Property damage

An insurance investigation into a report of hail-damage revealed a hammer-wielding vandal is to blame for hundreds of dents covering a Lincoln man's car, police said.

The vehicle's owner discovered the damage Friday when he returned to his car, which he left parked for an undisclosed period on the 100 block of Oglesby Avenue, and notified his insurance company.

According to police, scratches in the center of the dents make it unlikely they were caused by hail.

Police are continuing to investigate the matter.

Oil dumping

Police discovered more than a ton of discarded motor oil dumped behind the vacant Kmart building on Woodlawn Road.

According to Logan County Emergency Service and Disaster Agency Director Dan Fulscher, the oil, stored in five full

and one half-full 55 gallon drums, posed a serious environmental threat.

"Any time you get over 100 pounds of petroleum product released to the environment, it's a reportable quantity to the EPA, and ESDA is notified, because it's our county's and our community's right to know somebody made a mess of the environment," he said.

ESDA assessed the situation and contacted Malan Realty Investors Inc. of Birmingham Mich., the property owner and Kmart's former landlord.

"This is the first time we've ever had somebody do something like that to us," Karen Zoltowski, the property manager for Malan Realty said.

On ESDA's recommendation, Malan Realty hired an environmental service for the cleanup.

"It's over a thousand for sure," Zoltowski said of the cost of the cleanup. "If there's something in it that can't be legally dumped, I'm sure it will cost more."

The matter is under investigation, but

Zoltowski believes the oil may not have come from far away.

"Chances are it's a business in Lincoln," she said. "It just makes it harder to make a vacant building look decent. Things like that just encourage other people to do the same."

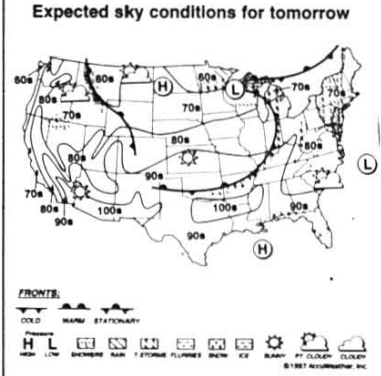

Atheist teen sues Boy Scouts

CHICAGO — A teen-ager and his father have filed a federal lawsuit seeking \$10 million in damages from the Boy Scouts of America, claiming the group discriminated against the youth because he is an atheist.

When Richard Sherman, 15, of Buffalo Grove applied for the Explorer program in April, he crossed out the words "trust in God" and "be faithful in my religious duties." In doing so, he rejected the religious portion of the Explorer Code, wrote Leroy Jossell, director of registration for the Boy Scouts.

"It makes me angry," Richard Sherman said. "I just want to be in the program."

Richard's father, Robert Sherman, said the Explorer program in Buffalo Grove is run by the town's police department, and therefore is not allowed to exclude people based on religious beliefs.

"I want to assure that the Boy Scouts can never again exclude atheists from government programs," said Robert Sherman, who is also an atheist.

A spokesman for the Boy Scouts says he has not heard of the lawsuit, but says the Explorer program is part of the Boy Scouts, which is a private organization.

"The organization retains the constitutional right to maintain its own standards of membership," Gregg Shields said. "Anyone who meets the standards of scouting is encouraged to join."

This isn't the first time the Shermans and the Boy Scouts have clashed over religious views. When Richard was in fifth grade, he and his father filed an unsuccessful lawsuit because the Boy wasn't allowed to be a scout.

Robert Sherman has lost other lawsuits in which he crusaded for the separation of church and state.

Parents' smoking is child killer

CHICAGO — At least 6,200 children die each year in the United States because of their parents' smoking, killed by such things as lung infections and burns, a study says.

"More young children are killed by parental smoking than by all unintentional injuries combined," the researchers said in the July issue of the Archives of Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine.

In addition, some 5.4 million other youngsters each year survive ailments such as ear infections and asthma that are triggered by their parents' smoking, and these problems cost \$4.6 billion annually to treat, the researchers from the University of Wisconsin Medical School in Madison estimated.

