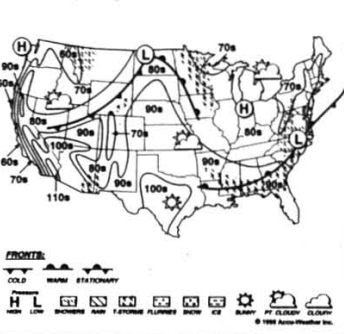

Depressed dad saved from death

CHICAGO — A suburban man who threw his crying 9-month-old twins into a wall, fatally injuring them, has avoided the death penalty.

David Gevas, 27, of Riverside, originally was sentenced to death for the Oct. 6, 1992 rampage after he admitted what he did and even asked to be executed.

However, the Illinois Supreme Court ordered a new trial, saying Gevas had not received a fitness hearing.

A psychiatrist Thursday testified that Gevas was manic-depressive, had a borderline personality disorder and had been addicted to cocaine.

Charles Schettler

CLINTON — Charles L. Schettler, 79, of Wapella died at 12:55 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 1, 1996, at BroMenn Regional Medical Center, Normal.

Mr. Schettler retired Jan. 1, 1995, as seed germination supervisor and planting field supervisor for Thorp Seed Co.

He also was retired after teaching in Wapella schools 31 years, primarily vocational agriculture classes.

He was a past president of both the Wapella and DeWitt County Teachers associations and was named DeWitt County Teacher of the Year in 1970.

Mr. Schettler was chosen a "Master Teacher" and a "Teacher of Teachers" by the Illinois Association of Vocational Agriculture Teachers.

He was a former president of both the IAVAT and the Illinois Vocational Association and also was a two-year member of the Governor's Committee on Vocational Education.

Mr. Schettler led the Lucky-13 4-H Club in Wapella 42 years and received DeWitt County and Illinois 4-H Alumni awards. He was a co-founder and was the first chairman of the DeWitt County 4-H Foundation.

He had been a member of the Presbyterian Church of Clinton since 1947, including service on the church's Board of Deacons, as a Sunday school teacher, and as a member of the Christian Education Committee.

A decorated Army veteran of World War II, he was in the National Guard 31 years and in the Army Reserve. He retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Mr. Schettler was president of both the Wapella Community Club and the Wapella Business and Professional Men's Club and was grand marshal of the town's sesquicentennial celebra-

tion.

He was born July 2, 1917, in Benton, a son of Bruno and Gertrude Fadley Schettler. He married Margaret Kelso on Feb. 7, 1942, in Bloomfield, Mo. She survives.

Also surviving are two sons, Charles Schettler of Springfield, Va., and Thomas Schettler of Virginia Beach, Va.; one daughter, Nancy Sue Stroup of Peoria; two brothers, Robert Schettler of

Red Bud and John Schettler of Rantoul; one sister, Gertrude Gilliam of Edwardsville; three grandchildren; one great-grandchild; two stepgrandchildren; and three stepgrandchildren.

He was preceded in death by three brothers and one sister.

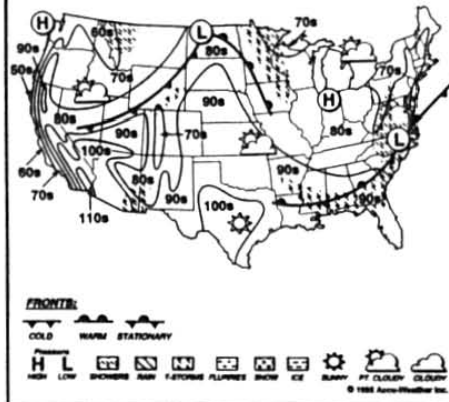

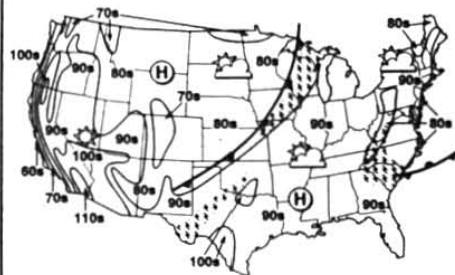

Chicago may lose more Amtrak passenger links

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

CHICAGO — Tight finances are forcing Amtrak to close down four additional well-known passenger routes that run through Chicago.

The moves, tentatively slated for Nov. 10, come on the heels of a series of route closures in the last two years as the national passenger rail system struggles to end money-losing operations.

