





Atheist teen sues **Boy Scouts**

CHICAGO — A teen-ager and his father have filed a federal lawsuit seeking \$10 million in damages from the Boy Scouts of America, claiming the group discriminated against the youth be-cause he is an atheist.

When Richard Sherman, 15, of Buffalo Grove applied for the Explorer program in April, he crossed out the words "trust in God" and "be faithful in my religious duties." In doing so, he rejected the religious portion of the Explorer Code, wrote Le-roy Jossell, director of registra-tion for the Boy Scouts. "It makes me angry," Rich-afd Sherman said. "I just want to be in the program." When Richard Sherman, 15,

to be in the program." Richard's father, Robert Sher-man, said the Explorer program in Buffalo Grove is run by the town's police department, and therefore is not allowed to exclude people based on religious beliefs

"I want to assure that the Boy Scouts can never again exclude atheists from government pro-grams," said Robert Sherman, who is also an atheist.

A spokesman for the Boy Scouts says he has not heard of scouts says he has not heard of the lawsuit, but says the Ex-plorer program is part of the Boy Scouts, which is a private organization.



tend last week a standard advance. At noon on Wall Street, the Dow was up 22.62 at 7.918.43, its first trip above the 7,900 mark. Earlier, the blue-chip ba-rometer was up more than 55

its first trip above the 7,900 mark. Earlier, the blue-chip ba-rometer was up more than 55 points at about 7951, moving within striking distance of the 8,000 mark less than five months after its first move bave 7,000. Most broader market measures were also pushing further into record territory today, bolstered by another strong day in the bond market, where long-term interest rates fell to their lowest level since February. The Dow's advance was im-peded by American Express, which slid 30 to 79½, giving back a chunk of Thursday's margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 232,03 million shares, down from 279,48 million at the same point on Thursday. Financial markets were closed Friday for July 4 celebrations.

July 4 celebrations. The Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 2.76 at 919.68, and the NYSE composite index was promposite index was up 7.02 at 1.474.63, but the American Stock Exchange composite index was down 0.85 at 633.49. All four measures closed at record highs on Thursday.

Parents' smoking is child killer

CHICAGO - At least 6,200 CHICAGO — At least 6,200 children die each year in the United States because of their parents' smoking, killed by such things as lung infections and burns, a study says. "More young children are killed by parental smoking than by all unintentional injuries.

all unintentional injuries combined," the researchers said in the July issue of the Archives Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine

In addition, some 5.4 million other youngsters each year sur-vive ailments such as ear infec-tions and asthma that are trig-gered by their parents' smoking, and these problems cost \$4.6 billion annually to treat, the reearchers from the University of Visconsin Medical School in Madison estimated.

The study looked at reports from 1980 to 1996 involving children up to 18, existing re-search about the risks associated with parental smoking and the costs of treating smoking-related illnesses.

The researchers estimated that the childhood loss of life from parental smoking costs \$8,2 billion a year, based partly on how much a child would be expected

to earn over a lifetime. The cost analyses are conser vative because they don't include the cost of work time lost by parents caring for sick youngsters, said Dr. Thomas E. Novotny, an epidemiologist with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"All of these illnesses and economic costs are foisted upon children who have had abso-lutely no choice in the matter," said Novotny, who was not in-volved with the study.

The researchers said 2,800 of the deaths are due to low birth-weight caused by mothers who smoke while pregnant. Low birthweight babies are frail and vulnerable to many ills, includ-ing respiratory distress syndrome, bleeding in the brain and blood infections.

About 2,000 of the deaths are attributed to sudden infant death syndrome caused by secondhand

NEW YORK -The Dow Jones industrial average crossed the 8,000 mark today and con-tinued climbing in the afternoon, encouraged by a strong economy and tame inflation.

The Dow traded as high as 8,027.27, up 51.56 points. The index had been held back earlier in the morning by disappointing profit news from one of its com-ponents — Eastman Kodak. But a late-morning rally in the

bond market pushed long-term interest rates below 6.5 percent — the lowest in seven months.

The Dow was propelled by the same factors that have been carrying it higher for months — low inflation and a steadily

low inflation and growing economy. New figures released this morning by the Labor Depart-ment further convinced econo-that inflation is not a price Inmists that inflation is not a threat. The Consumer Price Index rose a seasonally adjusted 0.1 percent last month, leaving the inflation rate at 1.4 percent for the first half of 1997.

CHICAGO (AP) - Soybean futures prices advanced early today on the Chicago Board of Trade as the focus remained on forecasts for hot, dry weather ahead of a key growing period. Grains were slightly lower

Soybeans next week will enter their flowering period, in which pods begin to fill with beans, and the plants need ample moisture and cooler temperatures to thrive. Agronomists say soil moisture in most of Illinois and parts of Iowa - the nation's two largest growing states - is well below normal, which could sharply reduce yields, at a time when every bushel is needed to replenish inventories that will be at their lowest in 20 years by September

Futures prices also were supported by continued solid orders for the crop to be harvested in the fall. There is growing concern that demand for the new crop will be even greater than the previous crop, which could

pointing export sales figures released this morning by the U.S. Agriculture Department, but prices saw some support from the continued dry weather in key Midwest growing regions

Wheat futures were pressured by unexpectedly low export sales figures and by a report that predicted increased world grain stocks this year

Wheat for September delivery fell % cent to \$3.551/2 a bushel; December corn was unchanged at \$2,6315 a bushel: December gats fell 1/2 cent to \$1.64 a bushel; November sovbeans rose 1 cent to \$6.35 a bushel
