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Prison guard in KKK can lose his job

SPRINGFIELD — The Illinois Department of Corrections has the right to fire a prison guard for Ku Klux Klan activities, a federal judge has ruled.

U.S. District Judge Richard Mills found that DOC officials are entitled to qualified immunity from being sued by a former Graham Correctional Center officer who alleges he was fired because of his involvement in the KKK.

The judge granted summary judgment to the defendants in the suit, state Corrections Director Howard Peters III, Graham warden Kenneth Dobucki and assistant warden David Riegel.

Mills found that Wallace Weicherding, a sergeant at the Hillsboro prison who was fired in November 1993, did not clearly establish that his interest in his association with the Klan outweighed the state's interest in maintaining racial harmony in the prison system.

"We have the ability to bring charges against anyone who conducts activity at work that is disruptive to security," said DOC spokesman Nic Howell. "We didn't fire Wally just because it was the Klan he was promoting. It could have been any organization."

Mills wrote that correctional administrators and officers have a responsibility to operate facilities in a manner safe for inmates and staff, and that it is critical for the staff to be sensitive to the potential for racial violence.

"Plaintiff's affiliation with the Klan could lead to racial tension and incite violence — and defendants were not required to wait until such violence resulted before taking action," Mills wrote.

"Permitting a sergeant affiliated with the Klan to remain at Graham could send the message that the facility condones or even supports the philosophy of the Klan," Mills said.

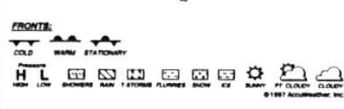
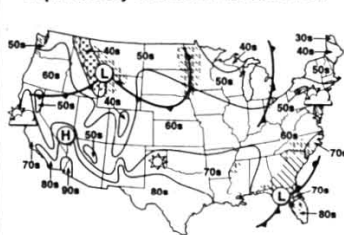

Even with red flags, audit is kind to DCFS

Independent firm says embattled agency is coping well with mushrooming caseloads

SPRINGFIELD — The agency responsible for the state's abused, neglected and abandoned children should keep a closer eye on private caretakers in its employ, an independent audit reports.

The Department of Children and Family Services has generally coped well with the rapid growth in its caseloads, according to a report by Bronner Group Inc. and KPMG.

But the management audit noted inconsistencies and a lack of control over DCFS contacts

children in foster care. The state increased annual funding by more than \$500 million, hired more staff and cut caseworkers' caseload.

But these improvements were undermined by a dramatic increase in the number of children needing care — from 29,500 in 1992 to 53,000 this year.

Unable to cope alone, the agency has relied increasingly on private agencies, such as Catholic Charities, to provide case managers for the children. Private providers are now re-

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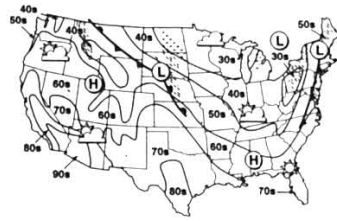

Teachers, board still far apart in North Greene

WHITE HALL — The striking teachers in the North Greene school district have returned to the classroom, even as negotiators are still trying to reach an agreement to end the 2-month-old walkout.

"We took a step backwards today," North Greene Education Association President Paul Hubbard said Monday after an 8½-hour negotiating session.

School board attorney Brian Braun said the session ended with both sides "still miles apart."

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IDOT worker wins settlement over allegations of harassment

URBANA — A former highway worker who said she endured years of harassment from co-workers while employed by the Illinois Department of Transportation has been awarded almost \$1 million in damages.

Cheryl Hathaway of Decatur maintained that she was sexually harassed in instances such as when pornographic magazines were placed open on her desk.

She also said she was the subject of other types of harassment just because she was a woman, with insults directed at her and pranks played on her that male co-workers did not have to endure.

A federal jury ruled Monday that IDOT must pay Hathaway damages of \$130,000 for lost salary and lost pension and \$800,000 in compensatory damages, according to the district clerk's office.

Hathaway began working for IDOT in 1977 as a highway maintainer with a Decatur crew, said her attorney, Mary Lee Leahy.

