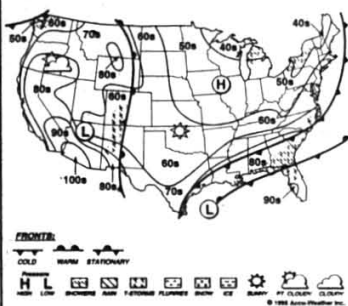

Officer attends environmental crimes workshop

Lincoln Police officer Tim Kerns recently attended a training session on identifying and prosecution environmental crimes.

The series of three training seminars were conducted by the Illinois Attorney General's Environmental Crimes Investigator's Network. Kerns was one of more than 450 Illinois law enforcement officers who received the seminar training.

The network helps those in law enforcement identify and investigate environmental crimes, while instructing attorneys how to prosecute the cases.

"Far too many environmental crimes go undetected," Attorney General Jim Ryan said. "The Environmental Crimes Investigator's Network allows us to tap into the ranks of Illinois law en-

forcement to make sure that those who pollute our water or dirty our air get punished without creating a cumbersome bureaucracy."

Participants reviewed environmental criminal statutes, state resources available to assist local law enforcement and the criteria that determine whether a

violation should be charged criminally or in civil court.

The training also detailed the chronological sequence of events, from detection to trial, of a prosecution. Trainees reviewed a series of case studies of successful environmental crimes prosecution as well.

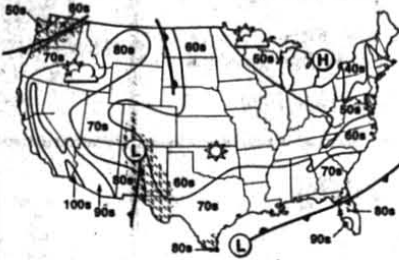

found running Friday night about 40 miles from the lake on Interstate 72 north of Decatur.

"This is complicated because of logistics," Morgan said. "We're doing what we can."

A helicopter was dispatched Thursday to fly over the banks of Lake Shelbyville. Investigators were hoping to spot more evidence.

On Wednesday, police said they had determined that Slover was probably killed in an area with high grass and gravel.

Officials said Thursday they are asking landowners along I-72 to search their property for clues.

Swann, along with Slover's ex-boyfriend and ex-husband, have taken lie-detector tests. Morgan said Thursday results from those tests have not been returned.

Also, results from a coroner's autopsy were not yet available.

Meanwhile, people in Decatur are beginning to wonder if they are in danger.

"They say it's not a serial killer because they think the victim might have known her (Slover)," said Pearl Johns, sipping a soft drink in a Decatur fast-food restaurant Thursday. "People I know here are wondering. It's not safe, maybe, if that person is still out there."

During the press conference, Morgan said investigators aren't ruling out the possibility that a stranger might have committed the murder.

"No one is clear yet," he said.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were in record territory at midday after being bolstered by a new unemployment rate report that showed the economy is slowing.
At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 35.78 at 5,968.83. Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 12-to-5 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 224.56 million shares, up from Thursday's early pace. Broad-market indexes were higher.
The Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 7.12 at 699.90, and the NYSE composite index was up 3.41 at 373.55. Both measures, which are dominated by blue-chip and other large companies, closed at record highs on Wednesday.
The Nasdaq composite index was up 10.88 at 1,243.97, and the American Stock Exchange's market value index was up 5.16 at 577.76.
Financial markets moved higher after the Labor Department reported that payroll employment fell by 40,000 last month while the jobless rate rose from a seven-year low of 5.1 percent in August.
The report offered the clearest evidence yet that the economy is slowing.

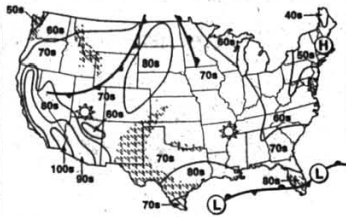

GOP not depending on Dole's presidential pull

SPRINGFIELD — Republican strategists say the GOP's quest to retain control of the Illinois General Assembly should hinge on the record it etched over the past two years, not the popularity of Bob Dole, the party's presidential nominee.

"When you get down to legislative races, Republicans have a strong record to run on since 1994, and that legislative record is what is worth talking about," said John McGovern, a spokesman for state Republican Chairman Harold Smith.

Even if they wanted to, Republican candidates in state races can't count — at least for now — on getting a boost from Dole who is trailing President Clinton by 21 percentage points a month ago.

"It mystifies me, but, you know the polls keep showing that. And I don't understand why he's leading across the nation," said Gov. James Edgar, a national co-chair of the Dole campaign. "Character, which I

think is an important factor, so far hasn't played that much in the determination."