A formal announcement had not been made, but a railroad source said today the four routes scheduled for closing are:

- The Desert Wind, running three days a week between Chicago and Los Angeles through

Denver, Salt Lake City and Las Vegas.

- The Boston-to-Albany, N.Y., section of the Lake Shore Limited that runs between Chicago and Boston.

- The Pioneer, which operates three times a week between Chicago and Seattle via Denver.

- The Texas Eagle, which runs three times a week between Chicago and San Antonio, Texas.

Congress has tentatively appropriated \$200 million in operating subsidies to Amtrak for fiscal 1997, some \$50 million less than the railroad sought.

EAST ST. LOUIS — Orville Walker Durham used to travel in style, thanks to a little device he used to cheat slot machines.

But the yacht and once-chauveured motor home have been repossessed. And after Durham pleaded guilty Thursday to three federal fraud charges, his next big trip will probably be a bus ride to prison.

Durham, 40, of Broken Arrow, Okla., admitted manufacturing and using a device called a "cheater wire."

The device confuses sensors in slot machines and can cause them to pay up to 10 times more coins than they should.

Authorities say that since 1993, Durham and others used the devices to cheat casinos in Illinois, Missouri, Nevada, Iowa, Mississippi, New Jersey and the Bahamas.

They say Durham also passed on his knowledge, charging \$40,000 and a share of future profits from everyone he taught.

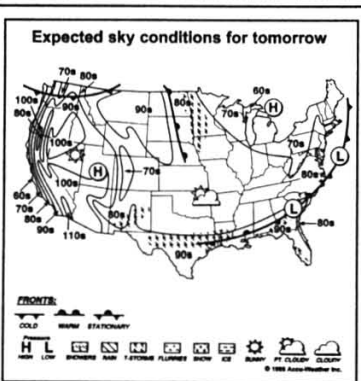

Edgar vetoes legislation regulating charter schools

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. Jim Edgar used his amendatory veto powers Friday to change legislation that he felt threatened the freedom of the state's charter schools.

The General Assembly this year created charter schools to grant more local control over the education process. The schools are run by parents, teachers and community members under a charter free of many state and local regulations.

But religious groups complained to Senate President James "Pate" Philip, R-Wood Dale, that these schools might tap into a federal program, called Goals 2000, which they said did not stress fundamental skills. Some GOP Senators said they could not support charter schools unless restrictions were placed on Goals 2000.

The Senate tacked an amendment onto a House bill to require charter schools to obtain school board approval prior to seeking any state or federal funds. The House also approved the measure.

"By making this requirement so broad, we would undermine the original intent of charter school legislation," Edgar wrote in his veto message.

Edgar urged legislators to limit the law specifically to Goals 2000.

"We'd have to review the message and the action the governor took and his reasoning for

it," said Patty Schuh, a spokeswoman for Philip. The governor also issued an amendatory veto on a bill to increase penalties for the sale of counterfeit merchandise. Edgar said the penalty provisions are confusing and do not contain a requirement for the person to know the items are counterfeit. He also said a requirement allowing police officers to seize items believed to be used in a crime is unconstitutional.

The governor also signed bills that would:

- strengthen the power of the Comptroller's office to oversee cemetery trust funds.

- creates the crime of aggravated intimidation, which applies to street gang members who use intimidation to further the activities of the gang.

- gives courts the option of seeking the deportation of any alien who is convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor rather than providing a jail sentence.

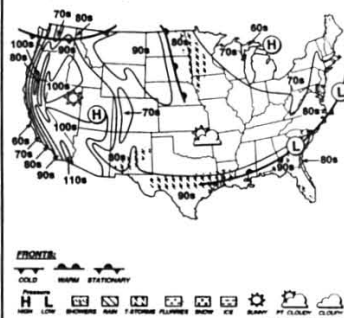

Law would eliminate court supervision for repeat drunk drivers

SPRINGFIELD — Drunk drivers would be eligible for court supervision only once in a lifetime under legislation signed by Gov. Jim Edgar Friday.

Sen. Carl Hawkinson, R-

Galesburg, proposed the measure to change the current law allowing drivers to receive a sentence of court supervision if 10 years have elapsed since a first offense. The law also will prohibit judges from expunging

a DUI offense from a driver's record.



