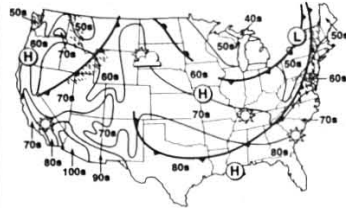

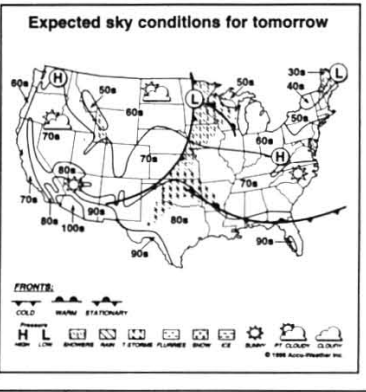

Scott AFB future again clouded

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE

— The Pentagon's plan to ask for legislation allowing it to close more bases has again raised fears for the future of Scott Air Force Base.

Sen. Richard Durbin, D-Ill., said Tuesday he and Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, D-Ill., were recently assured by Air Force Secretary Sheila Widnall that Scott was not marked for closing.

But Defense Secretary William Cohen wants Congress to approve two separate sets of closures in 1999 and 2001 on top of

the nearly 100 sites ordered shut down in recent years, Pentagon sources said. Money saved from the closings would be used for new weapons and modernization.

Pentagon spokesman Kenneth Bacon declined to say exactly how many closings Cohen was seeking or what sites might be targeted. But military maintenance depots like the Army's Charles Melvin Price Support Depot in Granite City would be considered for closures along with bases, he said.

Police seek Californian in probe of grisly Chicago murder

CHICAGO — A California man sought in the slayings of two Minnesota men has emerged as a suspect in the death of a millionaire developer whose bloody body was found in the garage of his townhouse on the city's posh Gold Coast.

Authorities made the link Wednesday after discovering a Jeep Cherokee stolen from a slain Minneapolis architect parked across the street from the townhouse of Lee Miglin, 72, a highly successful businessman and socialite whose slashed and stabbed body was discovered Sunday.

That prompted a multistate search by state and federal authorities for Andrew Phillip Cunanan, who was charged Wednesday with second-degree murder in the architect's shooting.

Minnesota authorities believe Cunanan may have driven the

Jeep to Chicago and switched it for Miglin's 1994 Lexus, which is missing.

"Our sheriff's department is in contact with the Chicago Police Department, comparing notes," said Chisago County Attorney Jim Reuter, in Center City, Minn.

"I think they're looking at Cunanan as a suspect, as well, in Miglin's homicide," Reuter said.

Chicago police refused to comment. But the Chicago County Sheriff's Department and police in San Diego, where Cunanan is from, both said he is considered a suspect in Miglin's death.

Architect David Madson was found Saturday, May 3, at an abandoned farm in Chisago County, north of Minneapolis. He was shot three times.

Madson, 33, had been missing from work for two days when friends went to his apartment on

April 29 and discovered the body of Jeffrey Trail, 28, of Bloomington, Minn., there.

The three men knew each other, Reuter said, and Cunanan, 27, of San Diego, once had an intimate relationship with Madson. Trail had spent time in the San Diego area when he was in the Navy, Reuter said.

Cunanan "made a comment to mutual friends of his and Madson's that he was coming to Minnesota to take care of some

business with him and Trail, and he was also hoping to make contact with Madson, who he had been intimate with on a prior occasion and had a friendship with," Reuter said.

"What we alleged is Mr. Cunanan murdered Mr. Madson in Chisago County to eliminate a witness" to Trail's murder, Reuter said.

Trail had been beaten to death, said authorities, who found a claw hammer with a blood-like substance on it in the apartment.

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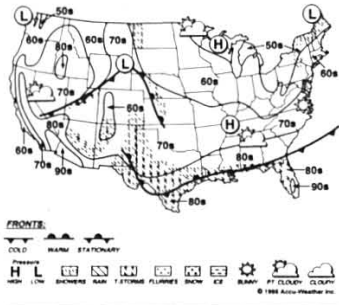

Ryan goes after company offering pitches on college financial aid

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois Attorney General Jim Ryan has gone to court to stop an Idaho company from offering parents college financial aid information but delivering high-pressure sales pitches for life insurance policies.

