Dead girl's parents appear on CNN

BOULDER, Golo. - The parents of a 6-year-old beauty pageant winner found strangled in her home say they don't believe the killer was a family member or friend.

"Our family is a loving family, a gentle family," John B. Ramsey, JonBenet's father, told CNN on Wednesday.

Ramsey and his wife, Patricia, were interviewed by the network in Atlanta, where they buried their daughter Tuesday. The family used to live there.

"We are a Christian, Godfearing family. We love our children. We would do anything for our children," Mrs. Ramsey said.

The body of JonBenet, last year's Little Miss Colorado, was discovered the day after Christhome in Boulder, about eight hours after she was reported kidnapped.

Authorities have refused to discuss the case. While a police spokeswoman said earlier this week that no suspects have been identified, she said the public is in no danger from the girl's killer.

But Mrs. Ramsey warned her neighbors to be careful.

There is a killer on the loose," she told CNN. "There's someone out there ... I don't know who it is. I don't know if it's a he or a she. But if I were a resident of Boulder, I would tell my friends to keep your babies close to you."

Five detectives from Boulder were sent to Atlanta on Wednesday, Boulder spokeswoman Leslie Aaholm confirmed today.







The USDA estimated Illinois' winter wheat crop at 1.15 million acres, down 30 percent from the 1.65 million acres planted last year. Nationally, the estimate was 48.2 million acres, 7 percent lower than in 1996 and the smallest acreage since 1978.

A drop in wheat prices and a late soybean crop prevented many farmers from planting their winter wheat in Southern Illinois, the state's biggest wheat-growing region, Clay County farmer Bill Klein said.

Many farmers grow winter wheat on the same acres they use for soybeans during the summer. Heavy spring rains delayed the soybean crops last year, pushing the soybean har-vest back and giving farmers little time to plant winter wheat.

'I planted as much as I could, but I got only half of my wheat in," said Klein, who normally plants 300 acres of winter wheat. "Some guys didn't even have time to get their (wheat seed) drills out this fall.'

Peoria proposes year-round school

By CHRISTOPHER WILLS THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

PEORIA - That blissful endof-school feeling would become a memory for Peoria children under a plan for year-round classes that was presented Friday.

Peoria District 150 plans to do away with the three-month summer vacation and switch to quarters separated by two-week vacations. That would create 200 days of school rather than the current 180.

The \$10 million or so needed for extra teacher's pay and new air conditioning would be supplied by doubling the city sales tax to 2 cents — a rare example of a city directly funding local

Supporters say year-round school can improve learning, of- no large district has switched en-

fer more time for innovative tirely to year-round classes. classes and keep children out of trouble.

"We are kind of a typical American city. If this can work here, it can work elsewhere,' said city council member Ed Glover, one of the plan's key developers.

The State Board of Education said Chicago has 15 schools on year-round schedules, but few other Illinois districts use them.

The National Association for Year-Round Education said about 2,400 public schools, with 1.8 million students, offer yearround classes. Most use them to reduce crowding by staggering the weeks students attend school.

Only 4 percent actually increase the number of school days, as Peoria is proposing, and

Katie Dorner, a senior at Peoria Woodruff High School, said the plan would not affect her but she felt sorry for kids would go to school all year.

"I like it just the way it is," she said. "The teachers get tired of us anyway. They don't want that year-round stuff either."

Amy Luckenbill said she was intrigued by the idea and tried to sell it to her daughter Molly, 9, by explaining that the frequent short vacations would break up the school year.

Backers were quick to say the Peoria plan is far from settled.

They hope to phase in the new school calendar over the next five years, but first they need the tax increase, an agreement with teacher unions and community support.







AIDS deaths drop with help from new treatments

BY DANIEL Q. HANEY ASSOCIATED PRESS

WASHINGTON AIDS deaths dropped 30 percent last year in New York, the U.S. city hardest hit by the epidemic, demonstrating the stunning demonstrating the stunning power of new treatments to control AIDS

"It's good news, which we haven't had a whole lot of in the AIDS epidemic," said Dr. Harold Jaffe of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Across the United States, AIDS specialists have noticed a AIDS specialists have noticed a dramatic improvement in the survival of their patients since the introduction of protease in-hibitors, a new class of drugs that has revolutionized AIDS treatment.

But the latest New York City statistics, released Friday, represent the first firm evidence that treatment breakthroughs are truly having a broad impact on deaths from the disease. Jaffe said he expects 1996 na-

tional figures to show the same drop seen in New York City. The city's AIDS figures began to improve even before the ad-vent of protease inhibitors, so other factors must also be playing a role. Just what they are is a matter of speculation, but doc-tors suggest better access to treatment through federal and state programs may have con-tributed.

New York City has 3 percent


of the country's population but 16 percent of its AIDS cases. Over the years, more than



90.000 New Yorkers have been diagnosed with AIDS. The number of cases reported annually is about four times higher than in Los Angeles, the city with the

second highest figures.

AIDS is New York's third leading cause of death. Indeed, among people age 25 to 44, it is the top killer.





Snag hits Simpson trial

Puzzling recess may be linked to 2 jurors who are moved

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

SANTA MONICA, Calif. -Another mysterious snag hit the O.J. Simpson civil trial today as the judge called an indefinite recess and two jurors were es-corted to a nearby empty court-

Before plaintiff lawyers could give their final two hours of rebuttal summation, the judge called lawyers into his chambers for a 20-minute private meeting.

Attorneys emerged grim-faced and huddled with their colleagues at each side of the counsel table.

The bailiff then ordered everyone out of the courtroom.

No reason was given for the recess or the in-chambers meet-

It was not known if the recess was linked to the two jurors, a black woman in her 60s and a white man in his 30s who sits next to her in the back row of the jury box. From the hallway, reporters could see bailiffs escorting the pair to an empty courtroom near the room where the trial is taking place.

Four alternates are still available if any members of the fiveman, seven-woman panel are dismissed.

The series of events took place before trial ever began this morning. The jury was never brought into the courtroom.

For nearly a week now, the jurors have listened to seven lawyers argue, rant, plead and drone on and on.

Deliberations were to begin following a few more hours of plaintiff rebuttal by lawyers Tom Lambert and Daniel Petrocelli.

Jurors must decide whether Simpson should be held respon-

Stocks drew an early boost from a rally in

sible for the June 12, 1994, knife slayings of ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman, and if so, whether to award damages that could cost Simpson millions. Simpson was acquitted of murder in 1995.

Among the factors jurors have to weigh - variously described by the lawyers as critical evidence, crucial facts, uncontradicted truth, important testimony and flat-out lies - is one pressed Monday by the defense: the frame-up.

In a powerful finale, lawyer Robert Baker asserted that Simpson was the victim of a police conspiracy led by former detectives Mark Fuhrman and Philip Vannatter.

Baker delivered his accusation in words even more blunt than those Johnnie Cochran Jr. used at the criminal trial.

"That's planted evidence," Baker said of the bloody glove that Fuhrman contended he found behind Simpson's house.

Whitacre headed ADM's Bio-Products division when he agreed to become an undercover FBI informant in 1992. The setapes he made helped the ce Department secure a Justice price-fixing guilty plea and record \$100 million fine from

ADM in October. But shortly after he was exposed as an informant in 1995, Whitacre admitted stashing mil-lions of dollars from ADM in foreign bank accounts. Whitacre has insisted the money was part of an off-the-books bonus plan for ADM executives, but both the company and federal prosecutors now say the money was

Whitacre pleaded Wednesday to an indictment which includes 30 counts of money laundering.


