



# Bill offers gambling galore

CHICAGO - Land-based casinos in Chicago and Rosemont. new riverboat casinos in Lake County, slots at the horse-racing tracks, and 24-hour open gambling at existing riverboats are being thrown into the pot that state Rep. Louis Lang is hoping the state's General Assembly

buys into this spring. The Skokie Democrat contends his bill will generate \$1.4 billion in new revenue for the state, 52,000 new jobs, new schools, and property tax relief for businesses and homeowners.

'I think there is something for everybody in the General Assembly to embrace," said Lang, who nonetheless said the bill will not be "a breeze" to pass the House and Senate.

Gov. Jim Edgar has come out before in opposition to landbased casinos, although he has indicated he will consider legislation allowing riverboat casinos in Cook County

consider that position. Nothing will go bankrupt because of this, in this bill is etched in stone. What is important is that we move this process along and not delay it any further," said Lang.

Lang resented implications from Thomas Grey, executive director of National Coalition Against Gambling Expansion, that the bill was fueled by gambling money. While he received some political donations from gambling interests, Lang said he received more money from other businesses.

Lang also discounted some studies that contend gambling has a negative economic impact on the economy as local money is diverted from existing busi-

He said some studies showed that much of the money flowing to Chicago and Rosemont casinos will come from out-of-

"There will be people who

"Many of the arguments that people make against the expansion of gambling are the same arguments they made when we place and the same arguments no longer work. The horse is already out of the barn. If these people want to go back to a time when gambling is illegal in Illinois let them propose a bill to do that," said Lang.

homes sold briskly in March for the third consecutive month, down only slightly from the month before when sales hit the highest level in 11 years. New homes sold at a season-ally adjusted annual rate of 813,000 last month, a 2.5 per-cent decline from a rate of 834,000 in February that was the highest since April 1986, the Commerce Department said to-day.

In advance, many economists were looking for a less torrid sales pace of about 790,000 in March. Also, the department substantially raised February and January sales from previous estimates

Amber's death was similar to an accident in November 1995 that killed 5-year-old Travis Bohl of Geneseo. In that ac-cident, the boy had bent in front of the bus to grab a backpack he had dronped.

In each instance, the child had entered a "blind spot" for the bus driver, out of the viewing area over the hood of the bus. The Illinois Department of Transportation says 24 blind

spot accidents occurred from 1980 to 1995.
