



Powdered yogurt gets Chicagoans in trouble

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Two Chicago men were arrested on cocaine trafficking charges after police couldn't believe a white substance the men had was yogurt and a drug-sniffing dog appeared to confirm their suspicions.

But Fadel Salem, 21, and Mohammad Khalid, 18, were freed from jail Saturday night after the Kentucky State Police crime lab confirmed the fist-sized chunks of white substance packed in plastic wasn't cocaine. The men, of Palestinian descent, had contended all along that the substance was dried yogurt, a common food in that part of the world.

Wendy Evans, Jefferson County police spokeswoman, said she had not been told officially that the substance found in the men's car was yogurt, but the crime lab had notified county police that it wasn't cocaine or any other controlled substance.

She called the men's two nights in jail unfortunate. "We don't want anyone in jail that shouldn't be," she said. The men were stopped Thursday night after police clocked their car going 103 mph on Interstate 65 south of Louisville.

Salem, an electronics dealer, had dozens of car stereos, cameras and pieces of electronic equipment in the car.

A dog trained to sniff cocaine "hit" on the package of white stuff several times, Evans said. Khalid is a U.S. citizen, and Salem is a legal resident.

Salem was charged with misdemeanor speeding and reckless driving in addition to the drug charge.

Evans said police tried to act quickly to get the men out of jail after the drug test results came in.

She said arresting officer Keith Barnett went to court himself Saturday to ask that a hearing on their \$100,000 cash bond hearing be moved up to today. It had been scheduled for Nov. 11.

But the men got more immediate relief when Jefferson District Judge Stephen P. Ryan ordered the men released on their own recognizance, said Dalal Jarad, a Chicago attorney who represents Salem.

Gambling fight leads to murder in Champaign



Man earlier convicted of killing cop is released after new verdict

JOLIET — A man charged with murdering a Joliet policeman in 1984 walked out of prison early today after being convicted on a lesser charge of involuntary manslaughter.

An instruction to a previous jury that it could not convict Manuel Salazar of a crime less than first-degree murder prompted the Illinois Supreme Court to overturn his first conviction.

The jury in his second trial deliberated more than eight hours before returning the verdict about 12:45 a.m., said Lisa

Morel Las, a spokeswoman for the Will County state's attorney's office.

Sentencing was scheduled for Dec. 20.

But Salazar was released after posting 10 percent of a \$10,000 bond early this morning, Will County Sheriff's Sgt. Nathaniel Romeo said.

And Ms. Morel Las said Salazar cannot serve any more time in prison because the sentence for involuntary manslaughter is five years and he has been in prison since 1985.

in so-called in-kind contributions, such as paying for printing or mailing costs, or for production of a campaign commercial.

Interest groups are giving more money in part because the basic cost of campaigning keeps going up.

"When I took over at ITLA, you could give (candidates) a thousand bucks and they'd be very happy," said James Collins, executive director of the Illinois Trial Lawyers Association. "Now with the advent of cable TV, advertising costs are

Leader Michael Madigan, D-Chicago, spent about \$4 million.

Cys said the \$6 million includes from \$200,000 to \$300,000 spent on each of about two dozen competitive races. In addition, most incumbent Republicans raised between \$60,000 and \$100,000 on their own, Cys said.

Democrats spent an average of about \$100,000 on competitive races, said Steve Brown, spokesman for Madigan. They also spent a lot of money on coordinated advertising campaigns to benefit Democrats statewide.

There has to be a logical limit to the amount of money spent on legislative races, politicians and others say. There are only so many "swing" or competitive districts that can influence the balance of the House or the Senate, which remained in Republican hands. And there is only so much that can be spent on radio and television advertising, campaign fliers and consulting services.

"We haven't reached that point yet," said Kent Redfield, a political scientist and campaign finance expert at the University of Illinois-Springfield. "They're



New mobile telephones going digital

Consortium of companies promises improved calling quality at a cheaper price

CHICAGO — The next generation of mobile telephones promises to bring consumers higher-quality calls, fancier technology and cheaper prices, a consortium of regional phone companies says.

The new phones use digital technology, which has been around for years but is just getting to the point where millions of callers can use it.

