Little survivor haunted by family's murder

Toddler guards crib of brother abducted from mother's womb

LAWRENCEVILLE - Little Jordan Evans' nightmares oc-casionally prompt him to climb out of bed and wander the home of his maternal grandfather and legal guardian, Sam Evans.

On Nov. 16, 1995, a then 17-month-old Jordan was left un-harmed after assailants killed his pregnant mother, Debra Evans, and her 10-year-old daughter, Samantha. The attackers cut the fetus from Ms. Evans' womb and took it.

Prosecutors say Jacqueline Williams, 28, wanted a baby of her own, so she plotted with her boyfriend, Fedell Caffey, 22, and Lavern Ward, 24, to take Ms. Evans' child. Ward is the father of Jordan and Elijah, the child televalurine the crime. child taken during the crime.

That means little to Jordan, whose grandfather has found him standing by Elijah's crib, stroking the 1-year-old's arm.
"He said he was just watching him," Evans recalls. "He said something like, "The bad guys shot my mom in the head, and they took my baby broth-

Evans, a part-time sociology instructor and truck-driving teacher at Wabash Valley Community College, was given custody of the boys by the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services.

When the boys are older and begin asking questions, Evans plans to show them a scrapbook of articles he is compiling about

Evans says Jordan remembers some things about the murders.

"He says things like

'(Samantha) was screaming.'
But he doesn't talk about it for very long because his attention span isn't very long,' Evans said.

When Elijah is old enough to ask about his mother, Evans said he will tell him she died at his

"I worry about whether I'm handling things OK," he said. "But so far, it seems to be working."

Jordan saw a therapist after the deaths, Evans said. The therapist recommended no further counseling, but Evans said he will seek additional help

Mental health professionals y some psychological scarring inevitable for children who witness domestic homicides. But such scarring need not be permanent, they say.

"In a way, it bodes better (for the Evans brothers) that they are so young because they cannot understand the psychological horror of what happened," said Dr. Benjamin Garber, a child psychiatrist and director of the Barr-Harris Center for the Study of Separation Childhood.

He eventually sued, but a federal judge threw out Johnson's civil rights lawsuit. The 7th Circuit court upheld the

Al Hofeld loses bid to keep name out of sex abuse lawsuit

CHICAGO — Lawyer and former U.S. Senate candidate Al Hofeld has lost a bid to keep his name out of a lawsuit accusing him of sexually abusing his niece, the Chicago Tribune re-

ported today.
The Illinois Supreme Court on Wednesday refused to hear an appeal of a ruling allowing the niece to substitute real names for the pseudonyms used in the lawsuit

The lawsuit, filed in March 1995 in Cook County Circuit Court, refers to the defendant as John Doe and to the plaintiff as Jane Doe. In August, the Tri-bune identified John Doe as Hofeld and Jane Doe as Valerie Reznik, saying it had pieced together the identities after court records erroneously included Miss Reznik's name

'Attorneys for both sides have refused to identify their clients.

The lawsuit accuses John Doe fondling Jane Doe, now 19, when she was between the ages of 10 and 16. Through his law-yers, John Doe has vehemently denied the accusation.

Cook County prosecutors reviewed the case and decided not to file criminal charges, attorneys for both sides told the

The Tribune has not reported how much the lawsuit seeks in damages. But it cited Jane Doe's lawyer, Susan Loggans, saying the defense reneged on a \$4 million settlement agreement the

day before the lawsuit was filed. Defense lawyer Philip Corbov said he knows nothing about

said he knows nothing about a settlement because he was not John Doe's lawyer at the time. Cook County Circuit Judge Michael J. Hogan agreed with John Doe's request to bar the use of the real names, but an

Illinois Appellate Court over-turned that ruling July 31.

Wednesday's Supreme Court ruling will not be delivered to the appeals court until Dec. 26, giving John Doe time to ask the higher court to reconsider.



Dwayne Vinson, 29, apparently intended to burglarize the apartment, located in a pleasant North Side neighborhood, police Commander Joe Griffin said

North Side neighborhood, police Commander Joe Griffin said Tuesday. Vinson broke, a leg and heel in his 40-foot fall Monday morning and was in a hospital under police guard. He was charged with first-degree murder, home invasion and residential burglary. Ms. Sprague, 30, of Boston was the daughter of Cambridge, Mass., District Judge George Sprague, She had lived in Chicago for a year and a half, attending John Marshall Law School.

Vinson had been a maintenance worker in Ms. Sprague's building for about two weeks, police said. There was no evidence that he and Ms. Sprague knew each other.

Investigators were still trying

Investigators were still trying to determine how Vinson got into the apartment, which showed no sign of forced entry. They also were still running tests to learn whether Ms. Sprague was sexually assaulted.

"He apparently surprised her, a struggle ensued and he stran-gled her," Griffin said.

A short time later, someone banged on the apartment door, and Vinson jumped out the window, Griffin said.

dow, Griffin said.

"It's every mother's nightmare," Ms. Sprague's mother,
Lee, told the Boston Globe,
"We're all devastated. We were
very proud of her."

Vinson, who had served two
prison terms for armed robbery
and one for drug possession, denied involvement in the
woman's death. He told police
he had gone to the roof of the
building to get a broom and was
blown off by a gust of wind,
falling 13 stories to the garage
roof.

Investigators said they found some items from Ms. Sprague's apartment in Vinson's posses-sion.