Democrat Neil Hartigan, a former Illinois attorney general who served as a national co-chair for President Clinton's 1992 campaign, said Republicans have been pounding Dick Durbin, the Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, in an effort to prevent Clinton's momentum from carrying over to congressional and legislative races.

"When you have the possibility of people riding on his coat-tails, then you have to break the ticket. And the way to do that is break it at the office right after the president," Hartigan said.

Hillary Rodham Clinton is from Park Ridge, which means Clinton has personal ties to the state. Republicans and Democrats also say Clinton's administration contains a fair number of Illinoisans, and he got a boost from the Democratic convention being held in Chicago.

Even in Southern Illinois it raised a lot of enthusiasm,"

Hartigan said.

Ed Murnane, a senior strategist for Dole in Illinois, says despite Clinton's lead, Republicans can stand on the record of the GOP-controlled Illinois Legislature, which passed laws that overhauled welfare, civil law and education.

"People don't vote that way," responded Sen. Patrick Welch, D-Peru, a Democratic state central committee member. "It's wishful thinking on the part of Republicans."

Many people don't even know who their legislators are, he said.

"If they don't know who they are, they're not going to know their record," Welch said. And in that case, people vote along party lines, he said. "Basically, individuals believe that as the top of the ticket believes so too do those lower in the ticket."

Ross Perot doesn't have the impact that he did in the 1992 race, but that doesn't mean he won't be a factor.

Cattle vaccine suit barred anew

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court today refused to revive an Illinois farm company's lawsuit over cattle vaccines it said did not work.

The court, without comment, turned down the farm owners' argument that they were entitled to sue the vaccine's manufacturer under state law even though the vaccine was federally licensed.

Lymbrook Farms of Williamsfield, Ill., used cattle vaccines in 1992 to prevent various diseases, but a number of the cattle later became sick and died or had to be sold.

Lymbrook sued the vaccine's manufacturer, SmithKline Beecham of Philadelphia, saying the vaccines either were unsafe or did not work.

A federal judge in Peoria granted judgment to SmithKline.

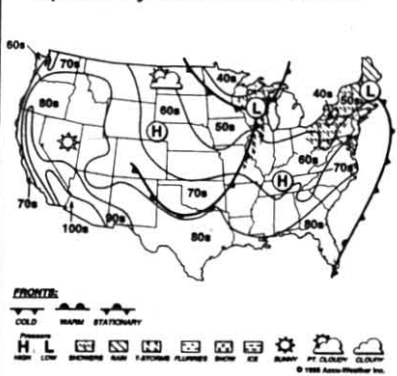

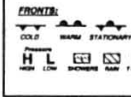
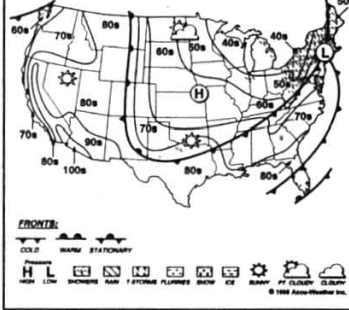

tioning ongoing negotiations with Land O'Lakes by the attorney general's office and recently proposed legislation calling for a moratorium on all livestock construction.

The citizens' lawsuit against the EPA led to the attorney general's involvement, and the group began seeking the moratorium from Cass County Rep. Rich Myers, R-Colchester, last spring.

"We're still hoping to have something accomplished," Thurman said.

Nagle said Land O'Lakes officials are "obviously pleased" with the ruling.

"We feel it was the correct action to take and we'll proceed from here," he said.

Nagle said the company is waiting for a final response from the attorney general's office on its latest proposals for addressing concerns at the Cass County sites. The environmental precautions include synthetic liners in manure storage lagoons, as well as the recent agreement to install monitoring wells to serve as an early warning of leaching or

contamination, among others.

Residents say the Cass County area is unsuitable for large-scale livestock production because of the sometimes sandy soils and high water table. The striking of groundwater during lagoon construction at one Land O'Lakes site prompted the legislature to pass a resolution directing the attorney general to consider halting construction there until concerns were addressed.

In addition to groundwater concerns, residents say they fear the odor, impact on property values and potential health risks from the facilities.

Officials at the state EPA declined to comment Wednesday on Cadagin's ruling because of the possibility it could be appealed.

U.S. Army Environmental Center, processed 13,000 pounds of TNT-contaminated soil.

Other compounds were tried, but then researchers noticed that molasses contains many of the same ingredients that encourage the growth of TNT-eating organisms — ordinary bacteria found in most back yards around the state.


So researchers tried molasses — not the kind found on grocery's shelves but agricultural grade, which farmers use to enhance livestock feed.

