Soybeans were mixed in a narrow range with harvest pressure continuing to influence the market, countered by export demand.

**Wall Street at noon**

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks rose this morning as the first major sampling of September's economic conditions bolstered hopes that inflation and interest rates can remain tame.  
At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 39.05 at 7,984.31, down from the latest in a series of feeble forays back above the 8,000 mark.

Broader stock indicators also advanced as interest rates fell toward their lowest level in more than 1 1/2 years in the bond market following a report on factory activity suggesting that inflationary pressures can remain tame.

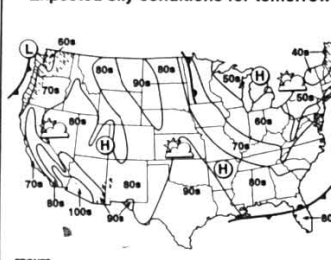

**Man with string of DUIs on record admits he was driving drunk again**

ROCKFORD — A Rockton man admitted in court that he was driving drunk just five weeks after he avoided a jail sentence on another drunken-driving charge.

Donald R. Harrison, 36, who has had seven drunken driving arrests in the past decade, told Winnebago County Judge Timothy R. Gill that he was driving drunk on April 11, a violation of his conditional discharge on a 1993 felony DUI case issued earlier this year.

On Tuesday, Gill — who has not heard Harrison's previous cases — revoked his discharge

on the 1993 case, ordered a presentence investigation and set a sentencing hearing for Nov. 7.

State records show Harrison hasn't had a valid driver's license since 1987.

In August, a Rockford Register Star investigation detailed Harrison's history of drunken-driving offenses. The newspaper reported Harrison has managed to stay out of jail because of a combination of factors: high turnover in the Winnebago County state's attorney's office coupled with heavy caseloads and a judge who accepted plea bargains without question.

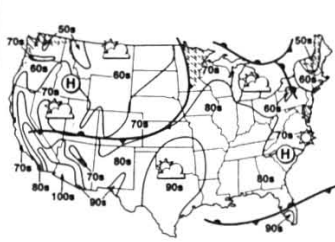

**Board of Trade opening**  
CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures prices retreated early today on the Chicago Board of Trade on harvesting and planting pressures, while soybean futures advanced on strong export sales figures.  
Wheat futures prices were pressured by continued planting of the winter wheat crop, and continued ideas that supplies will be ample to meet world demand.  
Corn futures prices were pressured ahead of active harvesting of the crop and expectations for good weather this weekend.  
Soybean futures overcame pressure by good harvesting weather on the U.S. Agriculture Department's report this morning that ex-

port figures were nearly twice the market's expectations, at 1.41 million tons, the second-largest weekly export figure on record and the largest in nearly 10 years.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1 1/2 cents to \$3.69 a bushel; December corn fell 1/2 cent to \$2.55 1/4 a bushel; December oats fell 1/4 cent to \$1.53 1/4 a bushel. November soybeans rose 2 cents to \$6.22 1/2 a bushel.

Beef futures rebounded from sharp losses a day earlier on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, tied to rumors of an E. coli bacteria outbreak and abundant supplies. Pork futures also rose strongly.

October live cattle rose .02 cent to 66.60 cents a pound; October feeder cattle rose .27 cent to 77.70 cents a pound; October lean hogs rose .57 cent to 68.15 cents a pound; February pork bellies rose 1.22 cents to 63.65 cents a pound.

**Wall Street at noon**  
NEW YORK — Stocks rose modestly at mid-afternoon, extending the previous session's gains despite government reports showing factory orders and worker demand strong but not inflationary levels.

On the floor on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 13.50 points at 8,029.00, remaining above the 8,000 mark after topping it Wednesday for the first time since Aug. 29.

Advancing issues outnumbered advancers by a 7-to-6 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 194.40 million shares, well below Wednesday's level as many traders took the Rosh Hashanah holiday off.