When she was passed over in favor of a male co-worker in 1989 for a vacant lead worker position — someone who supervises the crew — she filed a complaint with IDOT claiming she was more experienced and qualified.

As a result, the department created a fourth lead worker position and put her in it, Leahy said. But some men refused to work for Hathaway while others slowed down work on the job, Leahy said.

They referred to Hathaway in derogatory terms, scratched her glasses, glued the toilet seat in the women's restroom, greased the telephone before she used it and placed pictures of nude women on their lockers, according to Leahy.

Because of the stress, Hathaway's doctor put her on medical leave. A state doctor said she could go back to work in six months to a year — but not at the same place where she had been harassed, Leahy said.

Leahy said no one ever contacted Hathaway about returning to work for IDOT. When she



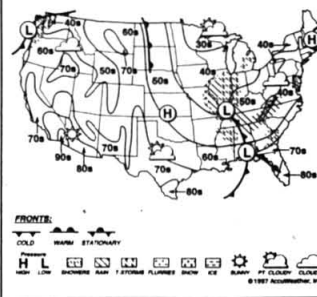

Woman settles false-memory suit

Plaintiff claims hospital convinced her she was abusive satanist

CHICAGO — Patricia Burgus says she's not a satanic high priestess, never participated in ritual murder and never sexually abused her two children.
She claims doctors convinced her otherwise.
Now two psychiatrists and a Chicago hospital will pay Burgus \$10.6 million to settle her lawsuit, said one of her lawyers, Todd Smith.
Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center will pay Burgus \$3.5 million, and the two doctors — identified in court documents as Bennett Braun and Elva Poznanski — will pay the rest, Smith said Tuesday.
The settlement ends six years of litigation in Cook County Circuit Court.

Burgus, 41, accused the hospital of using drugs and hypnosis to convince her she was a member of satanic cult.
Burgus also said doctors persuaded her to hospitalize her two healthy children, then aged 4 and 5, for almost three years.
The hospital and the two psychiatrists did not admit any negligence in the settlement. They argued that Burgus and her two children were seriously ill and denied that any of them was inappropriately treated.
Lawyers for the hospital and two therapists refused to comment on the case.
The techniques used on Burgus were popularized during the 1980s as a way of helping patients recall traumatic experiences doctors believed they had blocked out from memory, Smith said.
Dozens of former mental patients across the United States have since brought cases alleg-

ing that false recollections were implanted in their memories by their therapists.
Burgus first sought treatment for depression after the difficult birth of her second son in 1982, according to her lawsuit. She saw a number of therapists in her hometown of Des Moines, Iowa, before being referred to the Chicago hospital.
There, she said, she was incorrectly diagnosed with multiple personality disorder. She was hospitalized in 1986 and spent over two years in a psychiatric ward.
She said that while hospitalized, she was given a variety of sedative, hypnotic and psychotic drugs in inappropriate doses. She was frequently hypnotized and on some occasions re-

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean futures prices rose early today on the Chicago Board of Trade, while corn and wheat futures retreated.
Soybeans found support after ADM Investor Services analyst Conrad Lesie predicted farmers will harvest a 2.729 billion bushel crop. That's down from his October estimate and slightly above the U.S. Agriculture Department's 2.722 billion-bushel prediction.
The Sparks Cos. forecasting firm on Tuesday also lowered its crop projection, increasing speculation that government on Monday in its November crop update will also lower its estimate or leave it unchanged.
Corn and wheat futures retreated on continued selling tied to fears that long-term demand will be weaker than expected, at a time when supplies are expected to be plentiful.
Wheat for December delivery fell 1/4 cent to \$2.58 1/4 a bushel; December corn fell 1 cent to \$2.79 1/4 a bushel; December oats fell 1/4 cent to \$1.55 1/2 a bushel; November soybeans rose 2 1/4 to \$7.15 a bushel.