The study looked at reports from 1980 to 1996 involving children up to 18, existing research about the risks associated with parental smoking and the costs of treating smoking-related illnesses.

The researchers estimated that the childhood loss of life from parental smoking costs \$8.2 billion a year, based partly on how much a child would be expected to earn over a lifetime.

The cost analyses are conservative because they don't include the cost of work time lost by parents caring for sick youngsters, said Dr. Thomas E. Novotny, an epidemiologist with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"All of these illnesses and economic costs are foisted upon children who have had absolutely no choice in the matter," said Novotny, who was not involved with the study.

The researchers said 2,800 of the deaths are due to low birthweight caused by mothers who smoke while pregnant. Low birthweight babies are frail and vulnerable to many ills, including respiratory distress syndrome, bleeding in the brain and blood infections.

About 2,000 of the deaths are attributed to sudden infant death syndrome caused by secondhand

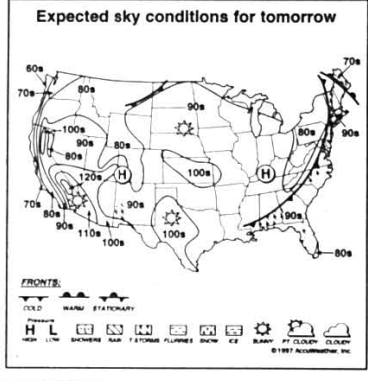

Reports push Dow over 8,000 barrier

NEW YORK — The Dow Jones industrial average crossed the 8,000 mark today and continued climbing in the afternoon, encouraged by a strong economy and tame inflation.

The Dow traded as high as 8,027.27, up 51.56 points. The index had been held back earlier in the morning by disappointing profit news from one of its components — Eastman Kodak.

But a late-morning rally in the bond market pushed long-term interest rates below 6.5 percent — the lowest in seven months.

The Dow was propelled by the same factors that have been carrying it higher for months — low inflation and a steadily growing economy.

New figures released this morning by the Labor Department further convinced economists that inflation is not a threat. The Consumer Price Index rose a seasonally adjusted 0.1 percent last month, leaving the inflation rate at 1.4 percent for the first half of 1997.

The 8,000 mark, which brought the closely followed index to a 24 percent gain this year, appeared in doubt this spring as the Dow dropped 10 percent in a month and led many to question the market's strength.

Just 2½ years ago, the Dow was trading at 4,000.

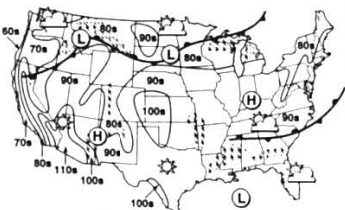

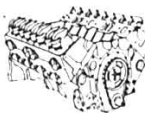

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures rose sharply early today as Chicago Board of Trade amid unexpected new export demand. Corn and soybean futures were mixed.
Egypt overnight bought 400,000 tons of U.S. soft red winter wheat for August delivery, up substantially from expectations for a purchase of 50,000 tons. The news raised expectations Egypt will tender for more wheat for September and October in coming days.
Corn futures were mixed, finding support from the U.S. Agriculture Department's report late Monday that the condition of the crops had deteriorated last week over the week previous. But some investors expected weak demand rains likely would help most of the plants recover in coming days.
Soybean futures were pressured by deliveries of soybeans against the July contract, which could indicate weak demand for the old crop.
Other contract months were pressured by beneficial rain in the Midwest, but received support from forecasts for hot, dry weather next week in the central Plains.
Wheat for September delivery rose 6 1/4 cents to \$3.47 a bushel; December corn rose 1 cent to \$2.47 1/4 a bushel; December oats rose 2 1/4 cents to \$1.52 1/4 a bushel, November soybeans rose 2 1/2 cents to \$5.99 1/4 a bushel.
Live cattle and pork bellies futures were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, while feeder cattle and lean hogs were mostly lower.
August live cattle rose 12 cent to 66 1/2 cents a pound; August feeder cattle fell .30 cent to 82.45 cents a pound; August lean hogs fell .27 cent to 81.07 cents a pound; August pork bellies rose .37 cent to 83.60 cents a pound.