The government report showed August orders to U.S. factories posting their third straight gain. Manufacturing orders jumped 1.3 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$35.4 billion after gains of 0.5 percent in July and 1.7 percent in June, the Commerce Department said today.

But manufacturing gains, though healthy, were led by electronics, with overall manufacturing orders moving less rapidly than the overall August number indicated.

**Caught in swirl of MSI case, public aid chief Wright quits**

SPRINGFIELD — Department of Public Aid Director Robert Wright, who signed a controversial contract with Management Services of Illinois, resigned Wednesday, effective immediately.

In a letter delivered to Gene Reineke, Gov. Jim Edgar's chief of staff, Wright said he was quitting his \$96,000-a-year job because he has become the "subject of continuing controversy."

"That controversy unacceptably diverts attention away from the important work being performed by the department," Wright, 36, wrote. "Therefore, the best interests of both the department and my family require my resignation."

Edgar spokesman Thomas Hardy said Wright was not asked to resign, but Hardy declined to discuss the resignation in further detail, including who would assume control of the agency.

Wright could not be reached at home late Wednesday.

Wright's name frequently surfaced during the federal MSI mail fraud and bribery trial in Springfield that concluded six weeks ago with guilty verdicts against three of the four defendants.

Although Wright has not been criminally implicated in the case, he signed the renegotiated MSI contract that resulted in state payments to MSI soaring from \$400,000 one year to more than \$11 million the next.

Prosecutors said MSI, MSI owner William Ladd, former MSI co-owner Michael Martin and Ronald Lowder, a former Public Aid administrator who went to work at MSI, concocted a scheme to bilk the state out of more than \$7 million to which the Springfield-based company was not entitled.

A jury convicted MSI, Martin and Lowder of mail fraud and bribery charges. Ladd was found innocent.

After the MSI trial concluded, prosecutors said the investigation was ongoing and could result in additional indictments.

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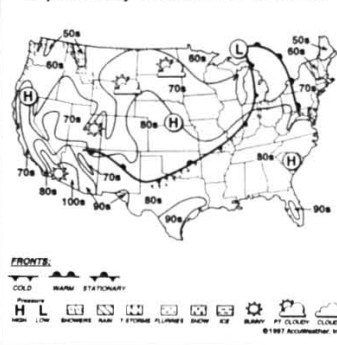

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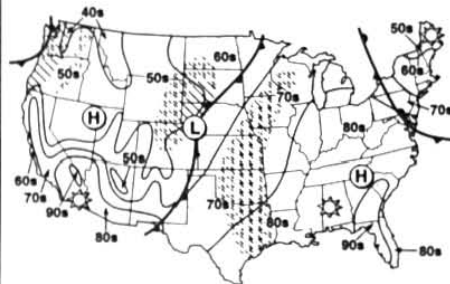

**County's bracelet monitoring system may be in trouble**

CHICAGO — The aging bracelet system Cook County uses to keep track of low-risk convicted criminals and those charged with lesser crimes is beginning to fail, according to a published report today.

The Chicago Tribune, citing a Sept. 23 Cook County Sheriff's Department letter, says the electronic monitoring system has failed nearly 100 times since 1993.

The letter to Cook County commissioners from David Devane, executive director of the sheriff's Department of Community Supervision and Intervention, said the failures lasted a few minutes to more than 24 hours. Devane assured the commissioners that no system crash affected public safety, the Tribune reported.

The electronic monitoring program was established to help relieve overcrowding at Cook County Jail. It places individuals under house arrest, fitting them with a bracelet that allows authorities to keep tabs on them.

The system monitors about 1,100 detainees through a system of modems, bracelets and computers.

**Greenspan puts hex on stocks**

Fed chairman warns that inflation could end good times

NEW YORK — Stocks dove this morning as Alan Greenspan warned against too much optimism in outlook on the economy and the financial markets.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 98.72 at 8,079.59, up slightly from a 115-point setback in its drive to end a two-month drought for record highs.

