





Helicopter on truck smashes into overpass

KENOSHA, Wis. - A helicopter being transported by a truck smashed into an Interstate 94 overpass west of Kenosha, authorities said.

The helicopter was being transported by Worldwide Aircraft Recovery of Rockford, Ill., to the museum about two miles from the accident site.

"It came halfway across the country and then splatted," Wisconsin State Patrol Sgt. Glen Jones said.

The crash Thursday sent into traffic small pieces of the CH54 SkyCrane, which was being moved from Carson City, Nev., to the Kenosha County Military Museum.


Some cars were hit by flying debris and sustained minor damage, authorities said, but no one was reported injured.

"We've moved 17 of these helicopters, all without incident, until this," said Mike Muraski, vice president of the company handling the shipping.

The helicopter's journey began Saturday after the owner of the Kenosha military museum, Mark Sonday, bought it for \$10,000 at a government surplus sale there.

Jones said the load was "overheight," but the transporters had a permit for it. Authorities said the driver, a 35-year-old Illinois man, missed the Highway 165 exit but was attempting to take the next one and head back.

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






claims of schizophrenia. During his trial, Drabing spouted radical class revolution theories and professed an adula-tion for Manson's philosophies and interest in the life and work of Adolph Hitler.





experts have determined the problem with the breaker — and one that malfunctioned last month — was that some pieces needed to be cleaned and re-lubricated, said Illinois Power senior vice president John G. Cook Cook

The lubrication for the joints in question was supposed to last for the life of the breaker, Cook said, adding that Illinois Power was not trying to dodge blame. "That doesn't excuse us from

being able to detect the prob-lem," Cook said. "I think we probably could have been more

proactive. even though we weren't lubricating these joints, in going back and checking the condition of the lubricant of the joints and if necessary expand-ing our program in this area." The breakers were manufac-

The breakers were manufac-tured by Westinghouse Electric Corp. and are used in other nu-clear plants, although he hasn't heard of similar problems in other plants, Cook said. A spokesman for Westing-house did not return a call about the breakers.

the breakers.

Work started Monday to clean Work started Monday to clean and re-lubricate the plant's 75 breakers, which weigh about 1,000 pounds each. Figuring about two weeks for that task to be completed, Illinois Power now hopes to restart the plant Seat 2 Sept. 2. "If it's a few days later or a few days earlier, that's not much

The initial September shutdown led to intense scrutiny from the NRC that uncovered other safety violations and led to a \$450,000 fine.

Decatur-based Illinois Power plans to begin a safety evalua-tion next month by people who are in the nuclear industry but have no affiliation with the com-pany, Cook said. That effort probably will last until early October, he said.

Meanwhfle, the NRC will supply its own safety evaluation team to observe some of the ac-tivities of the independent team. The NRC team will also do its own assessments of the Clinton plant's problems and produce its own report, Jackson said.

changing from one pump in the cooling system to another

During the change, the 4,160-volt circuit breaker should have opened to shut off power to one of the pumps, but it failed to do so. The malfunction once again delayed the restart of the plant's reactor, now scheduled for Sept.

The circuit breaker failed because it was not properly main-tained as instructed by its manufacturer, said Geoff Wright, the NRC's lead investigator into the incident.

The NRC feels the circuit breaker failures in July and Auafter the NRC identified mainte-nance problems early in the year, NRC spokesman Jan spokesman Jan Strasma said.

"The January and February inspections were primarily fo-cused on a different kind of breaker. But we expect corrective actions not to look narrowly but broadly," Strasma said.

The new Sept. 2 restart date for the plant is an estimate and is announced for company planning purposes.

SPRINGFIELD Illinois taxpayers eventually could use their home computer to file tax returns if a pilot project planned by the state is successful.

Ken Zehnder, director of the state Department of Revenue. said Monday the agency plans to begin experimenting with filing via the Internet for 1998 taxes payable in 1999.




