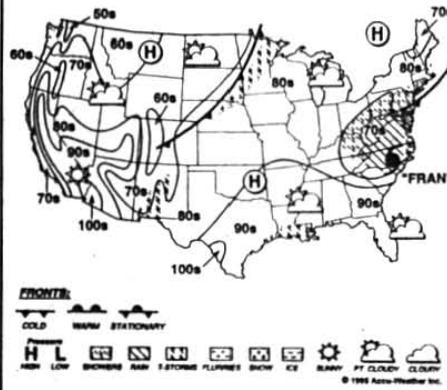

CHICAGO — The son of imprisoned gang leader Jeff Fort pleaded innocent to an eight-count indictment on drug-conspiracy charges.

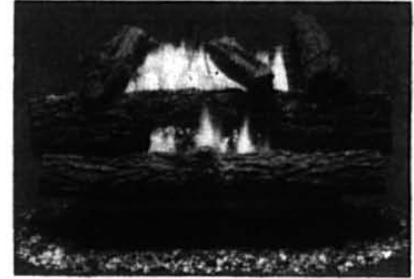
Watkeeta Valenzuela, 26, was charged in federal court Wednesday with heading a cocaine ring on Chicago's South Side starting no later than August 1991 and continuing until at least February 1992.

Valenzuela also was accused of using people as young as 14 in drug distribution and of distributing crack cocaine within 1,000 feet of a school, according to U.S. Attorney Jim Burns.

He faces a minimum 20-year prison term if convicted, Burns said.

Also charged was Albert Valenzuela, Watkeeta's cousin, who remains at large, and Bushon Funches, 24, who was arrested Wednesday in Ohio.

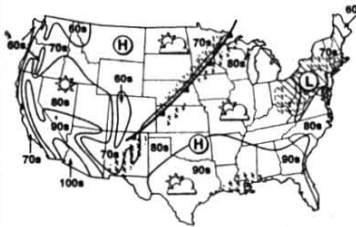

1. Upon all taxable property within the corporate limits of this fire protection district the total sum of FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND NINETY-SEVEN DOLLARS (\$48,097), or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, hereby is levied, divided in separate funds as follows:

The purpose of this Tax Levy Ordinance is to defray all the necessary expenses and liabilities [Ch. 127 1/2 § 34] of this fire protection district for its Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year beginning June 15, 1996 and ending May 31, 1997, a copy of which is attached hereto, incorporated by reference into and expressly made part of this Tax Levy Ordinance as pages 2 and 3 hereof.

3. The tax assessed, appropriated and levied shall be collected by the officer designated by statute to collect State and County taxes. The tax shall be paid by that collecting officer to the Middletown Fire Protection District's Treasurer.

4. The Secretary of this fire protection district shall file with both the Logan and Menard County Clerks a duly certified copy of this Ordinance, Ch. 127 1/2 § 34, 70 ILCS 705/14.

5. This 1996 Tax Levy Ordinance shall be published in the Courier, a newspaper of general circulation within the district's territory. This ordinance shall take effect ten days after it is so published. Ch. 127 1/2 § 27.

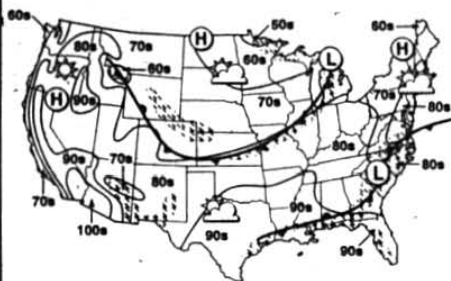

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean and corn futures prices rose this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade after a government report showed crop conditions did not improve last week.

Soybean plants deteriorated slightly, according to the Agriculture Department's weekly crop condition report released late Monday.

The USDA report said corn crops overall remained in the same condition as last week but that maturity lags in the chief growing areas of the eastern Corn Belt. Illinois corn is 8 percent mature compared with 16 percent a year ago; Iowa is 4 percent mature compared with last year's 20 percent; Michigan and Ohio have not matured at all.

Gains were tempered on a favorable weather outlook for mild to warm weather across the Midwest through early next week. Wheat futures gained, despite a spring wheat harvest that is bounding ahead of schedule.

Trade was slow as investors await Wednesday's USDA crop production and supply and demand reports.

Soybeans for November delivery rose 4 1/4 cents to \$7.98 a bushel; December corn rose 1 1/4 cents to \$3.32 1/4 a bushel; December wheat rose 1 1/4 cents to \$4.50 a bushel; December oats rose 1 1/4 cents to \$1.83 1/2 a bushel.

Frozen pork bellies prices slid to a 10-week low on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, and most other livestock futures fell as well.

February pork bellies fell .75 cent to 75.90 cents a pound; October live hogs rose .02 cent to 53.82 cents a pound; October feeder cattle fell .35 cent to 63.90 cents a pound, and October live cattle gained .22 cent to 72.22 cents a pound.

