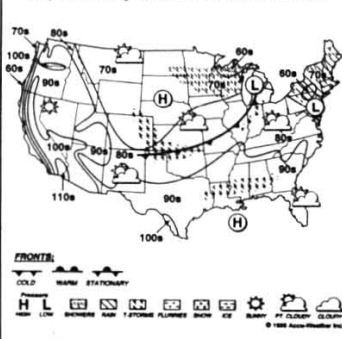

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybeans futures prices ticked higher this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade as lack of rain continues to burden bone-dry crops in the increasingly dry Midwest.

Parts of Iowa, Illinois and Indiana have not received rain for almost a month, and dry weather and warmer temperatures are expected over the next few days. The U.S. corn and soybean crops were in fairly good shape as of Sunday, but the warm, dry weather is expected to take a toll.

December corn hit a contract high; soybeans for September, November and January touched new contract highs. The expiring contract for July soybeans hit the highest point for a spot month since September 1988. The intensity of the run-up was unexpected, as traders were predicted to take profits after Thursday's boom.

Wheat futures rose slightly in sympathy with corn and soybeans. Traders shrugged off ideas of greater supplies of wheat. With the harvest more than

halfway complete, winter wheat production was put at 1.48 billion bushels, up 8 percent from the June 1 forecast. As a result, the harvest will be the lowest since 1989 instead of 1978 as first thought, according to this morning's Agriculture Department figures. Wheat stocks are expected to rise to 428 million from 340 million.

The USDA report contained no real surprises for corn and soybeans. This year's soybean stocks could fall to 180 million bushels from 195 million by autumn harvest; corn reserves could drop to 322 million bushels from 347 million.

The expiring contract for July corn hit a new high at \$5.49 a bushel — a 10-cent increase. September corn gained 10 1/4 cents to \$4.32 a bushel. August soybeans added 12 cents to \$8.34 a bushel; September wheat rose 2 cents to \$5.08; September oats were unchanged at \$2.35 1/2 a bushel.

Livestock prices were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange on profit taking for most cattle contracts. Pork futures continued higher on tight supplies. August live cattle rose .12 cent to 67.02 cents a pound, but most other contracts fell. August feeder cattle dropped .1 cent to 61 cents a pound.

August live hogs gained 2 cent to 58.55 a pound; August frozen pork bellies hit a seven-week high, surging the 2-cent limit to 87.40 cents a pound — the third consecutive day of limit-up increases.

Wall Street all noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were slipping at midday after some brief bargain-hunting failed to erase the negative tone set in Thursday's big tumble on corporate profit worries. At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 25.49 at 5,495.05, adding to Thursday's 83-point slide.

Declining issues outnumbered advancers by a 7-to-5 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 194.35 million shares, down from Thursday's busy pace. Broad-market indexes were moving lower too after some early bottom fishing.

"We've had this mentality of buying the dips, but I think that mentality has played itself out," said Steven Goldman, market strategist at Weeden & Co. in Greenwich, Conn.

**'Watch' group uses computer to fight crime**

AURORA — In the comfort of his home, Phil Sanchez patrols the streets of his neighborhood — with the help of a computer he got from police.

He scans a list of "Aurora's Most Wanted" and reads an e-mail message from a person down the street, warning him about a home-repair scam.

Soon police will send him bulletins about crimes committed in his area so Sanchez can share them with his neighborhood watch group.

"We wanted to establish an electronic link to our citizens groups ... and to provide them with information that would help them prevent crime and disorder in their own neighborhoods," said Aurora Police Cmdr. Michael Nila.

Aurora, a town of 99,000 located 35 miles west of downtown Chicago, is one of a few towns nationwide where residents can receive neighborhood-specific crime information by computer 24 hours a day. Residents also can share what they know with officers, also by computer.

"We want to be a resource to police," said Sanchez, 43, a member of a group called Make a Difference.

down from a morning gain of about 43 points. The blue-chip barometer has lost about 73 points over the past two sessions after rallying back part of the way from last week's steep selloff.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 6-to-5 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 183.13 million shares, up slightly from Monday's early pace.