August live cattle rose .07 cent to 66.77 cents a pound; August feeder cattle rose .32 cent to 83 cents a pound; August lean hogs rose .45 cent to 80.40 cents a pound; August pork bellies rose 2.30 cents to 83.40 cents a pound.

Today's downturn came after two straight record closes for the Dow, which added about 180 points on Tuesday and Wednesday, as Federal Reserve chairman Alan Greenspan delivered an encouraging midyear report to both houses of Congress.

Alderman accused of rape wants back on council

WOOD RIVER — Jailed rape suspect Anthony V. Stassi, who got \$2,000 for quitting the Wood River City Council, has returned the cash and wants to reclaim his job after a prosecutor said the deal probably was illegal.
Prosecutors said he's still off the council as far as they are concerned.
"There is no such thing as a conditional, contingency resignation," John McGuire, assistant state's attorney in Madison County, said. "He resigned, it was accepted and there is no going back."
On Monday night, the Wood River council voted 3-1 to accept Stassi's resignation in return for 10 months' pay at \$200 a month. On Wednesday, McGuire filed a complaint in Madison County Circuit Court questioning the city's authority to make the payment.
"It is our belief that there is no statutory or legal authority to pay him," McGuire said. "Once he has resigned, the city can't

pay him the money."
Stassi's lawyer Ben Allen and Wood River City Attorney Merle Bassett disputed McGuire's assessment. Allen said his client has a right to serve his term and collect his pay.
Stassi, 49, is in the Madison County Jail awaiting trial on two counts of aggravated sexual assault. He took a leave of absence from the council after being accused in December of raping a 19-year-old Alton woman. In June, while Stassi was free on

bond, he was accused of raping a 17-year-old woman who showed up to clean his home.
The day after the council vote, Councilman Matt Stimac and Wood River Mayor Lon Smith said they did not want to pay Stassi. City Manager Joey Tolbert said several residents had opposed the payment.
Allen said Stassi did not ask to be paid and that Bassett approached him with the notion of Stassi's receiving money in exchange for leaving the council.

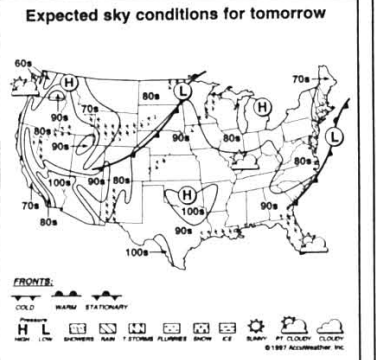

Sheriff sues over deputy disciplinary dispute

MARION — Disciplinary disputes involving sheriff's department personnel should not be handled by the state Labor Relations Board, Williamson County Sheriff Dennis Presley says in a lawsuit.
Presley and the county Merit Commission have sued the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees over a provision in the de-

partment's 1993 labor contract that gives employees the right to appeal their dismissal to the Illinois State Labor Relations Board.
The lawsuit contends state law gives the Merit Commission authority to handle labor disputes involving correctional officers, bailiffs, courthouse security officers and clerical staff.
"This is not a labor issue, but a matter of whether state law has

been violated," Presley said Wednesday. "This would be equivalent to a negotiation in which a sheriff's statutory duty to be warden of the jail would be taken away from the sheriff."
In the lawsuit, Presley claims the sheriff's department has no obligation to bargain with AFSCME regarding the disciplinary powers of the Merit Commission.