PrimeCo Personal Communications said its \$199 telephone — slightly bigger than a large candy bar — will allow consumers to make clear-sounding calls. receive pages

nals in which everything, including voices, is converted into the digital language of computers, making greater use of scarce air-wave space.

The technology, called code division multiple access, has been available since World War II when the U.S. military used it for top secret communications.

In addition to Caller ID and allowing callers to check how much they've rung up, the technology alerts PrimeCo customers when their bills reach a certain amount.

"We really think we are setting a new standard in terms of quality. When people use our

Omnipoint Corp. soon will enter the New York market with a digital system, and a venture led by Sprint Corp. is expected to announce a multicity launch by the end of the year. Other companies, such as Pacific Bell Mobile Services, Ameritech and AT&T also are launching digital systems.

Only a fraction of today's mobile telephones use digital technology, but industry experts expect the number to grow slowly by the end of the century. Predictions, however, are that cellular usage still will outstrip digital usage by about 2 to 1, said



Simpson declined to speak to reporters at the event Sunday at Hollywood Park, sponsored by a group calling itself Christian Women for Justice. Many people who attended the fund-raiser — which raised money for Simpson's legal bills — also refused to answer questions.

Simpson was acquitted last year of criminal charges in the 1994 killings of ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend.



Soybean futures were slightly lower amid a lack of new export news. Domestic and foreign soybean sales, however, have been set-

ting records for the past few weeks, and support was likely to return amid a lack of competition from South American countries. Corn futures fell on continued technical weakness tied to large fall production and a lack of export business.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1/4 cent to \$3.93 1/2 a bushel; December corn fell 1/4 cent to \$2.64 1/4 a bushel; December oats fell 1/4 cent to \$1.53 a bushel; January soybeans fell 3/4 cent to \$6.99 1/2 a bushel.







 Bond traders were heartened by a Fed survey predicting steady economic growth through 1997 and a report showing that consumer confidence held steady in November.



Doctors raise questions about Holocaust ties to anatomy atlas

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
 CHICAGO — An acclaimed anatomy atlas named after a leading Nazi professor may have used Holocaust victims as subjects for its detailed drawings, two physicians say in a letter to a leading medical journal.
 Another physician in a second letter in Wednesday's Journal of the American Medical Association says the atlas, Pernkopf's Anatomy "should be expunged from our legitimate professional heritage."
 Professor Eduard Pernkopf "and his ilk were outside the bounds of human decency," wrote Dr. Richard S. Panush of St. Barnabus Medical Center in Livingston, N.J.
 The atlas is used by medical specialists, though the identity of the subjects for its drawings has been in question for a number of years.
 Pernkopf, dean of the University of Vienna Faculty of Medicine after Germany annexed Austria in 1938, "led the purge against the Jewish faculty in Vienna," wrote Drs. Howard Israel and William Seidelman in the first JAMA letter.
 The university's anatomy institute is known to have "received the cadavers of prisoners executed at the Vienna district court and of others put to death at Gestapo execution chambers," they wrote.
 Israel, an oral surgeon at Columbia University in New York, and Seidelman, director of an AIDS unit at the University of Toronto, endorse calls for an investigation into the origin of Pernkopf's cadavers.



State library receives volumes on Abe Lincoln

SPRINGFIELD — A 200-volume collection of books on Abraham Lincoln — including two works autographed by Carl Sandburg — have been donated to the Illinois State Historical Library by businessman and philanthropist W. Clement Stone.

The books, published between 1865 and 1967, include some titles and variations not previously owned by the library's Henry Horner Lincoln Collection, according to Kim Bauer, who oversees the Lincoln material.

"There are some really nice pieces here," Bauer said.

State historian Tom Schwartz said the significance of the collection lies in the way it reflects changes in the popular view of Lincoln.

"It represents the public's notion of Lincoln," Schwartz said. "There are a lot of popular biographies of Lincoln. They were the best-sellers of their time. They reflect the changing Lincoln image."

For example, Schwartz said,

Sandburg's works, written during the Great Depression and World War II, were influenced by economic turmoil and war.

The collection also mirrors the controversies concerning Lincoln that have occurred at different times.