Broad-market indexes were mostly higher. The NYSE composite index was up 0.81 at 3411.13; the Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 1.86 at 635.43; and the American Stock Exchange's market value index was up 2.78 at 545.75.

But the Nasdaq composite was down 1.22 at 1,080.17 even though Microsoft reported a 52 percent jump in its fourth quarter profits.

The software giant's results, reported after Monday's trading, came in just above analyst forecasts, but Microsoft shares slipped 2 1/4 to 117 1/2 in Nasdaq trading as investors re-examined the battered technology sector.

The Microsoft report followed last week's strong showing from Intel, which helped ease concerns about a barrage of bad news from computer-related businesses. But like Microsoft, Sun Microsystems barely exceeded estimates last week and failed to inspire any buying.

Among widely held issues, AT&T was off 1/4 at 51 1/2; Merck was unchanged at 65 1/4; and IBM was up 1/4 at 93 1/4. The strongest issues in the Do were Allied Signal, up 2 at 57 1/4; United Technologies, up 1 1/4 at 108 1/4; American Express, up 1 1/4 at 42 1/4. Late Monday afternoon, Amex reported a 10 percent increase in second quarter profits that exceeded forecasts.

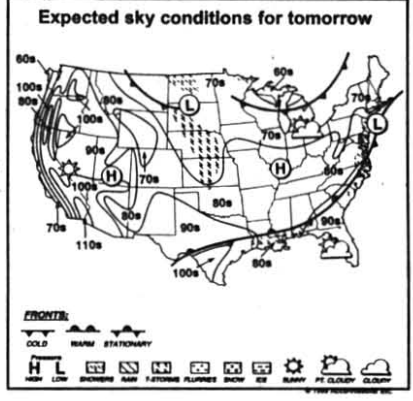

**Board of Trade**  
 CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices dropped this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade after the federal government confirmed China has refused to accept a large order.

Beijing cancelled 140,000 tons of soft red winter wheat, the Agriculture Department announced this morning. The move could mark the beginning of a slew of soft red winter wheat cancellations. Theories are that China really is concerned about fungus-infected wheat; that China will grow more wheat than expected and will need to import less wheat; or that Beijing believes prices will fall further

and that it can buy cheaper grain later.

Prices have fallen 31 percent since April and have not been this low since January.

Earlier this week, China cancelled more than 725,000 tons of hard red winter wheat that is traded in Kansas City. Chicago's markets dropped on speculation that its soft red winter wheat would be next.

Wheat for September delivery fell 5 cents to \$4.36 a bushel; September corn dropped 4 1/2 cents to \$3.53 1/2 a bushel; August soybeans fell 5 1/4 cents to \$7.82 1/2 a bushel, and September oats dropped 5 cent to \$1.94 1/2 a bushel.

Livestock futures prices were mostly lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Live August cattle fell 25 cent to 65.50 cents a pound; August feeder cattle dropped .12 cent to 60.55 cents a pound; August live hogs gained .5 cent to 58.30 cents a pound, and August frozen pork bellies slumped 87 cent to 85.95 cents a pound.

**Wall Street at noon**  
 NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were holding strong gains at midday, boosted by an encouraging profit report from IBM that helped restore some investor confidence about the computer industry's prospects.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 58.44 at 5,413.13, having retreated slightly from a gain of 78 points. IBM shares — up 3 1/4 at 100 1/4, or the equivalent of more than 25 Dow points — accounted for nearly half of the blue-chip benchmark's gain.

The technology-laden Nasdaq composite index, mired in a steep four-session slump, also drew a lift from IBM's report, rising 18.30 to 1,060.68 by midday.

Other broad-market measures were positive too. Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 5-to-2 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 187.59 million shares, up from Wednesday's pace.

