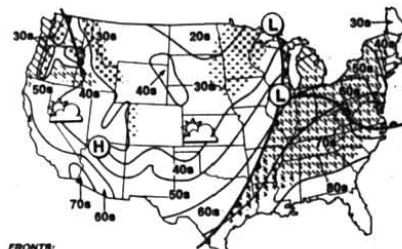

Livestock group raises beef over yogurt in school lunches

WASHINGTON — Children will soon be getting yogurt instead of meat in school lunches under a change approved by the Agriculture Department over the strong objections of cattle producers.

School food service officials were told of the decision over the weekend by Mary Ann Keeffe, USDA's acting undersecretary for food, nutrition and consumer services. The revised rule will be published in written form later this week, a USDA spokesman said.

School officials had predicted yogurt would be a hit with kids. Child-care providers and the food industry have been pressing for the change for at least 15 years, but the Agriculture Department balked out of concerns about the lack of iron and other nutrients in yogurt.

The department already allows some meat substitutes, including cheese, beans, eggs and peanut butter.

Yogurt would add variety to lunches, it's easy for children to digest and it requires no preparation, proponents said. Under the new USDA rule, four ounces of yogurt may substitute for an ounce of meat.

"The USDA is confirming what school cafeteria workers have always known. Namely that greater choices at lunchtime

mean far less food tossed away, uneaten, often at taxpayer expense," said Joe Rutledge, a vice president of General Mills Inc., maker of Yoplait and Colombo yogurt.

School lunch programs, which feed 25 million children nationwide, are a huge market for the food industry. The federal government subsidizes the cost of the meals and sets requirements for their nutrition and content.

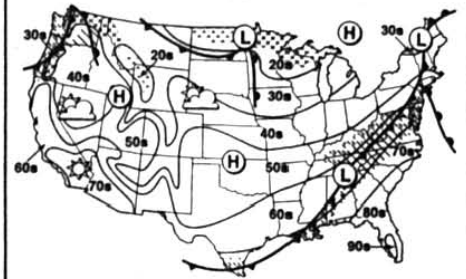

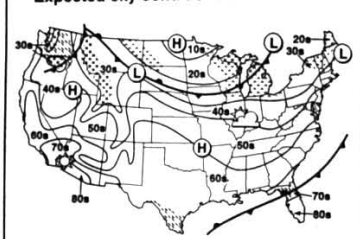

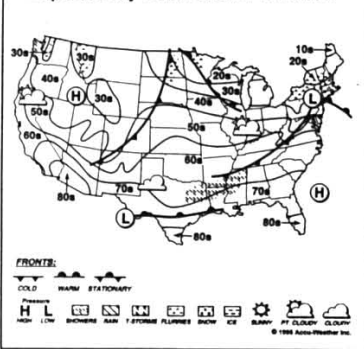

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean futures prices leveled off today after a sharp rally Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Traders said a port strike in Brazil was canceled this morning, allowing bean exports to flow again.
The market got some support from an increase in the soybean crush last week, put at 30.1 million bushels compared with 30.0 the previous week, indicating that prices are going to have to move higher to restrict demand.
Some analysts say record heavy demand may cut reserves to less than a month's supply by September.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were higher today as investors reacted calmly to an employment report that revealed a surprisingly sharp rise in new jobs but little sign of inflationary wage increases.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 58.88 at 7,003.58. Boosting the blue-chip index was Eastman Kodak, up 1 1/4 at 90 1/4, Procter & Gamble, up 1 1/4 at 120 1/4, and Philip Morris, up 2 1/4 at 135 1/4.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 13-to-7 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 227.75 million shares, down from 251.33 on Thursday.

Broad-market indexes were also higher. The Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 8.42 at 806.98, the NYSE composite index was up 3.80 at 424.04 and the American Stock Exchange composite index was up 1.60 at 601.91.

The Nasdaq composite index was up 6.99 at 1,322.42, although a number of technology stocks were lagging today. Cisco Systems was down 1 1/4 at 53 1/4, 3Com was down 1 at 34 1/4 and Microchip Technology was down 4 5/16 at 31 1/4.

Prices in the inflation-sensitive bond market tumbled immediately after the employment figures were released, but then quickly bounced back to levels above those late Thursday.

But report didn't hurt stocks this morning as investors looked beyond the big rise in jobs growth and focused on the moderate wage increase.

"There was nothing more in this report that we didn't know already," said Steven Goldman, a market strategist at Weeden & Co. in Greenwich, Conn. "It's not a surprise."

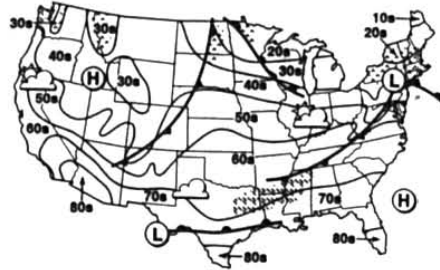

Village council votes to stand tough against raging Ohio River

Old Shawneetown's 300 souls aren't budging, even as Ohio River crest predictions rise perilously higher. Not even a disaster declaration from the governor got them moving.

"We won't do anything rash..." Mayor Freeman Oldham said late Monday night after the town council decided not to evacuate the town. "If people hear about an evacuation on TV now, there'd be a mad rush out of here."

Oldham said the town council would probably meet again informally this morning to discuss the possibility of evacuations.

The National Weather Service estimated a Wednesday crest of 55 feet at Old Shawneetown. That's 22 feet over flood stage and the highest the river has climbed there since 1950. The record is 65 feet in 1937.