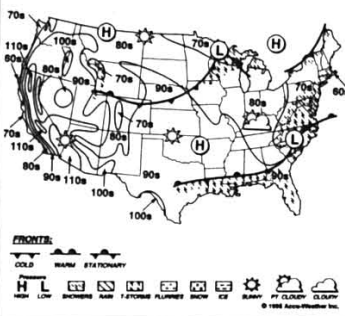

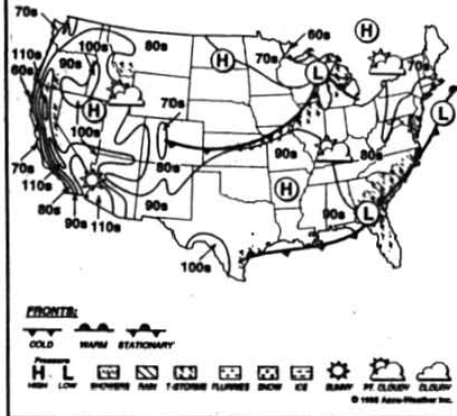

Dole, Kemp 'bringing out best in each other'

SAN DIEGO — Jack Kemp doesn't have any problem playing backup quarterback to Bob Dole as they team up for the race to the White House, Joanne Kemp says.

"He's always been on a team, now he's on Bob Dole's," Kemp's wife Joanne said today on ABC's "Good Morning America."

Kemp also got word today that he won't be blindsided by former presidential contender Pat Buchanan.

"I believe that Jack Kemp and I are going to have some disagreements but they can be postponed until after the election," Buchanan said in a taped interview on NBC's "Today."

Mrs. Kemp said her husband, a former Buffalo Bills quarterback, "is finding it very comfortable to be backup quarterback." Dole and Kemp "seem to be bringing out the best in each other," she said.

Kemp views the chance to work with Dole "an awesome responsibility and a great honor."

His pleasure was evident Tuesday night as an ebullient Jack Kemp soaked up the cheers, tossed toy footballs and generally had a grand old time as he made his first entrance into the convention hall since being named Dole's running mate.

Entering the San Diego Convention Center on Tuesday night, Kemp was greeted by the upbeat sounds of a John Philip Sousa march and thunderous chants of "Dole-Kemp! Dole-Kemp!" He sat between his wife, Joanne, and Elizabeth Dole in the VIP section.

The boisterous entrance projected the kind of energy Kemp hopes will be mirrored tonight as the Republican convention formally nominates Dole and Kemp as the party standard-bearers.

Keynote speaker Susan Molinari, a congresswoman from New York, poked fun at Kemp's reputation as a long-winded speaker as she recounted how she sought Kemp out for advice on her speech.

"He gave me a few suggestions. In fact, he's still giving them. I had to put him on hold just now so I could come out here and give this speech right now," Molinari jibed.

Kemp guffawed for the cameras, then pronounced Molinari's address "one of the greatest keynote speeches of either political party in my lifetime."

Even before his formal nomination, the former National Football League quarterback was trying to fend off some of the tough questions that inevitably come at newly chosen running mates.

In a series of newspaper interviews published today, Kemp defended his decision to follow Dole, the head of the Republican presidential ticket, and endorse an anti-affirmative action proposal in California that he has previously criticized.

He said Dole's tax-cut plan would stimulate the economy and would not require cuts in Medicare and Social Security, as Democrats have charged. And he unequivocally opposed a GOP platform position that would deny U.S. citizenship to children of illegal aliens born in the United States. Dole has yet to decide on that issue.

of Clinton after lagging by more than 20 points in previous polls. Conventions normally give candidates a temporary bounce in popularity.

"I think we're off to a flying start," Illinois Treasurer Judy Baar Topinka commented.

Illinois Attorney General Jim Ryan, another delegate, predicted "we're going to come out of this convention enthusiastic and energized. We're clearly in the hunt. This is going to be a close race."

Even so, the second day of the convention couldn't compare to the first, when former Presidents George Bush and Gerald Ford, Nancy Reagan and Powell built the evening into what delegates described as an emotional crescendo.

Yet Tuesday's session did give Gov. Jim Edgar, a national chairman of Dole's campaign, his 10 minutes in the spotlight when he spoke to the convention on small business.

One of a handful of governors asked to speak at the convention, Edgar said if Dole is elected president "we will accomplish on a national level what Republicans have been doing in statehouses throughout this nation."

U.S. Rep. Susan Molinari of New York followed Edgar with a keynote address denouncing Clinton.

"We know people are having trouble just staying afloat, and it's easy to see why. Bill Clinton passed the largest tax increase in history and now Americans pay almost 40 cents of every dollar they earn in taxes, the most ever," said the buoyant Molinari, a 38-year-old moderate

who campaign officials hope will attract women to the ticket.