Broad-market indicators also sank as the latest congressional testimony by Federal Reserve chairman Greenspan derailed a month-long rally in the bond market.

Greenspan, warning that the current economic good times could be cut short if inflationary pressures emerge, told the House Budget Committee that it may be only a matter of time until tight labor markets force wages — and prices — higher.

As bond prices fell, the yield on the 30-year Treasury — a key determinant of borrowing costs — rose as high as 6.36 percent from late Tuesday's 6.23 percent, which was its lowest fin-y since February 1996. Bonds pay a fixed return that's more enticing if the inflation outlook seems benign.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by more than a 2-to-1 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 273.79 million shares, up from Tuesday's pace.

The Standard & Poor's 500 list was down 11.79 at 971.33, the NYSE composite index was down 5.75 at 508.46, and the Nasdaq composite index was down 1.45 at 1,735.82. All three measures closed at record highs on Tuesday.

The Russell 2000 index of smaller companies was down 1.66 at 462.12, and the small-company dominated American Stock Exchange composite index was down 4.54 at 717.36. Both indexes closed at record highs in the last seven sessions.

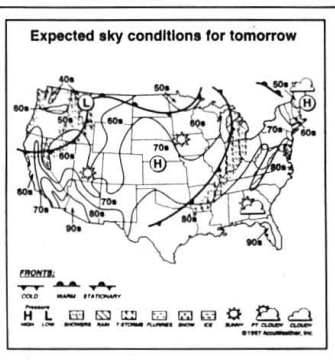

**Deregulation plan comes under fire**

CHICAGO — Instead of a chicken in every pot, Commonwealth Edison and other utility companies in Illinois should adopt a slogan of "a new energy-efficient refrigerator for every customer," according to a pair of consumer groups looking for major revisions in a proposed electric deregulation bill.

The Illinois chapter of Citizen Action and the Environmental Law and Policy Center released a study Tuesday showing that neighboring states have placed more emphasis on energy conservation and efficiency than Illinois utilities and still offered their customers lower rates.

The report comes two days before public hearings are scheduled to begin on an electric deregulation bill that would allow consumers to shop around for their electricity supplier.

John Cameron, state director of Citizen Action, is critical of the bill that passed the House and will be debated later this month in the Senate.

Under the Electric Service Customer Choice and Rate Relief bill, existing residential

electric rates would drop 10 percent in January 1998 and another 5 percent in October 2000.

"It is a customer-oriented bill," said Sandra Allen, a spokeswoman for ComEd. "It's a consumer friendly bill." Even with the rate reductions, Cameron said the average rate for Illinois customers of 9.2 cents per kilowatt hour would be higher than those in neighboring states.

The highest rates would be paid by ComEd customers at 9.6 cents per kilowatt hour, followed by Illinois Power at 8.9 cents, Central Illinois Public Service at 7.3 cents, and Central Illinois Light Co. at 6.9 cents, he said.

After Illinois, Iowa residents pay the highest price per kilowatt hour at an average rate of 8.6 cents. The lowest rate of 6.9 cents per kilowatt hour is paid by Indiana residents, according to the report.

Allen said the Illinois rates are in line with other populous states such as New York and California.

Cameron was critical of the bill's phase-in, under which resi-

dential customers would not be able to choose their suppliers until 2003, while large customers could start choosing in 2001.

Even after 2003, he said, residents deciding to buy from another provider would have to pay their current provider an exit fee, which he compared to paying Domino's to stop at Jewel, until 2008.

Cameron said residential customers should have access to the open market at the same time as large companies.

He believes customers should only have to pay the exit fee until 2001. At that time, officials could determine if the exit fee is still needed.