Ryan sought an injunction in Williamson County Circuit Court on Monday against Ernest Dantini Jr., president of the College Advantage Service Center, based in Lewiston, Idaho, and his state coordinators, Ryan spokesman Abdul-Hakim Shabazz said today. Ryan wants restitution made to customers.

Dantini's company invited students and parents to seminars where they were offered help applying for financial aid, Ryan said. But the main thrust of the seminars was selling life insurance policies or annuities, Ryan said.

Dantini, however, said annuities are offered at the seminars but the sessions also offer helpful information about applying for federal loans and other financial aid services.

"We were really caught off guard and surprised, in that we've never had a complaint in the state of Illinois," he said today.

Phone records subpoenaed by the attorney general show that 7,500 Illinoisans responded to the company's advertisements; Ryan has no indication how many people actually attended the seminars, Shabazz said.

Seminars were held in Alton, Galesburg, Decatur, Marion, Mount Vernon, Freeport, Peoria, Libertyville, Aurora, Chicago Heights, Hazel Crest, South Holland, Pontiac, Rockford and Waukegan, Ryan said.

Board of Trade
CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean fu-

tures prices rose early today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the government released unexpectedly strong export figures.

Soybean exports jumped to 278,800 tons for the week ended May 15, more than twice the previous week's figures and well above market expectations. Soybean crushing for meal and oil also rose unexpectedly, signaling demand may be sharply on the rise following several weeks of meager export sales.

Corn futures also showed unexpectedly strong export sales, at 614,600 tons. Prices also were boosted by forecast for rain in areas of the Midwest, which could slow field-work.

Wheat futures rose on the strength in the other markets.

Wheat for July delivery rose 1 1/4 cents to \$3.83 1/2 a bushel; July corn rose 1 1/4 cents to \$2.78 a bushel; July oats rose 1/4 cent to \$1.62 a bushel; July soybeans jumped 9 1/4 cents to \$8.56 1/2 a bushel.

Live cattle and hog futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Feeder cattle futures were mostly lower, while pork bellies advanced.

Wall Street at noon
NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks turned mostly lower this morning after interest rates rose toward unsettling levels in the bond market amid persistent worries that inflation remains a threat.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 23.90 at 7,266.79, having surrendered an early 19-point gain.

Most broad-market measures also gave back some early gains, pressured by another weak day in the bond market, where the yield on the 30-year Treasury — a key determinant

of borrowing costs — rose as high as 6.99 percent.

On Wednesday, the long-bond yield rose from 6.90 percent to 6.95 percent as some strong export data prompted investors to second-guess the Federal Reserve's apparent determination that the economy's vigorous pace may be slowing enough to keep inflationary pressures in check.

Rapid inflation makes fixed-income investments such as bond less appealing, forcing down prices to improve the yield, and higher interest rates at the Fed or the bond market can hurt company profits by slowing consumer spending.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by a slim margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 19.38 million shares, well below Wednesday's midday pace.

The Standard & Poor's 500 list was down 2.15 at 837.20, and the NYSE composite index was down 0.75 at 435.46.

The Nasdaq composite index was down 3.75 at 1,370.00, and the American Stock Exchange composite index was up 1.08 at 593.15.

The Dow's weakest issue was Boeing, which was down 1 1/2 at 100 1/4 amid worries that European trade officials will succeed in blocking the aircraft maker's acquisition of McDonnell Douglas. On Wednesday, Boeing received a letter from the European Union objecting to the \$13.3 billion deal.

On Wednesday, technology shares rose after a robust profit report from Dell Computer, but blue-chip shares pulled back as bond-market yields rose.

Tokyo's Nikkei stock average rose 0.2 percent and Frankfurt's DAX index fell 0.5 percent.

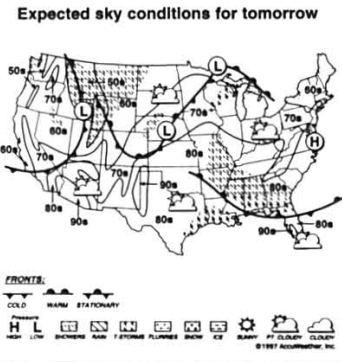

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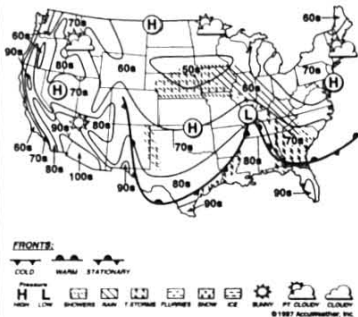

Broken water main causes flooding in Windy City Loop

CHICAGO — Subway service in Chicago's Loop is back to normal following a weekend flood caused by a broken water main, and officials are trying to salvage water-damaged public records.