Edgar trumpeted his efforts to free up the environment for business growth.

"We downsized government. We cut taxes. We overhauled laws that enriched a few lawsuit-happy lawyers at the expense of small businesses in our state," he said amid cheers and poster waving from the Illinois delegation.

Charging Clinton with strangling business opportunities, Edgar said Dole's plan to cut income and capital gains taxes will "put money back in the hands of people who own small businesses."

Molinari, a supporter of abortion rights and the Clinton-backed family leave law, stressed the impact of Dole's proposed tax cuts on average Americans.

"It's a plan for a single mother with two kids in Detroit who's trying to pay her bills and pay for child care, too. She'll get \$1,000 (two \$500 per child tax credits)," Molinari said.

The congresswoman added that a grandmother would benefit from Dole's proposed repeal of a tax hike on Social Security benefits passed under Clinton. She said a young couple trying to buy their first home would enjoy lower interest rates and mortgage payments thanks to the Dole plan.

Edgar introduced Barbara Williams, a Gettysburg, Pa., restaurant owner who complained about federal environmental regulations.

He also introduced two video clips of business owners complaining about the federal bureaucracy interfering with their enterprises.

Board of Trade
CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybean futures prices dipped again this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade amid predictions that hot Midwestern temperatures should help crops through the end of August.
Normal to above-normal temperatures should push crops to maturity. The private forecasts could not come at a better time.
Soybean: progress slightly lags the norm, according to weekly crop reports that the Agriculture Department released late Monday. Only 80 percent of soybeans in Illinois — the top producing state — are blooming, compared with the 95-percent average for this time of year. The entire soybean crop fares slightly better, with 91 percent of plants blooming, compared with the 93-percent average.
Corn plants also need heat to help them reproduce. USDA figures indicate only 95 percent of plants are silking, compared with the 97-percent average.

Chicago (AP) — Corn and soybean futures prices have fallen since Thursday on views weather will cooperate with farmers. Good growing forecasts would be a departure from the summer, which has seen below-normal temperatures for most of the season.

Wheat futures also fell because it looks like frost will rattle Canadian prairie grain, according to the National Weather Service. Prices always fall during harvest, and this year's schedule wheat harvest is progressing ahead of schedule, according to USDA figures.

Soybeans for November delivery fell 1 cent to \$7.70 a bushel; December corn fell 2 1/4 cents to \$3.39 a bushel; December wheat fell 2 1/2 cents to \$4.62 a bushel; December oats were unchanged at \$1.94 1/4 a bushel.
Livestock prices were mostly lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
Live hogs for October delivery fell .95 cent to \$4.10 cents a pound on views that supplies were adequate; February frozen pork bellies fell .42 cents to 82.60 cents a pound on follow-through selling from Monday; October feeder cattle fell .02 cent to 83.85 cents a pound; October live cattle rose .03 cent to 71.40 cents a pound.

Madison judge hides while police hunt murder suspect

EDWARDSVILLE — A Madison County judge has gone into hiding at the urging of police who fear a suspect in the killing of a lawyer may also harm the judge.

Associate Judge Ann Callis Rongey, 31, of Troy is on a leave of absence at an undisclosed location while police continue their search for accused killer Kelly Lee McGinnis, 40, of Greenville.

McGinnis was charged last week with gunning down City Attorney Thomas Meyer on Aug. 12. Meyer represented McGinnis' ex-wife in a bitter divorce and child-custody case.

Chief Circuit Judge Nicholas G. Byron said Tuesday that taking such extreme measures to protect a judge was unprecedented in Madison County. But he said detectives from the St.


Louis Metropolitan Major Case Squad recommended that Rongey leave the area until McGinnis was found.


Byron said police feared that Rongey could be a target because she ruled against McGinnis, awarding custody of his two children to his ex-wife over his objections.

Col. Robert G. Lowery, commander of the Major Case Squad, said his officers decided "it was in (Rongey's) best interests to be in seclusion."

McGinnis' lawyer, Larry LeFevre of Vandalia, said he also had taken security precautions at the urging of authorities.

He said McGinnis had accused him and Meyer of being "in cahoots," which LeFevre said could not be further from the truth.

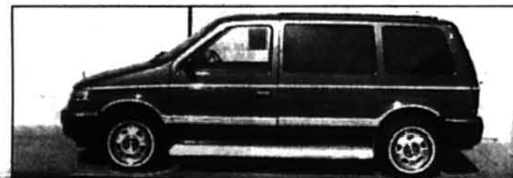

Few smiles or sparks in Curran-LaHood debate

PEORIA HEIGHTS — Incumbent U.S. Rep. Ray LaHood, R-Peoria, emphasized "balance and common sense" in environmental regulation, but pledged to work with everyone to save the Peoria Lakes from siltation. That's the top environmental issue in the area, he said.