Oldham said the river was at 53.9 feet Monday night and the town's 60-foot-high levee was holding.

But in Junction to the northwest and in Hardin County to

the south, things weren't going quite so smoothly.

In Junction, all but one road into town was flooded, stranding residents trying to save their homes from the rising river.

In Hardin County, where Saline River water swept over 34 homes and forced workers to rescue two people in Saline Landing Sunday, officials described the situation Monday as "bad."

The county has no levee protection, leaving small clusters of homes and businesses at the river's mercy, said Shirley Oxford of Hardin County Emergency Services and Disaster Agency in Elizabethtown.

State prisoners and volunteers are filling sandbags in Metropolis as quickly as they can, but the demand keeps exceeding the supply. Because there is no levee for the town, workers are creating sandbag walls around individual houses.

"Some of them are 4 feet high and three or four bags deep," said O.D. Troutman.

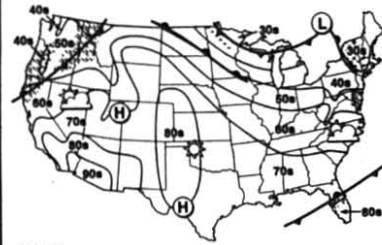

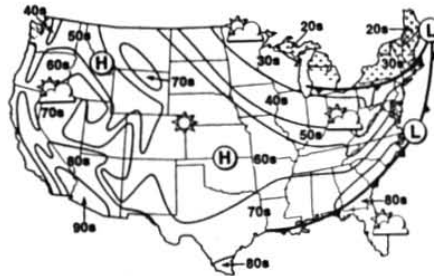

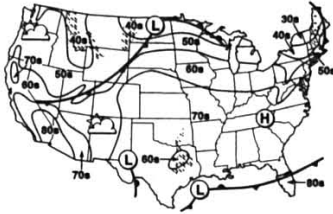

Mason City mulls library proposal

Illini Central school grounds could be site of new library

MASON CITY — Seeking a solution to mutual overcrowding problems at their facilities, the Illini Central School Board and the Mason City Library Board have agreed to study the feasibility of a city library built on school grounds.

Both boards seek public input on the proposal.

The offer surfaced Tuesday at the continuation of a regular school board meeting that was recessed last week and again Monday so library officials could attend.

"They approached us offering us property we could build a new library on rather than remodel an older building downtown," said library board President Lynn Garrison.

I.C. Schools have been faced with overcrowded classrooms and lack of space for numerous ancillary services.

The city library has been housed in temporary quarters on the second floor of city hall for generations and has outgrown its space. The library board pursued a building project, which was rejected in two referenda.

One year ago, the Paddock Building at 120 N. Main St. was donated to the library district,

and officials have been studying how best to utilize the gift.

Garrison said she has no estimate of what it would cost to remodel the former appliance store into a library. "I want to get the figures to know what we're dealing with. To be done right, I think it will be expensive," she said.

She said a library building project could receive state grants covering 40 percent of costs up to \$250,000. The library district would have to supply the balance.

"We discussed cost, advantages, and the positive impact it might have on the community," I.C. Superintendent Ken Cox said of the joint meeting. "It was cordial, and very positive."

The lawn between the high school and Illinois 10 is the proposed site. "We haven't investigated to see how close you can put a building like that to a school," said Cox, adding that the school's attorney or architect would be consulted.

School officials are eyeing a 99-year lease of the grounds for \$1.

"If the public library was right there handy, the school kids could use it," said Garrison.

Building the library on school grounds does not mean the li-

brary will become part of the school, however. "The public library won't merge with the district," she said.

Details must be sorted out such as hours and staffing of the library, and any regulations on placement of school reference books. But what both boards want now is public opinion.

"We would really encourage some public comments," said Garrison. "One issue before was that people wanted the library downtown. We don't want to discourage people from using it. We'd like to hear positive comments and negative concerns," she said.

The library board will meet at 7 p.m. at the city library, and the school board will meet April 17 at the Grade School Library. A joint meeting will follow at 7:30 p.m. April 24 at the high school library.

Additional options the school board discussed to help alleviate high school crowding included reducing the size of the high school study hall to create another classroom. That would free a room to be used by the grade school for a fourth kindergarten room.

Creating an office in the grade school foyer is also under consideration.

Group hears criticism of D.A.R.E. drug programs

CHICAGO — Although state and federal governments have poured hundreds of millions of dollars into D.A.R.E. and other anti-drug efforts, the programs simply aren't working, researchers claim.

In fact, drug education programs not only fail to curb drug use, but may actually be hurting

children, said Joel Brown, a researcher who recently completed a comprehensive study of anti-drug programs in California.

Brown and others leveled their criticism Wednesday during a meeting of the American Educational Research Association.

At best, D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) and other programs aimed at

grade school and middle school children "have a minimal effect," he said.

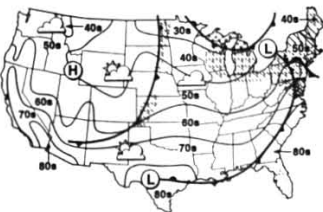

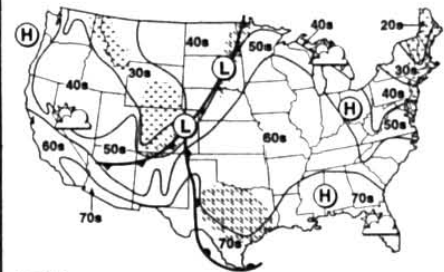