Live cattle futures retraced on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, while feeder cattle were mixed. Pork futures prices advanced.
December live cattle fell 27 cent to 66.70 cents a pound; November feeder cattle fell 17 cent to 77.37 cents a pound; December lean hogs rose 22 cent to 62.36 cents a pound; February bellies rose .02 cent to 64.40 cents a pound.
Wall Street at noon
NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks turned higher by midday in another unusually calm session, with some market measures completing a surprisingly speedy recovery from last week's bruising tumble.
The Dow Jones industrial average slipped nearly 25 points during the morning, but was up 32.91 at 7:22:04 shortly after noon.
That's about 7 points above the Dow's level before last Monday's staggering 554-point plunge, but still about 125 points shy of where the blue-chip barometer stood before the financial turmoil in Southeast Asia boiled over two weeks ago.
Broader stock measures were also posting modest gains at midday, with technology issues showing some strength after a strong profit report from Cisco Systems, the bellwether of the computer networking sector.
Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 9-to-8 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 240.91 million shares, about even with Tuesday's brisk pace, but again well below the record-busting levels seen last week.
The Standard & Poor's 500 list was up 1.41 at 842.17, slightly better than its level before last Monday's slide. The NYSE composite index was up 0.95 at 495.01, less than a point from its pre-plunge level.
The Nasdaq composite index was up 6.64 at 1,637.79, led by Cisco, which was up 2 1/4 at 85 1/4. The American Stock Exchange composite index was up 1.29 at 680.66. Both measures, laden with technology issues that are believed more vulnerable to Asia's economic woe, have slightly more ground to recover before they can put last week's troubles behind them.
Overseas, Tokyo's Nikkei stock average fell 0.3 percent. Frankfurt's DAX index rose 1.4 percent and London's FT-SE 100 rose 0.2 percent.

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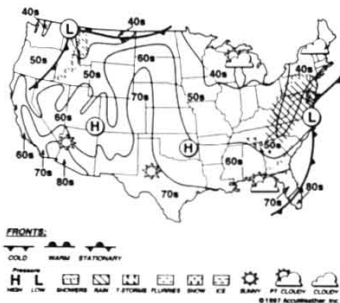

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Wall St. shows jitters about inflation, Far East

NEW YORK — With inflation jitters rekindled at home, the Dow tumbled more than 150 points today after a selloff resumed in leading Asian markets.

The Dow Jones industrial average was down 108.06 at 7,575.18 by early afternoon, a drop of 1.4 percent. It had been down as much as 153 points in the initial selloff before regaining some lost ground.

Broader market indicators also fell sharply. Trading volume, while heavy at 266 million shares in the first 2 1/2 hours, was nowhere near last week's frantic pace.

The retreat snapped three straight days of listless trading that had provided a respite from last week's stunning swings of fortune on Wall Street and had brought the Dow close to recovering all the ground lost in a frightening Oct. 27 selling spree.

"We're not out of the woods yet," said Ned Riley, chief investment officer at the Bank of Boston. "We feel there could still be some corrections ahead of us."

The Dow, which plunged a record 554 points on Blue Monday, Oct. 27, rose a record 337 points the next day. After starting

this week with an impressive 232-point gain, the average of 30 blue chips then treaded water, rising 15 points Tuesday, adding 3 points Wednesday and dipping 9 points Thursday. Even with today's setback, the Dow was up 17 percent on the year, but still below the 28 percent gain when it peaked at 8,259.31 on Aug. 6.

Market jitters re-emerged this morning when Tokyo's Nikkei index fell more than 4 percent to its lowest level in more than two years. Japanese markets were unsettled by a report, later denied, that the Bank of Yokohama will sell its entire stock portfolio within three years to enhance its financial standing. Traders said the report increased fears that other ailing Japanese financial institutions will sell their shares.

Markets in Hong Kong and South Korea also fell sharply today, largely as a result of

worries about currency instability and high interest rates. European markets also were lower, with London's main index closing down 2 percent, and indexes falling 3 percent in Paris and Frankfurt, Germany.

There was none of the panic that animated global market plunges two weeks ago, perhaps because the falls were anticipated, some dealers said.

U.S. bond prices initially improved, reflecting a flight to safety by foreign investors who wanted to hold the highly liquid and secure Treasury issues until the latest turbulence is sorted out.

Bonds later gave up their gains and lost ground on intensified inflation worries.