The molasses eliminated all except minor traces of TNT in the Joliet soil that was tested.

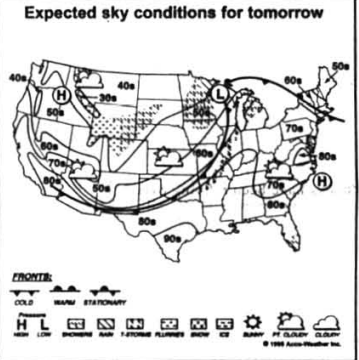

Legislative candidates sign gambling moratorium pledge

SPRINGFIELD — Seventy-five legislative candidates have signed a pledge to support a total moratorium on the expansion of gambling in Illinois until residents are given a chance to express their views in a statewide referendum on gambling.

The Illinois Church Action on Alcohol Problems has been supporting a statewide referendum on gambling issues. The organization along with some lawmakers have asked the General Assembly to approve a resolution calling for a statewide referendum on the expansion of gambling.

"We want people to ask candidates about their views on gambling before voting," said Anita Bedell, Executive Director of ILLCAAP.

Gov. Jim Edgar also recently suggested that voters might want to inquire about legislative candidate's views on gambling because he feels it will come up in the veto session next month, she said.

"In order to avoid a 'fall surprise', we sent two mailings to all legislative candidates, asking them to publicly state their position on the expansion of gambling," Bedell said.

"There is little popular support for the expansion of gambling in Illinois," she added.

A statewide poll conducted by the Copley News Service showed that 66 percent of Illinois voters were opposed to the expansion of riverboat casinos, Bedell maintained.

She also referred to recent newspaper accounts that a "casino deal" being led by former Gov. Jim Thompson was being developed for the legislative veto session set for November and December.

The "casino deal" is an attempt to sidestep a vote of the people, Bedell added.

Bedell also urged legislators to wait until appointments have been made to the National Gambling Impact and Policy Commission and its report that will be made after hearings before considering expanding gambling in Illinois.



Young felon promises judge he'll be good

PEKIN — A 6-year-old Washington boy who admitted he helped cause more than \$10,000 in damage at a neighbor's home carefully signed court papers Friday, then nodded as a judge asked him, "Can you be good for two years? For the rest of your life?"

After the boy admitted to damaging the property April 20 when he was 5 and no one was home, Associate Judge Thomas Ebel put the boy on two years of court supervision. The 50-pound boy, at age 5, was the youngest person ever criminally charged in Tazewell County, and legal experts believe he may be one of the youngest children ever charged in the United States.

The first-grader's attorney labeled the conduct as mischief and criticized the county's top prosecutor for traumatizing the boy by forcing the case to be decided in court. But attorney Spencer Daniels of Peoria also said he was pleased with the settlement.

"Most children do destroy things at this age — ask any mother of a 4- or 5-year-old," Daniels said outside the courtroom, adding that the boy hasn't been a "behavior problem" at school and was too young to realize his conduct would land him in court.

"Kids do things," Daniels

said. "Consequences to children at this age are different than to teen-agers."

Tazewell County State's Attorney Stewart Umholtz responded: "This was precisely the outcome we wanted from the beginning with this case. This was not mischief. This was a malicious criminal act. There should be consequences. We're not interested in labeling this kid as a delinquent."

The ruling, which resulted from a plea bargain between the boy's family and Umholtz, ended a precedent-setting case in a county that is struggling with the nationwide trend of growing numbers of juvenile offenders 12 and younger.

The 6-year-old, a meek-looking boy with closely cropped blond hair who wore gym shoes, a pair of Navy-blue sweatpants and a striped shirt, fidgeted and played with his parents outside the courtroom.

He didn't say a word once inside.

He and a 9-year-old Washington boy, who was 8 at the time of the crime, have admitted causing the damage. The boys allegedly broke a window during the day to enter the neighbor's house, then microwaved a telephone, smashed furniture, flooded the place with water and stole a few dollars. The 6-year-old was visiting the other boy at the time, Daniels said.

Umholtz, who believed the boys were equally responsible, originally charged each in juvenile court with residential burglary, criminal damage to property and theft. As in the 9-year-old's case, resolved in the same way Oct. 3, Umholtz decided to drop the burglary and theft charges.

Because of their ages, prison wasn't an option, but they could have been removed from their homes or put on formal probation. Umholtz said he believes both families began to take their sons' conduct more seriously after he filed criminal charges.

The decision to put the 6-year-old on court supervision means his previously spotless juvenile record will be wiped clean if he stays out of trouble for two years.