Ms. Sprague graduated from Tulane University in New Or-leans, where she majored in drama. She worked for the De-partment of Housing and Urban Development in Boston before deciding to attend law school.

deciding to attend law school.

"She was a very warm and outspoken individual who gave a great deal of herself to others in her short years," said Charles Willauer, a close friend who answered calls Tuesday at the family's home in Boston's Beacon Hill neighborhood. "She was not the type of person who was shy and retiring. She was friendly and outgoing."

Willauer said the law school decision was inspired in part by her father's career and cheered by both parents.

(from small to mega farms) so quickly, this helps me to learn how to continue improving production to make it a little cheaper."

From his experience, Brauer said, "The family (hog) farm hasn't disappeared, it has incorporated" to remain competitive.

Seminar speaker Gary Dial. professor of swine medicine at the University of Minnesota College of Veterinary Medicine, said hog operation concerns tend to be management problems.

Yet he was pleased with the outcome of waste management regulations that will become effective next spring, saying,"I think they worked out a really good compromise," one that is workable for producer and the government.

"All producers want is to keep the environment sound as far as enforcement of the new rules and regulations protecting the environment," said Dial.

Although North Carolina now is the number one hog-producing state and Minnesota is in the top four, Illinois remains very competitive, Dial said.

"The upper Midwest still is the best place to grow pigs," he said. "We've got the climate, the corn and the places to put the manure."

"Nobody has to be scared of North Carolina," Dial said, "just be committed to good management. We've just got to always be doing a better job. There's no reason I can't compete against the megaproducers."

Dial said 1996 has been a good year for hog production.

"It's been a good year in spite of \$5 corn," he said, referring to the short-lived bump in prices when there was high demand for corn and few had any to sell.

Lincoln's seminar was cosponsored by the U of I College of Veterinary Medicine's Office of Continuing Education, the Cooperative Extension Service. the Illinois Pork Producers Association, and area pork producers associations.





Zenith to slash its payroll

GLENVIEW - Zenith Electronics Corp., struggling to survive as the last U.S. television maker, said today it will cut more than 1,100 employees about 25 percent of its U.S. work force.

The consumer electronics company, which is controlled by a South Korean company, said it will eliminate 375 salaried positions and 800 hourly positions in the United States.

The hourly jobs will be cut in 1997, mostly through attrition, at the company's picture tube plant in Melrose Park, a Chicago suburb. That will reduce the hourly work force to about 2,000 U.S. positions.

The company provided few details about the cuts to salaried workers, but said it would reduce those positions to fewer than 1,500 in the United States.

"Our fixed costs are simply too high for a company with sales at our levels and reporting such huge losses," Peter S. Willmott, the company's recently elected president and chief executive, said in a letter to employees.

Zenith is struggling to stay alive pending the expected 1998 launch of so-called highdefinition television, or HDTV. Zenith expects to get a boost from the launch since it will be one of the few manufacturers of the new digital technology.

The cuts are expected to reduce expenses by about \$20 million next year, the company said. It will take a \$25 million cover the reductions.



Cops lose some power with new court decision

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

SPRINGFIELD - In a decision that could have broad implications for police searches, the state Supreme Court ruled today that police can't search a home without announcing their presence merely because they suspect weapons are present.

The state's highest court overturned part of the state's "noknock" search and seizure law. ruling that the state Constitution provides greater protections against such searches than the U.S. Constitution.

The law currently allows a judge to issue a search warrant not requiring a knock and announcement if a person is thought to have firearms. The justices determined that police have to show the weapons might be used against them.

The court upheld a Lake County judge's ruling this year that evidence obtained from a no-knock police search of the home of Paul Krueger, charged with drug-related crimes, could not be used at trial.

In writing for the majority. Chief Justice Michael Bilandic noted that the U.S. Supreme Court has interpreted the U.S. Constitution to allow use of such evidence if authorities follow proper procedures in good faith. But he said Illinois' Constitution does not allow for such a good-faith exception.

"We are not willing to recognize an exception to our state exclusionary rule that will provide a grace period for unconstitutional search and seizure legislation, during which time our citizens' prized constitutional rights can be violated with impunity," Bilandic wrote.

In a dissent, Justice Benjamin Miller argued that the evidence in the Krueger case should be allowed under a good-faith ex-

"The majority does not point to anything in either the text or history of our state constitution that would warrant this court in reaching a result different from the one reached by the United States Supreme Court," Miller

Populations in Western, Southern states post fastest growth in U.S.

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

WASHINGTON the West and South continue to post the fastest growth in the nation, according to midyear es-timates released today by the Census Bureau.

As in recent years, Nevada As in recent years, nevada was the fastest-growing state, increasing by 4.5 percent, or 70,000 people, between July 1995 and July 1996. Arizona grew by 2.9 percent and Utah by 2.2 percent, followed by Colorate Georgia and Idaho, with 2. rado, Georgia and Idaho with 2 percent each.

Population decreased in the year ending July 1996 in only two places — Rhode Island by 0.1 percent and the District of Columbia by 2 percent. Much of D.C.'s loss was caused by more people leaving the capital to go to other parts of the United States than moving into it. In terms of numbers, California led the nation in domestic emigration with 259,000 people

— meaning that many more left it than arrived from other states. But it also had the highest net international immigration, with 246,000 more people moving into the state from abroad; and highest natural population growth, with 328,000 more

growth, with 328,000 more births than deaths. Nevada had the highest per-centage of people arriving from another state.