Fears of rising prices at home were renewed by a government report that labor markets in the United States are even tighter than anticipated.

The nation's unemployment rate fell last month to a 24-year low of 4.7 percent, while the number of new jobs created increased by 284,000, well above analysts expectations.

Jury convicts Illinois man of failing to pay state taxes

CARLYLE — A Brees man who quit paying taxes after coming to the conclusion that money is worthless until spent will appeal his conviction for tax evasion.

Jurors convicted Dale Hedberg, 55, on two counts of failing to pay Illinois income taxes in 1994 and 1995, although he had admitted refusing to pay taxes dating back to 1987.

Hedberg faces up to three years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each count when sentenced Jan. 9.

Prosecutors said Hedberg, who claims to be a citizen of the "Republic of Illinois," earned \$208,888 in 1994 and 1995.

Hedberg, who acted as his own attorney, offered an arcane economic argument as his de-

fense.

"Income has no value," Hedberg told jurors in a monologue Wednesday. "Labor is my investment into my income. I'm not the source of my income. I have not received any payment in a form that is taxable."

Hedberg said the government is misleading taxpayers about the law. His witnesses included a Mexican resident who claimed to be a former Internal Revenue Service agent. The man, Clyde Larue, testified that compulsory taxes only apply to citizens of the United States, which he defined as Washington, D.C., and U.S. territories.

Hedberg also claimed that lawyers and accountants told him he was not required to pay taxes and compared his actions to those of colonial American tax protesters.

They have created a memorial on the spot, with stuffed animals, flowers and a sign that reads "Please stop killing our children."

The truck driver, 31-year-old Elder Galindo, was charged with failure to exercise due care to a pedestrian.

CHICAGO — Oprah Winfrey has given Morehouse College in Atlanta \$1 million for the second time in eight years.

The Chicago-based talk show host's original donation to the men's liberal arts college has funded scholarships for 36 students and has grown to more than \$2.3 million.

"I don't want it to go for paper clips. I want it go to young African-American men," Winfrey said as she announced her second gift before a crowd of Morehouse alumni, friends and supporters Monday in Chicago. The reception was the first of 16 around the country designed to build awareness of and financial support for Morehouse.

Graduates of the only all-male black college in the country include the Rev. Martin Luther

King Jr.; filmmaker Spike Lee; and Maynard Jackson, the first black mayor of Atlanta.

NEW YORK — Not a month after a major study concluded that downsizings are declining, the jobs of more than 15,000 workers were eliminated so that five more companies can fit into their ever-tightening fiscal belts.

Mighty Eastman Kodak, trying to catch up with its feisty competitor Fuji Photo Film Co., said Tuesday it is cutting 10,000 jobs as part of a worldwide restructuring.

Fruit of the Loom said it was ousting 2,900. Waste Management was letting 1,200 go, electronic components maker Kemet Corp. was saying goodbye to 1,000 and Donna Karan International was giving up 15 percent of its work force, 285 people.

as a surprise given the robust state of the U.S. economy — one that President Clinton has declared the strongest in a generation?

Not really. Business analysts say even though a country's overall economy may be doing well, each company still faces its own set of challenges.

Jury acquits mom of killing twin girls

SPRINGFIELD — A jury acquitted a mother Wednesday in the fire deaths of her twin infant daughters, rejecting the prosecution's argument that she was willing to kill her children to get back at her husband.

Angela Barker, 23, was accused of setting the May 8, 1995, fire that killed 2-month-old Marquell and Marques. Marquell died in the fire; her sister died the following day at Memorial Medical Center.

Barker was charged with first-degree murder, aggravated arson and arson. The Sangamon County jurors deliberated about seven hours before finding her innocent.

Prosecutors said Barker set the fire in Marquell's crib.

But Barker told police at the time of the fire that she and the twins were alone when she heard a crash at the back of the home. Within a matter of seconds, she found the twins' room in flames.

The day after the fire, Barker jumped off the Spaulding Dam at Lake Springfield but was not injured. However, she was hospitalized for weeks in a mental health facility.

During closing arguments Wednesday, Barker was alternately portrayed as a caring mother and a woman willing to kill because of conflicts her husband.

