Even with red flags, audit is kind to DCFS

Independent firm says embattled agency is coping well with mushrooming caseloads

SPRINGFIELD The agency responsible for the state's abused, neglected and abandoned children should keep a closer eye on private caretakers in its employ, an independent audit reports.

The Department of Children and Family Services has gener-ally coped well with the rapid growth in its caseloads, according to a report by Group Inc. and KPMG. Bronner

But the management audit noted inconsistencies and a lack of control over DCFS contacts

dren in foster care. The state increased annual funding by more than \$500 million, hired more staff and cut caseworkers caseload.

But these improvements were undermined by a dramatic in-crease in the number of children needing care — from 29,500 in 1992 to 53,000 this year.

Unable to cope alone, the agency has relied increasingly on private agencies, such as Catholic Charities, to provide case managers for the children. Private providers are now re-

CHICAGO - A woman in a wheelchair insists she is no hero. even though she tried unsuccessfully to save a 3-year-old girl from being run over by a truck.

Norma Arnold said she saw Shottees Melton run into the street in front of a semi-trailer on Friday and tried to hold her back.

"I just tried to save somebody," the 57-year-old South Side grandmother said from her bed at Cook County Hospital. "There's nothing heroic about that. That's just the way of life for me.'

Both were dragged under the truck's back wheels. Arnold broke two legs and the child was killed.

Shottees was on her way to a birthday party with her mother and 1-year-old brother.


They were waiting for a bus, when Arnold approached them for change, so she could finish doing her laundry.

They have created a memorial on the spot, with stuffed animals, flowers and a sign that reads "Please stop killing our children."

Jury acquits mom of killing twin girls

SPRINGFIELD — A jury ac-quitted a mother Wednesday in the fire deaths of her twin infant daughters, rejecting the prosecu-tion's argument that she was willing to kill her children to get

willing to kill her children to get back at her husband. Angela Barker, 23, was ac-cused of setting the May 8, 1995, fire that killed 2-month-old Marquell and Marques. Mar-quell died in the fire; her sister died the following day at Memorial Medical Center.

Barker was charged with firstdegree murder, aggravated arson and arson. The Sangamon County jurors deliberated about seven hours before finding her innocent.

Prosecutors said Barker set the

Frosecutors said barker set the fire in Marquell's crib. But Barker told police at the time of the fire that she and the twins were alone when she heard a crash at the back of the home. Within a matter of seconds, she found the twins' room in flames.

The day after the fire, Barker jumped off the Spaulding Dam at Lake Springfield but was not injured. However, she was hos-



Knudsen becomes the sixth woman bishop of the church and the first to serve as spiritual leader of Maine's 20,000 Episcopalians.


Diocese spokeswoman Marylou Lavallee said delegates voted for Knudsen because of her background in pastoral care and spirituality.



Girl, 12, found guilty of killing infant sibling

PEORIA - The ll-year-old girl sat with a cloth doll on her lap, grabbed it around the neck

with her left hand and twisted. That chilling scene from a videotaped confession helped convict the girl, now 12, of killing her 2-month-old half brother. Jessie Duffy, even though she now says the confession was a was a lie to protect her other siblings. "I love my brothers," the girl testified tearfully Monday. "I wouldn't let them get into trou-ble. It seemed to me the police wanted to blame one of the

boys. In closing arguments, prosecutor Mike Spokely said the girl "carefully planned" a coverup, wrapping the drawstring of a laundry sack around Jessie's neck to make it look like the boy had strangled himself ac-cidentally July 30.,

An autopsy showed that a bruised spinal cord stopped Jessie's heart and lungs.

In her confession, which was played in court, the girl said: "I just twisted his neck around. I heard a tearing sound, then he stopped breathing."

She repeatedly said that noth-ing prompted the violence, that she cared deeply for the baby and that her actions that night seemed unreal.

"I don't know why I did that," she said. "I love Jessie. It was like it wasn't me doing it; it was like it was someone else

But in testimony Monday, the girl blamed one of her three other half brothers, a 3-year-old, for the death, saying she found the boy moving Jessie's head back and forth in his cradle and later discovered the boy was not breathing and had a drawstring wrapped around his neck.







Nurses sue meat plant over hidden camera

JOSLIN - Two nurses at the IBP meat-packing plant in Joslin who say they found a hidden camera in a medical examination room there have filed a lawsuit against the company.

A class-action suit seeking \$1.5 million in damages also was filed against the company Wednesday, alleging that the hidden camera violated the privacy of the more than 100 people examined in the room over a three-year period.

Geri Acuff and Julie Stearns. nurses at the IBP plant in the northwestern Illinois town, found the camera under a ceiling tile in the examining room on Oct. 29, according to court records.

The next day, they were told a supervisor wanted to speak with them. The two allege they were fired after they refused to meet with the supervisor without a witness present.

In a written statement, IBP officials denied the allegations. The company has used a hidden camera to "check out reports of improprieties in a nurse manager's office," but never in an examination room, the statement said.

"We realize no one wants to be unknowingly videotaped, especially in their place of employment," the statement said. 'On the other hand, no employer wants to be unknowingly victimized by some of their employees."

25 years of Caring

The class-action suit seeks \$500,000 in actual damages and another \$1 million in punitive damages.

The room has been used for the last three years to examine employees who are ill or injured on the job, court records indicate.

"The conduct of IBP has invaded the privacy of each of the plaintiffs and each member of the class," the suit charges. 'The discovery of this invasion will cause each plaintiff and class member humiliation and emotional distress. The actions of IBP in recording the examinations without notice or consent are willful and wanton, and in reckless disregard of each class member's rights."