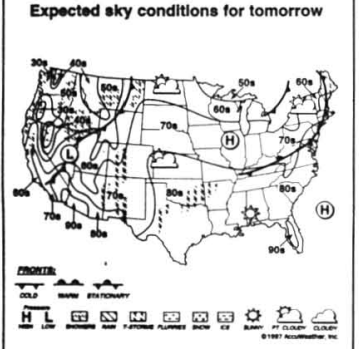

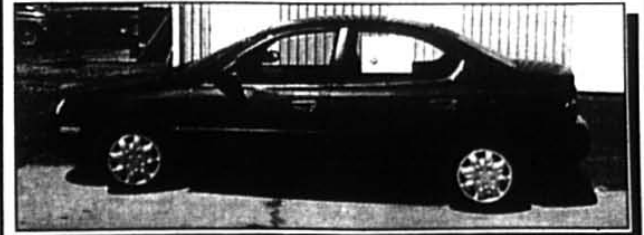

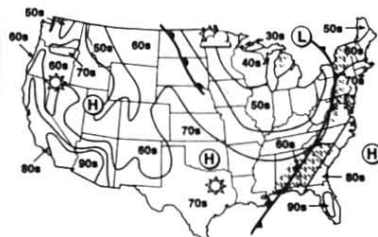

**KNOXVILLE, Tenn.** — Former U.S. Sen. Howard Baker, whose first wife was a chain smoker who died of cancer, has been hired as a lobbyist by major tobacco companies, The Knoxville News-Sentinel reported today.

Senate records show Baker and his law and lobbying firm have been retained by tobacco companies, including Philip Morris, R.J. Reynolds and Brown & Williamson, to lobby Congress.

Baker's firm was hired to lobby on behalf of the industry's

proposed \$368 billion settlement with state attorneys general for dozens of lawsuits.

Part of the money is expected to go to programs aimed at reducing youth smoking, anti-smoking advertising and to help the U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulate nicotine in cigarettes.

Baker spokesman Fred Marcum said Baker — who served three terms in the Senate and was White House chief of staff in the waning months of the Reagan administration — would not comment and referred all questions to Ed Hamberger, an

associate at Baker, Barman &

"I think we're on the side of trying to do what's right," Hamberger said. "Some groups would disagree on some of the details."

The proposed settlement is before Congress. President Clinton has asked that it include financial aid to tobacco farmers and higher financial penalties on the industry if it fails to reduce youth smoking.

Baker's first wife, Joy, was a heavy smoker and died in 1993 after an 11-year battle with lung cancer.

**Army brass names a new sergeant major**

**WASHINGTON** — The Army has decided to appoint Command Sgt. Maj. Robert Hall as its new senior enlisted soldier, acting several days after removing Gene McKinney from the post of Sergeant Major of the Army.

In an announcement, Army Chief of Staff Gen. Dennis Reimer said the assignment was effective immediately. He said he took the step because "the soldiers of the U.S. Army deserve a full-time sergeant major ... who can serve as an advocate for their interests and advise the Army leadership on all matters pertaining to enlisted soldiers."

Last week, the Army announced that it had removed McKinney from the post, one day after the service announced he would face a court martial on sexual misconduct charges. McKinney has denied the charges against him.

He remains in uniform and working on his legal defense at an office near the Pentagon. A public affairs adviser who worked on his staff accused McKinney of making improper sexual advances to her at a hotel.

McKinney was suspended from his post when the charges were made public last February, but he continued to hold the title.

Last week, Reimer said he had "formed no opinion" on McKinney's guilt or innocence, but that he needed to find a new man for the post since the court-martial meant McKinney would not be available to perform his duties "for an uncertain period of time."

Before being named to the post, Hall served for three years as the command sergeant major of the U.S. Central Command at

**Amtrak to begin all-reserved service on route through city**

SPRINGFIELD — Amtrak will begin all-reserved passenger service Oct. 26 on its passenger trains along the Chicago-St. Louis line that runs through Lincoln.

The same policy will apply on trains running the St. Louis-Kansas City, Chicago-Carbondale and Chicago-Quincy routes.