"Before Marquell and Marques died, they were with their mother," State's Attorney Patrick Kelley said. "It was their mother who put them in their cribs to die. We don't know if they cried out..."

"What kind of mother would do that to her babies? The answer is right in front of you — right there."

Defense attorney Michael Metnick told the jury the state

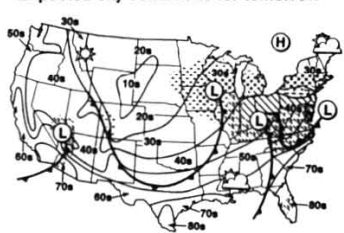

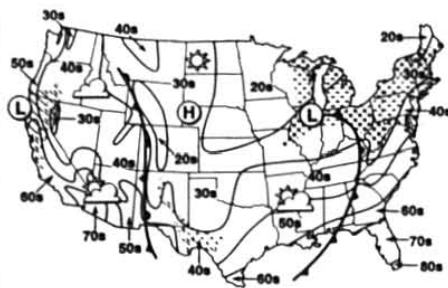

Chicago woman named bishop

BANGOR, Maine — The Rev. Chilton R. Knudsen of Chicago was elected Friday as Maine's new Episcopal bishop, prevailing over four male candidates from New England to become the first woman to head the statewide diocese.

The 450 delegates at the annual convention of the Diocese of Maine elected Knudsen on the fourth ballot to succeed Bishop Edward C. Chalfant, who resigned more than a year ago.

Knudsen, 51, currently serves as canon for pastoral care in the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago. A frequent conference speaker, she is a consultant to churches and dioceses around the country.

Knudsen becomes the sixth woman bishop of the church and the first to serve as spiritual leader of Maine's 20,000 Episcopalians.

Diocese spokeswoman Marylou Lavallee said delegates voted for Knudsen because of her background in pastoral care and spirituality.

"People are more important to her than programs," she said.

Lavallee said Knudsen was first ordained in 1981 after working in the field of biochemistry. Her appointment as Maine's bishop will be formally consecrated this spring, but she will begin work in January.

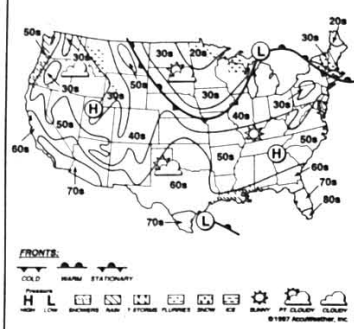

Lawmaker: Health care is a right

 CHICAGO — An Illinois lawmaker wants to make health care a right by amending the Illinois constitution.
 Rep. Michael Boland, D-East Moline, said Sunday he was inspired by the late Chicago Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, who wrote in his 1995 pastoral letter: "Health care is an essential safeguard of human life and dignity, and there is an obligation for society to ensure that every person is able to realize this right."
 Boland would like to put these words into the Illinois Constitution.
 Supporters include Dr. Quentin Young, president of the American Public Health Association, and Bernardin's physician, Dr. Warren Furey.
 More than 1.3 million people in Illinois — about 11 percent of the population — are currently without any form of medical insurance, according to U.S. Census Bureau.
 Boland's amendment would require the General Assembly to enact a plan that would give all Illinois citizens access to regular health care by 2002.
 The measure does not specify

the kind of health plan that should be offered. The General Assembly would have to decide whether to introduce a public, private or mixed plan, Boland said. He plans to introduce the amendment before the General Assembly reconvenes in January.
 To be enacted into the Illinois Constitution, the amendment will need the approval of three-fifths of both houses and 60 percent of the voters in a referendum during the Nov. 4, 1998 general election.

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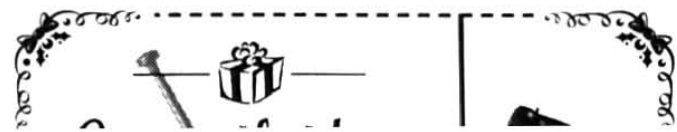

Nurses sue meat plant over hidden camera

JOSLIN — Two nurses at the IBP meat-packing plant in Joslin who say they found a hidden camera in a medical examination room there have filed a lawsuit against the company.