Democratic challenger Mike Curran of Springfield accused greedy corporations of degrading the environment and said the nation should save its endangered species. "That's a clear distinction between LaHood and Curran," he said.

Despite some lively rhetoric, a Wednesday night debate by the two candidates on environmental issues, sponsored by the Heart of Illinois Sierra Club at Forest Park Nature Center, drew no laughter or applause from a tense but somber standing-room-only crowd.

A question from the audience brought an emotional moment when Stan Valentine of East Peoria said, "My daughter is a Saint Jude patient. Central Illinois and Louisiana have huge cancer clusters. People think it's polluted water in the area." What should be done? he asked.

Curran responded, "we need to be sure we do everything we can to clean our water." Then with a slap at LaHood, he added, just because a bad bill has bipartisan support doesn't mean it should be adopted. "That's rubbish."

LaHood earlier had explained some of his votes criticized by national groups as anti-environmental by saying they had bipartisan support.

In responding to Valentine's question, LaHood said, "I'm committed to clean water and to making sure the Illinois River is cleaned up. I drink the water. I'm a lifelong resident."

Regarding the reauthorization of the Clean Water Act, "Special interest lobbyists sought and got the Dirty Water Bill," Curran said. Describing it as "a bad bill," he said the measure would allow more industrial and sewage discharges and weaken wetlands protection.

LaHood voted for the measure, which passed the House but stalled in the Senate, and probably will be reconsidered next year.

LaHood said the bill would provide "flexibility to state and local governments rather than have everything dictated by

Washington, D.C." It would bring "balance and common sense" to environmental regulation, he said.

The two candidates agreed on some environmental issues. They would both:

— Vote against transferring National Parks and federal lands to the states or other governmental bodies.

— Vote to repeal the 1872 federal mining law that allows mining on federal lands without payment of royalties.

— Discourage the use of tobacco, especially by youth.

But they differed on other issues. LaHood defended his vote for the salvage logging rider, saying the president and Congress developed it as a compromise measure for jobs and the environment.

Curran said the bill was "a big mistake, an excuse to log ancient forests," and another example of "corporate welfare" which costs taxpayers money and degrades the environment.

Curran would vote to reauthorize the Endangered Species Act. The flawed ESA bill that LaHood has co-sponsored would no longer protect marine species and has other problems, he said.

LaHood said a bipartisan task

force is studying what to do about this issue. "I will support a bill that brings common sense and balance to the laws we have," he said, so the legislation does not cause loss of jobs.

LaHood also would consider allowing oil drilling in the Arctic Wildlife Refuge, though he said he also voted against one measure that would permit it.

Curran, LaHood said, "would be a 100 percent rubber stamp for the Sierra Club. I'm going to look at the issues from a balanced point of view."

"I'm unalterably opposed to oil drilling in the refuge. We don't need that kind of problem in one of the most beautiful places left on earth," Curran said.

When an audience member asked a lengthy question concerning "corporate polluters like Cat (Caterpillar) and ADM," LaHood responded, "if you would have your way you would shut these companies down." These companies have spent millions on scrubbers and other ways to reduce pollution, he added.

Curran said, "people who do the polluting support the candidates. It comes down to money talking."

found to be arbitrary or unreasonable.

In fact, the appellate court said it found it "difficult to improve upon the trial court's thoughtful written order" on the issue and quoted it in its entirety.

In that order, Dozier said the past allegation could not be used as evidence because the situation in the 1986 case was too different from the more recent incident. Prosecutors are permitted to use past examples of "bad acts" only if the situations have common threads that might prove a defendant intentionally repeated a similar crime.

Otherwise, a jury is more likely to convict someone — not based solely on the facts of the case before it — but based on the person's history of committing "bad acts," Dozier said.

In the 1995 case, Miner's alleged motive for pushing the LDC resident was that he was frustrated with the person for walking too slowly. Miner says the resident's fall was an accident in which the victim tripped over another person's foot.

The mentally handicapped man required stitches to his forehead.