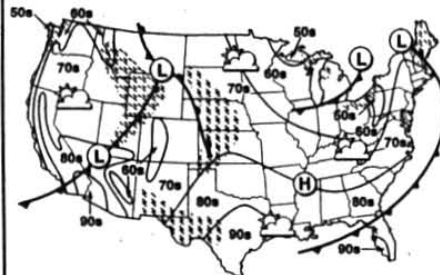

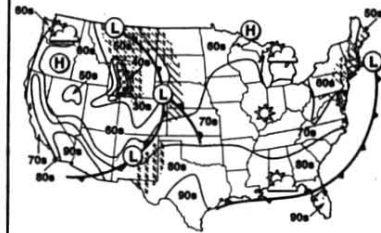

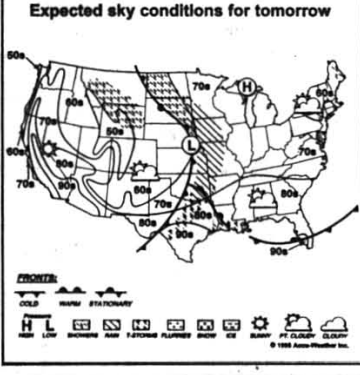

October live cattle fell .05 cent to 72.95 cents a pound; October feeder cattle rose .13 cent to 65.05 cents a pound; October live hogs rose .28 cent to 54.90 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies rose 1.47 cents to 78.02 cents a pound.

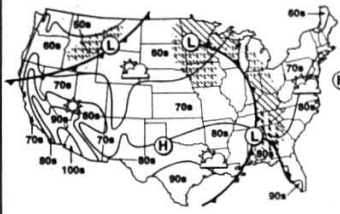

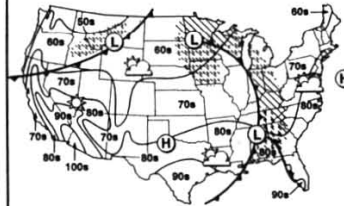

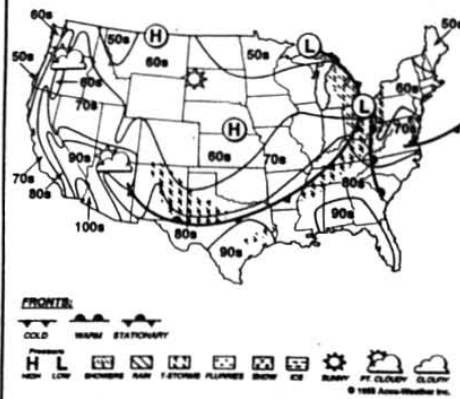

48 percent. The condition of the nation's corn crop fell, but only marginally.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1 cent to \$4.25 1/4 a bushel; December corn fell 2 1/4 cents to \$3.10 1/4 a bushel; December oats fell 1/4 cent to \$1.66 a bushel; November soybeans fell 8 1/4 cents to \$7.90 a bushel.

**Fed taking look at raising rates at meeting today**

WASHINGTON — With unemployment at a seven-year low and the economy still robust, many analysts believe the Federal Reserve is ready to boost interest rates to head off inflation.

President Clinton, who has based his re-election effort in part on the strong economy, refused to comment today on the likelihood of a Fed rate hike but GOP vice presidential nominee Jack Kemp was not so reticent.

"I'm going to bang on the Fed today if they raise interest rates," Kemp said over coffee with seven workers from the American Seating Co. in Grand Rapids, Mich., where he was campaigning.

"Interest rates don't need to go up. The economy's not overheated," he said.

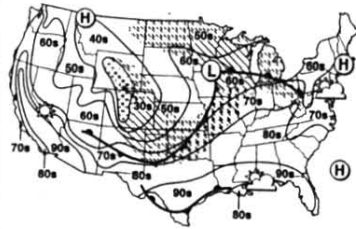

Corn and soybeans rose amid mounting delays in harvesting because of cold and rainy weather. The National Weather Service is predicting the pattern will remain over much of the Midwest for the next 10 days. That may give farmers little time to get into the fields before the first damaging frost arrives in October.

Wheat futures opened lower on profit-taking from higher prices this week. The prospects for rain helped limit the fall, however, since winter wheat planting is slightly behind schedule.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1 1/2 cents to \$4.28 a bushel; December corn rose 1 1/2 cents to \$3.12 a bushel; December oats rose 3/4 cent to \$1.68 1/2 a bushel; November soybeans rose 1/4 cent to \$7.93 a bushel.

Live cattle futures advanced, while feeder cattle and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle rose .28 cent to 73 cents a pound; October feeder cattle rose .07 cent to 83.67 cents a pound; October live hogs fell .12 cent to 57.10 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies rose .80 cent to 78.30 cents a pound.

**Wall Street at noon**

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were mostly higher at midday, led by technology shares, as bonds continued to improve after the Federal Reserve's decision Tuesday not to raise interest rates.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 4.07 at 5,869.96, having slipped from an early 21-point gain.

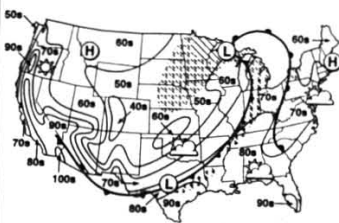