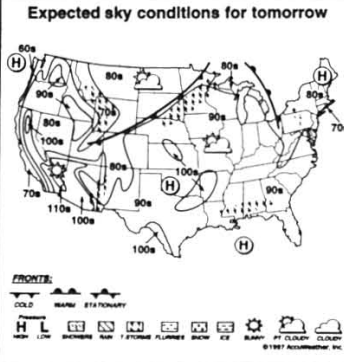

Officials say Bradley athlete brought drugs to Peoria area

PEORIA — Federal officials believe former Bradley University basketball star Dion Thurman brought more than 20 pounds of cocaine into the Peoria area.

FBI Special Agent Greg Spencer gave that testimony Tuesday in a hearing to determine whether Thurman, 28, a Peoria resident, should be released on bond pending trial.

Spencer also testified the government intends to call roughly two dozen cooperating witnesses who have direct knowledge of drug activity by Thurman. Thurman, charged with two counts in an alleged cocaine conspiracy, has been held since his arrest in early May. If convicted, he faces 20 years to life in prison.

Prosecutor Tate Chambers presented testimony on a series of events from 1992 to 1996 in which police reported Thurman was found in the presence of drugs (usually marijuana), guns, ammunition and large amounts of cash.

Defense attorney Greg McHugh, however, argued that Thurman's actual record consisted of a misdemeanor firearms offense. But Chambers argued, and U.S. District Judge Michael Mihm agreed, that a 1989 conviction for cocaine possession was admissible for the purpose of a federal court bond hearing.

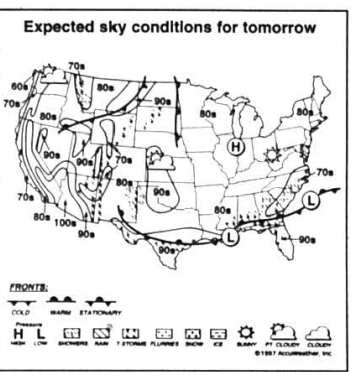

Dow takes aim at 8,300-mark

Decline in bond market's interest rates fuels stock prices

NEW YORK — Stocks charged further into record territory this morning as interest rates eased to their lowest level in more than a year in the bond market.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 85.47 at 8,260.00, plowing past 8,200 just two weeks after its first close above 8,000.

The blue-chip barometer, which has closed at record highs in five of the past six sessions, has now risen about 28 percent this year, already surpassing last year's 26 percent advance and triple what many experts had forecast.

Broad-market indicators were also padding Tuesday's record highs.

Stocks drew most of their strength from the bond market, where the yield on the 30-year Treasury — a key influence on consumer and corporate borrowing costs — fell as low as 6.32 percent. The long-hond yield hasn't finished a day that low

since February 1996.

Bonds started the day slightly stronger, extending Tuesday's rally, and then took off again despite a report that sprinkled some doubt on the upbeat inflation outlook that's been fueling a rally in the markets since April.

The Commerce Department reported that new home sales jumped 6.1 percent to 819,000 in June to the highest level since March, spurred by favorable mortgage rates and solid job and income growth. The May tally, however, was revised downward from 825,000 to 772,000.

The markets slid sharply early this spring as a series of robust economic reports spurred an inflation scare.

The Federal Reserve nudged a key interest rate higher in late March to slow things down, sparking worries about company profit growth, but an ensuing stream of milder economic readings has kept the central bank from taking further action.

Strong homes sales can be a

key economic catalyst, driving demand for a wide array of building materials and home furnishings.

The Dow's biggest gainers were Alcoa, which rose 2 15/16 to 89 after an upgrade by Lehman Brothers; IBM, up 1 1/16 at 105 9/16; and Travelers Group, up 2 3/16 at 73 9/16.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 5-to-2 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 266.24 million shares, up from Tuesday's busy pace.

The Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 9.87 at 952.16; the NYSE composite index was up 4.58 at 493.01; and the American Stock Exchange composite index was up 3.44 at 643.64. All three measures closed at record highs on Tuesday.

The technology-heavy Nasdaq composite index was up 11.85 at 1,584.17, pushing back into record territory for the first time in two weeks.