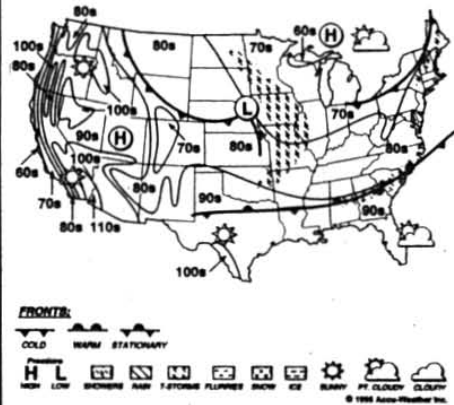

**HARRISBURG** — Overhunting wiped out the last wild elk from Illinois' prairies and forests more than 100 years ago.

Today, state experts are hunting for a way to bring them back.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources this spring began looking at potential sites and gauging public support for a possible release of elk, most likely in Southern Illinois.

"Several states either are doing it or have done it, and I think there's a growing interest in restoration, as can be seen from the interest people have had with wolves, for instance, in the West," IDNR spokeswoman Carol Knowles said Thursday.

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation has given the agency

a \$6,000 grant for the scientific portion of the project, which includes satellite mapping of the terrain.

IDNR also will randomly survey 2,000 households throughout the state, probably in the fall.

The study is still in its infancy, and no conclusions have been made. But IDNR spokesman Bob Casteel said research-

ers have tentatively identified Southern Illinois, home of the 265,000-acre Shawnee National Forest, as the best available habitat.

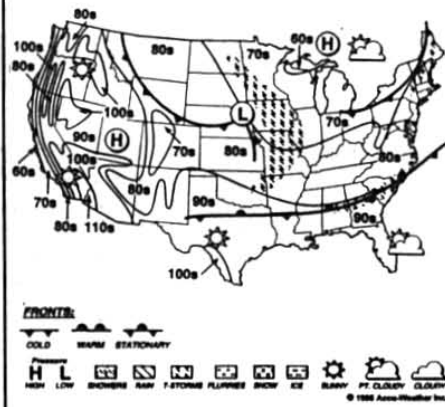

**Board of Trade**

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains and soybeans futures opened higher this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade because forecasts suggest much-needed warm weather will continue to evade Midwestern fields.  
The National Weather Service predicts dry but cool conditions will continue in corn and soybean regions over the next six to 10 days. The western Corn Belt states of Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska should receive temperatures that are slightly above normal, but nothing higher than 95 degrees is expected. Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and other eastern Corn Belt

states are expected to remain temperate.  
Cool weather over the past two weeks is believed to have stunted growth of late planted crops.  
Wheat futures dipped because rain delayed the weekend harvest. About half an inch of rain fell across fields over the past three days, which hampered the end of harvest.  
Exports also supported prices. South Korea is expected to buy 105,000 tons of U.S. corn; Egypt is said to want 150,000 tons of wheat, and Japan is expected to buy soybeans over the next two weeks.

Edgar, who has been interviewed as a possible running mate for presumptive presidential nominee Bob Dole, was slated as one of 11 speakers on Aug. 13.

The agenda that day calls for critiquing President Clinton's record and includes the keynote speech by Rep. Susan Molinari of New York.

Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour did not specify roles for speakers when he released the list.

Edgar spokesman Mike Lawrence said the governor had not yet received official word of a speaking role and had not chosen a topic for his speech.

**Board of Trade**

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybean futures prices rose early today on the Chicago Board of Trade because crops conditions have improved little, despite a week of rain that was believed to have helped plants.

At Agriculture Department report on Monday evening showed 61 percent of corn crops

were in good to excellent shape last week — a number that has changed little in the past five weeks. Less than 50 percent of corn is reproducing going into August — far behind the 63 percent average.

The USDA report showed soybean crops have improved slightly, with 55 percent of plants in good to excellent shape compared to last week's 53 percent figure. Cooler-than-normal evening temperatures is keeping plants from sprouting higher.

The National Weather Service six- to 10-day forecast predicts cool temperatures will continue across the Midwest, which should further boost futures prices.

Wheat futures gained in sympathy with corn and soybeans, but advances were offset by a good harvest and fears over China and poor-quality wheat.