The reservation system will enable Amtrak to guarantee seating for passengers on the four routes and it will enable Amtrak to add capacity when necessary.

There will be no changes in current stops or changes in ticket prices, according to Marc Magliari, an Amtrak spokesman in Chicago.

Amtrak passenger service along the four corridors have operated mostly on an unreserved basis. Amtrak officials feel that by using the reserved seat program they will be able to more accurately predict daily passenger usage.

Amtrak successfully implemented all-reserved services more than two years ago on its Chicago to Detroit-Pontiac and Port Huron, Mich. routes. The lengths of the routes and the markets are similar to the Il-

linois and Missouri corridors.

The Illinois and Missouri changes are expected to lead to improved financial performance on the routes, which are supported by the Illinois and Missouri Departments of Transportation.

While the Chicago-St. Louis corridor served by the Ann Rutledge, Statehouse and Eagle was up slightly, the St. Louis-Kansas City corridor served the Ann Rutledge and the St. Louis-Kansas City Mules was up 19 percent. The Chicago-Carbondale Illini route was up 4.6 percent and the Chicago-Quincy Illinois Zephyr route was up 7.5 percent.

Passengers can make reservations and purchase tickets at staffed Amtrak stations, by calling 1-800-USA-RAIL, via the Amtrak web page at www.amtrak.com or through travel agents.

Tickets will continue to be sold aboard trains when seating is available.

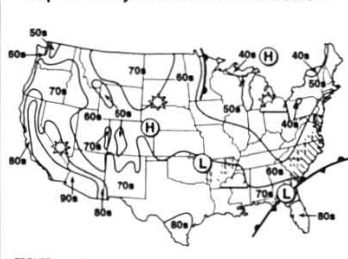

**Star gazers plot strategy for investing**

ROSEMONT — Here's a stock tip — buy stocks this week, the 10th anniversary of the market crash of 1987, but be sure to dump them by June 11.

Why? Because the sun, moon and planets say so.

Such is the conclusion of Hans Lenz, a German who was one of 19 speakers this past weekend at the "World Conference of Astro Economics" in this suburb wedged between Chicago and O'Hare International Airport.

The scores of folks who attended looked as serious and dressed-for-success as those at any business conference in any airport hotel in America.

They believe that astrology can predict stock prices and make them rich.

Lenz has developed a theory that combines the movements of the planets and variations in the tidal forces of the sun. He charts these vectors against movements in the Dow Jones average of stock prices.

Displaying an elaborately drawn astrological chart on an overhead projector, Lenz said, "tidal forces of the sun and the heavens are two different things — not connected in every way."

He says this as matter-of-factly as your high school algebra teacher explaining an equation.

Lenz, with the graying hair and expanding waistline of middle age, also is a student of mainstream economics and writes for the financial press in Germany. His predictions:

Stocks will continue to climb until June, followed by a downturn with a full recovery by October. The market will peak by May 12, 2000. A couple of months after the ensuing crash, "you can start buying again."

That's fine for the market in general, but what about individual stocks?

Grace K. Morris, a suburban Oak Lawn astrologer who sponsors these annual conferences, will tell you.

Morris develops the astrological charts of companies based on the hour and date of their incorporation or their initial public offering.

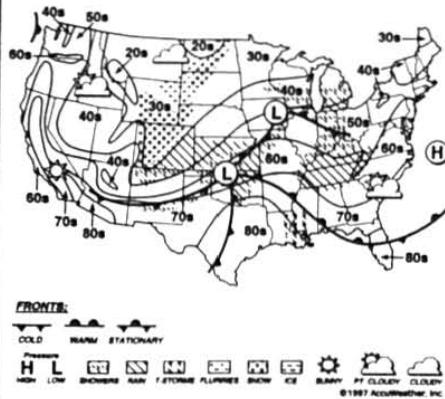

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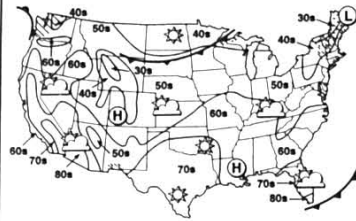

things," she said. "I know the money (United Way) gets goes to good causes. When I have the opportunity to give or help out, I do."