A class-action suit seeking \$1.5 million in damages also was filed against the company Wednesday, alleging that the hidden camera violated the privacy of the more than 100 people examined in the room over a three-year period.

Geri Acuff and Julie Stearns, nurses at the IBP plant in the northwestern Illinois town, found the camera under a ceiling tile in the examining room on Oct. 29, according to court records.

The next day, they were told a supervisor wanted to speak with them. The two allege they were fired after they refused to meet with the supervisor without a witness present.

In a written statement, IBP officials denied the allegations. The company has used a hidden camera to "check out reports of improprieties in a nurse manager's office," but never in an examination room, the statement said.

"We realize no one wants to be unknowingly videotaped, especially in their place of employment," the statement said. "On the other hand, no employer wants to be unknowingly victimized by some of their employees."

The class-action suit seeks \$500,000 in actual damages and another \$1 million in punitive damages.

The room has been used for the last three years to examine employees who are ill or injured on the job, court records indicate.

"The conduct of IBP has invaded the privacy of each of the plaintiffs and each member of the class," the suit charges.

"The discovery of this invasion will cause each plaintiff and class member humiliation and emotional distress. The actions of IBP in recording the examinations without notice or consent are willful and wanton, and in reckless disregard of each class member's rights."

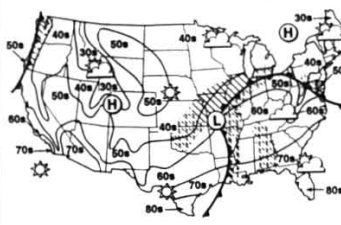

Wall St. rebounds on good news from Asia

Government report on rising income fails to fuel inflation fears

NEW YORK — Wall Street drew confidence from strengthening Asian markets Friday and investors looked for a boost to the U.S. economy on the first day of the holiday shopping season.

On Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average rose 28.35 to 7,823.13 in light day-after Thanksgiving trading, reversing the previous session's modest decline.

The abbreviated trading day ended at 1 p.m., with broad market indexes mostly higher.

The barometer of blue chip stocks was down 57.94 for the week, but it remains up 21 percent for the year.

NYSE volume totaled 189.08 million shares, vs. 484.06 million shares in the previous session. Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a 3-to-2 margin on the Big Board, with 1,693 up, 1,029 down and 551 unchanged.

The Commerce Department's report Friday that Americans'

income grew a healthy 0.5 percent in October, following a smaller 0.3 percent gain in September and 0.6 percent in August, failed to spur inflation fears among investors.

Economists say income gains reflect steady wage increases stemming from low unemployment that has created a tight labor market favoring job seekers.

Spending also increased 0.5 percent in October and, on the traditional first day at the mall for Christmas shoppers, some analysts said holiday sales may exceed recent forecasts for mediocre returns.

"We are seeing many people scale down their optimism for sales," said Russ Labrasca, market analyst at Principal Financial Securities of Dallas. "However, the reality is that sales seem to be off to a fairly strong start."

Asian stocks, which have recently proved volatile, added to American investors' calm. Tokyo stock prices rose Friday for the third straight session on expectations the government will

assist Japan's faltering financial and real estate industries.

Yamaichi Securities Co., a major Japanese brokerage, said it was bankrupt earlier this week.

Malaysia had a similar story, with shares in Kuala Lumpur rebounding as local funds bought into the market, apparently in response to a government fund set up to bail out any failing brokerage houses there.

The South Korean market continues to suffer from currency problems that have driven its stock market down about 20 percent in the past six sessions. However, Japan pledged Friday to participate in an international package to rescue South Korea's economy.

"Much of that news was tempered by the fact that Japan, while we were feasting on turkey, was up 3.5 percent on Thursday and followed through slightly overnight," Labrasca said.

Soybean prices head south in CBOT futures trading

CHICAGO — Soybean futures prices slumped Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade despite robust export sales.

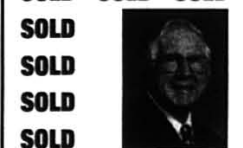
The weekly soybean sales reported Friday by the USDA