September harvest is 82 percent complete — on par with recent averages — which means grain is pouring into elevators. Some experts worry, however, that it has been infected with a fungus that makes animals sick when they eat it.

Ideas that China will cancel the rest of the wheat it has ordered but not received added further pressure.

Live August corn rose 5 1/4 cents to \$3.65 a bushel; August soybeans added 3 1/4 cents to \$7.73 a bushel; September wheat gained 7 1/2 cents to \$4.44 1/2 a bushel; September oats rose 7 1/2 cents to \$1.94 1/4 a bushel.

Cattle futures sank on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange on profit taking; pork futures rose on light supplies and continued buying from Monday.

Live August cattle sank 25 cent to 65.15 cents a pound; August feeder cattle fell 4 cent to 61.37 cents a pound; August live hogs rose 13 cent to 60.05 cents a pound; and August pork bellies gained the 2-cent limit to \$3.75 cents a pound.

**Wall Street on non**

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were mostly lower at midday as a key economic report revealed no inflationary bombshells but failed to alleviate worries about rising interest rates.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 3.33 at 5,431.28, recovering from a 13-point dip, but down from an early jump of nearly 30 points.

The number of declining issues took a narrow lead over advances on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 144.52 million shares, up from Monday's early pace.

Broad-market indexes also started the session higher, but most turned lower by late morning. The NYSE composite index was down 0.41 at 358.23; the Standard & Poor's 500 list was down 0.32 at 630.59; and the American Stock Exchange's market value index was down 0.27 at 535.85. The Nasdaq composite index was up 1.46 at 1,067.34.

Among widely held Dow components, IBM was off 1/2 at 104 1/4; AT&T was down 3/4 at 50 1/2; Disney was up 1/4 at 53 1/2; General Electric was down 1/4 at 79 1/4; and Merck was down 1/2 at 62 1/4.

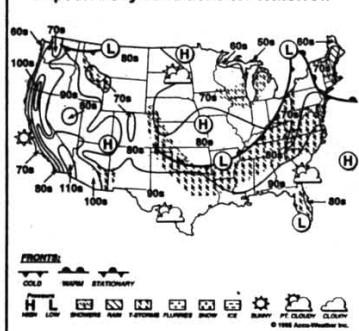

**Ben Franklin needs more fives and dimes to operate**

CHICAGO — Ben Franklin stores were once the epitome of variety stores — the quintessential five-and-dime.

The late Sam Walton sharpened his retailing skills in a Ben Franklin store in Arkansas, eventually becoming the company's biggest franchisee.

Then, he founded Wal-Mart.

Now, it's the competition from Walton's megastore creation and others like it that Ben Franklin Stores Inc. cites as a major factor in its decision to file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection.

Friday's filing allows the Carol Stream company to postpone payment of its debts while it reorganizes its finances.

Ben Franklin shifted its merchandising eight years ago from variety items to art and craft supplies. The company still has about 930 stores in 49 states.

Vice President David Brainard said the company will attempt to sell the 33 company-owned stores and will close those it can't sell. It wasn't immediately clear how the bulk of the chain's stores, which are privately-owned franchises, would be affected.

But Ben Franklin intends to survive. In a news release, the company said it would "restore

historic levels of service to its customers" when it emerges from Chapter 11 protection next April.

Service may be its only hope against megastores such as Wal-Mart, said analyst John Eade at Argus Research in New York.

"You can't compete on price with Wal-Mart, so it has to be something else — whether it's location, selection or service," he said.

Regional discount operators have been hard-pressed to keep up with Wal-Mart, which has siphoned off billions in dollars in sales from the smaller chains.

In addition to Ben Franklin, Caldor Corp., the country's fourth-largest discount store chain, and the Northeastern discount operator, Bradlees Inc., also have filed for bankruptcy protection.

Only niche stores and megastores are surviving — at the expense of stores like Ben Franklin, said Kennedy Smith, director of the National Main Street Center for the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The Washington-based group is dedicated to helping communities revive traditional business districts.