The woman said her own mom, a longtime Springfield resident, has been an active United Way supporter for years. About 100 local families covering 150 "Y" program participants have received partial or full scholarships for local activities, the amounts of scholarship received depending on the program and the need. "Y" director Angie Peters said.

The scholarships enable children with needs to participate in summer camp, day camps, schools-out programs, soccer and "Y" coordinated pre-school activities.

The local "Y" is in its third year as a United Way campaign-funded agency.

Today, the 1997 United Way of Logan County fund drive is at \$30,386, about 30 percent of its \$100,000 goal and buoyed by two early campaign industrial donations.

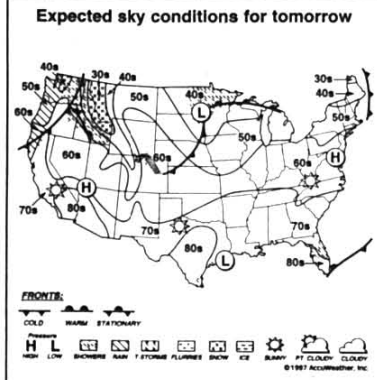

**Panel rejects tougher livestock rules**

SPRINGFIELD — A plan to enact tougher rules on megahog farms and other large-scale livestock facilities was rejected Tuesday by an Illinois Senate panel.

The legislation, based on recommendations put together last summer by a group of Central Illinois lawmakers, attracted just four "yes" votes in the Senate Agriculture and Conservation Committee. Six votes were necessary to send the measure to the full Senate for consideration.

Galesburg Sen. Carl Hawkins, a Republican member of the committee, said the panel's thumbs-down makes it more difficult to improve the Livestock Facilities Management Act during the fall session, which is scheduled to last six days.

Livestock Facilities Management Act, which regulates so-called megahog farms and other large-scale livestock farms.

The facilities, especially hog farms, have become controversial in the Peoria area and elsewhere in Illinois. Environmental groups and others say the massive amounts of manure generated on the hog farms threaten to contaminate the water supply and create an unpleasant odor.

Hawkinson and Shadid said the committee's vote was a disappointment, but they aren't giving up.

Today, two Illinois House committees are scheduled to consider separate legislation also intended to more strictly regulate large-scale livestock facilities.

"If the house can send something over to us, that will give

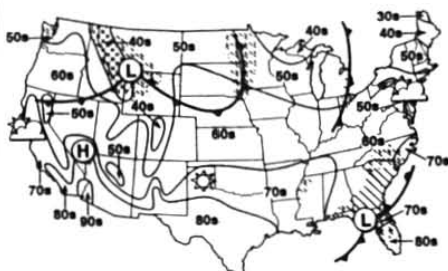

**City receives traffic enforcement grant from state agency**

The Illinois Department of Transportation has approved a highway safety grant in the amount of \$19,800 for the city of Lincoln.

This grant part of a program developed for law enforcement agencies to address traffic safety problems within their communities.

Local police officers will be paid overtime to handle increased enforcement campaigns during the one-year grant period which began Oct. 1.

The program will include at least four six-week campaigns that will be conducted to inform and educate the public about the dangers of impaired driving, speeding, and non-use of safety belts and child safety seats, and to enforce those laws.

Goals of the campaign are to raise safety belt and child safety seat usage rates in Lincoln, and to reduce risk-taking behaviors such as speeding and impaired driving.

through increased education and enhanced enforcement programs such as this grant provides.

icans. In 1994, 1,554 persons were killed in crashes and 152,572 persons were injured. The total estimated cost of all crashes in Illinois for 1994 \$6.4 billion.