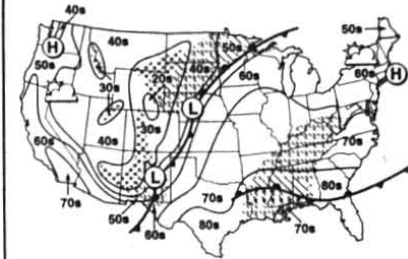

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS BELLEVILLE — A group called the Murder Squad is hiring itself out, often to gangs, to beat and shoot people in the Metro East, federal authorities say.

Apparently, they're claiming to be an enforcer for all gangs," said Terry Delaney, U.S. marshal for the southern district of Illinois.

A police safety notice faxed to at least one area police department Monday, and obtained by

the Belleville News-Democrat, warns officers to beware of the group, the newspaper reported today.

The notice says the group has 35 to 40 members, including former hit men and enforcers from the Gangster Disciples, Vice Lords and Metros gangs. It is based in Centerville and has been linked to four killings in Centerville, Washington Park and East St. Louis and may be involved in at least three other area shootings, the notice says.

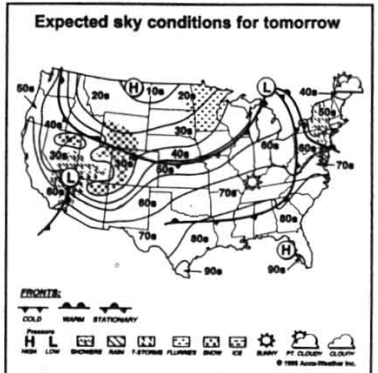

McCann's property. Gordon McCann, Burgrabe said, is already under a 90-day jail sentence based on his convictions for violating city zoning laws in 1994. Those violations relate to junk and refuse piled up at the Second Street property. McCann has spent several months filing unsuccessful appeals of his case, which now is pending before the Illinois Supreme Court.

Burgrabe said the city formally notified the McCanns that the vehicles, which the attorney described as inoperable, were in violation of city ordinance.

He said both city and state law allows municipal authorities to tow the vehicles if they aren't removed within seven days of the date the notice was issued.

In other business during Tuesday's council workshop: ■ Bids for a clothes washer and dryer for the fire department were opened, but aldermen were less than thrilled with the dollar amounts.

The bids were sought after Fire Chief Bill Haak presented an \$11,000 quote for the laundry set from a Chicago-area firm several weeks ago.

Bidders offered prices for the set and its installation in the \$9,000-to-\$10,000 range.

Aldermen instructed Haak to obtain quotes from local laundries on their charges for washing firefighters' clothing that has been blood-stained on emergency calls.

Haak said the federal Occupational Health and Safety Administration requires the city to clean work uniforms and clothing that potentially carry blood-borne pathogens.

■ In another bid opening, aldermen discovered a rarity — two proposals with the same price.

R.A. Cullinan of Tremont and

Merrill Contractors of Springfield submitted \$53,000 proposals to resurface part of Broadway Street.

Burgrabe will research state law on the matter before the council's street committee meets next week to formulate a recommendation on the bids.

■ The council opened bids on the court-sanctioned demolition of an old Stetson China Co. warehouse off North Kickapoo Street.

The property is owned by Lincoln real estate agent and businessman Mason House, who has been in a legal fight over the condition of the property for several years.

The city has obtained a court order deeming the warehouse unsafe and giving the city permission to tear it down.

Low bidder V. Goodman Transfer of Lincoln failed to submit a bid bond with his proposal, an omission that voids his \$14,740 bid.

Two other proposals submitted on the demolition project were substantially higher — \$28,000 and \$38,000.

Burgrabe suggested the council may want to reject all bids and allow the low bidder to re-submit his proposal with the required bond. Other bidders may also lower the price tag of their proposals, he said.

■ City engineer Dennis Hartman said he will ask the council next week to approve a proposal for a company to conduct lead-paint testing on downtown buildings enrolled in a grant-funded renovation project.

The proposal carries a \$2,700 cost ceiling, Hartman said.

Test results would provide a basis for a new round of bidding for the project, which includes facade renovations of about 40 downtown storefronts.

Original bids, opened earlier this month, were significantly higher than estimated costs, in part because of the unknown amount of lead-paint abatement work.

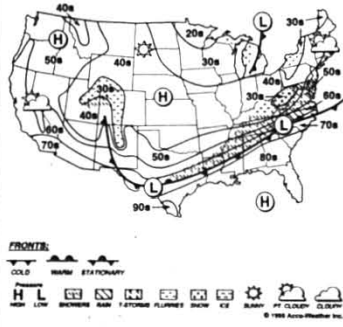