On Monday night, emergency crews lowered a new water main segment into position to replace the 36-inch one that broke early Sunday, flooding the basements of several downtown buildings, subway stations and tunnels.

The cause of the rupture has not been determined.

At one point Sunday, four subway lines were closed as a precaution. But water had to be pumped out of the subway that runs to O'Hare International Airport, and a portion of that train line remained closed until Monday.

At least 6 inches of water poured into a basement of the Cook County building, damaging some birth, death and marriage records stored on the lower shelves.

On Monday, Cook County clerk's office workers helped pack four crates of birth records. A Skokie-based records preservation company will try to dry them in a vacuum chamber.

Some of the office's death

records are too damaged to be salvaged, and Andy Tomlin, director of vital records, said they would have to be replaced with copies from the state.

The basement of the James R. Thompson state office building also was flooded as were several business buildings.

This flood was far less serious than an underground flood that shut down hundreds of Loop businesses in April 1992.

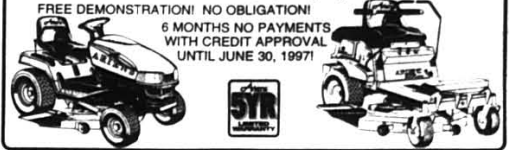

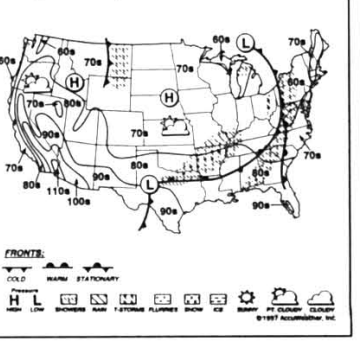

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean led a continued rally in futures prices early today on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Soybean futures moved higher amid follow-through strength from Wednesday's strong gains, which came on worry about continued below-normal temperatures in the Midwest.

The cool weather has delayed plant emergence and possibly left the crops vulnerable to an early frost.

Soybean and grain futures prices also edged higher on ideas the recent losses have prompted foreign buyers to seek more American goods.

Wheat for July delivery rose 1/4 cent to \$3.67 1/2 a bushel, July corn rose 1/4 cent to \$2.71 a bushel, July oats rose 1/4 cent to \$2.65 a bushel, July soybeans jumped 11

3/8 at 844.18, and the NYSE composite index was down 1.28 at 438.38.

The Nasdaq composite index, which has closed at record highs for three straight sessions, was down 0.54 at 1,409.54. The American Stock Exchange composite index, which is also dominated by smaller companies, was up 1.03 at 601.82.

The Dow's weakest issuers were IBM, down 1 1/2 at 88 1/2; Disney, down 1 1/2 at 82 1/2; and J.P. Morgan, down 1 at 103 1/2.

Nike, down 8 1/2 at 55 1/2 as the most active NYSE issue, plunged this morning after the sports apparel maker warned that poor sales and a factory shutdown would push profits below expectations.

Bonds edged higher this morning after the Labor Department reported that the number of American workers filing first-time claims for jobless benefits was unchanged last week at 322,000, a level analysts say is consistent with modest job growth.

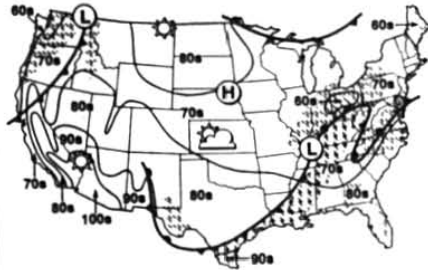

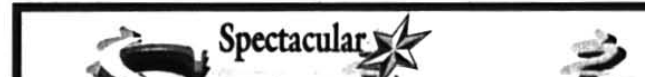

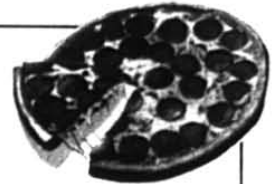