In the 1986 incident, Miner allegedly refused his supervisor's direct order to watch a res-

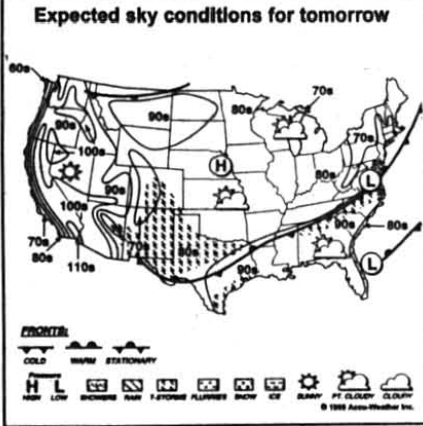

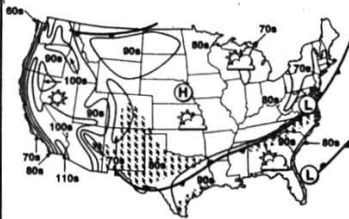

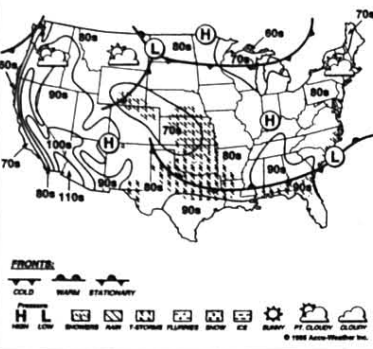

Feds deny reaching plea deal with former ADM executive

Former Archer Daniels Midland Co. executive Mark Whitacre has agreed to plead guilty to tax evasion and investor fraud charges, a source close to the case says.

But a Justice Department source said Wednesday no formal agreement has been reached.

Whitacre, the former head of ADM's BioProducts division, worked undercover for the FBI

during a price-fixing probe. A source close to the case said Tuesday that Whitacre had agreed to plead guilty to the tax and fraud charges and would be sentenced after other defendants in the price-fixing case.

But a Justice Department official speaking on condition of anonymity Wednesday said government lawyers talked with Whitacre's lawyers last week but did not reach a formal agreement.

The tax and fraud case would stem from about \$9 million of ADM money funneled into Whitacre's bank accounts in Switzerland and the Cayman Islands.

ADM fired Whitacre after his role in the FBI probe was revealed last summer, accusing him of stealing the money. The company is suing Whitacre in a Swiss court to recover some of the funds.

Whitacre has said the payments were under-the-table com-

pensation ADM often gave its top executives.

Authorities are investigating allegations the grain processor plotted to fix prices on high-fructose corn syrup, citric acid and the livestock feed additive lysine. The Justice Department also is investigating possible criminal fraud by company executives.

ADM's three competitors in the lysine market and three ex-

ecutives all agreed to plead guilty Tuesday to price fixing in the \$600 million feed additive market.

The companies agreed to pay fines of more than \$20 million.

ADM has not been charged, and company spokesman Roy Erickson declined comment Wednesday.

ALMH using network for updates

Through the use of "Grateful Med," an on-line computer network, Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital may obtain information on recent medical developments more efficiently and at a greatly reduced cost.

Developed by the National Library of Medicine, the world's largest biomedical research library, the network allows users to search topics from more than 40 databases at the NLM.

Southern Illinois University School of Medicine has contracted to participate in the network. A typical search results in brief summaries of articles and papers with their sources listed.

ALMH hospital librarian Judith Gordon calls the network "a wonderful service," explaining the hospital taps into the NLM network via modem and a local call to the SIU School of Medicine.

More than 3,600 journals each year can be referenced, she said.

A companion program, the "Loansome Doc," offers users electronic document ordering capabilities. If the journal in which the article appears is not available, the article may be ordered through this program. The article initially is sent to SIU, where it becomes available to the user.

"We have had physicians,

nurse managers and pharmacists utilize this service and they love it," Gordon said. A search costs about \$2 and a requested article cost \$8.

"Before we were subscribing to medical journals for the library but frequently still had to request articles through the interlibrary loan program. This will save us time, money and library space," she said.

The NLM created "Grateful Med" with the rural hospital in mind. As a result, rural hospitals can obtain current medical information at a fraction of the cost and with far less storage space required.

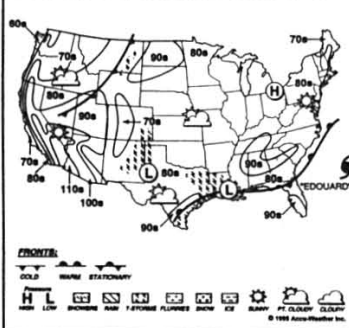
