State investigates psychiatrist in murder-suicide

CHICAGO — The Illinois Department of Professional Regulation is investigating a psychiatrist who in 1997 discharged from a mental health facility a suicidal man who went home and shot his wife before killing himself.

Dr. Syet Khadri, 61, is accused of releasing Cornell Poole of Country Club Hills from state-run Tinley Park Mental Health Center on June 26, 1997, before checking medical records stating Poole was threat to himself and others, officials said. Khadri could have his license to practice psychiatry revoked as a result.

Hours after being released, Poole shot his former wife, then turned the gun on himself. Paula Poole, 41, survived a wound to her stomach. Poole, 45, died of a wound to his head.

"In the patient records, which Khadri never read ... various doctors were expressing concern about Mr. Poole's health," said John Goldberg of the agency that regulates doctors. "One doctor said, 'Don't let him off the unit. Don't give him a week-end pass. His ex-wife's afraid he's going to kill her; he's made threatening phone calls.'"

Khadri's attorney, Daniel Cray, said his client's actions are not responsible for the loss of life. Khadri, who is practicing in Willowbrook and Joliet while fighting his firing from the mental health center, claims he had been covering for Poole's regular doctor, who was taking time off, according to court records.

Wall Street starts week by reaching to new levels

NEW YORK — Stocks returned to record levels today, rallying for a third-straight session as last week's sudden bout of interest rate jitters continued to fade.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 70.75 at 9,217.82 after pulling back from a 115-point gain. The blue-chip barometer's all-time best close was 9,184.94 on April 21.

Broader indexes also extended their gains from Thursday and Friday, when a stream of economic reports reinforced the long-standing theme of steady growth without inflation.

The data quickly overshadowed last Monday's reports that the Federal Reserve may

boost interest rates to ease pricing pressures by slowing the economy.

No major reports were due this week until Wednesday, with Friday's reading on April payroll and wage levels — two key forces behind inflation — looming as the most critical.

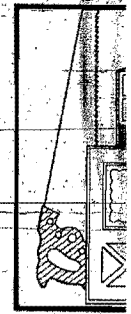
The Standard & Poor's 500 was up 5.45 at 1,126.45, about 4 points shy of April 22's record close of 1,130.54. The NYSE composite index was up 2.41 at 584.32, just below that measure's record close of 585.62, also set April 22.

The Nasdaq composite index was up 10.19 at 1,883.63, while the American Stock Exchange composite index was down 0.05 at 749.81.

Greenspan has investors on edge as stocks drop again

NEW YORK — Stocks pulled back for a third straight session today as interest rate worries mounted before a speech by Federal Reserve chairman Alan Greenspan and a key economic report due Friday.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 34.38 at 9,020.27, extending a 138-point slide from Monday's record high.

Disney, down 4 1/4 at 119 15/16, accounted for a big chunk of the loss in the Dow, which briefly dipped under 9,000 during the morning.

Broad-market indicators also fell again despite today's news that Chrysler has agreed to be acquired by Germany's Daimler-Benz for stock worth more than \$40 billion, or \$60 a share.

Chrysler's shares, which soared more than 7 points on Wednesday after the two companies confirmed their merger talks, jumped 4 1/4 to 53 1/16 today. Daimler's U.S. shares rose 4 1/4 to 112 13/16.

The prospect of mergers in the auto industry wasn't enough, however, to distract attention from today's scheduled appearance in Chicago by Greenspan, and Friday's re-

port payroll and wage levels — a dominant force behind inflation.

Stocks seasawed last week amid conflicting signals on whether the inflation-leery Fed might try to slow the economy with higher interest rates.

There was limited reaction to two reports today indicating that upward pressure on company operating costs — and prices — persist.

The Labor Department reported that improvements productivity — a measure of output per hour of work — slowed sharply to 0.2 percent in the first three months of this year, the weakest showing since the third quarter of 1996. The government agency also reported that unemployment claims fell more

than expected last week.

Together, the reports provided more evidence of a strong economy and job market that could force employers to boost wages as they try to keep up with demand. Without continued improvements in productivity, employers have trouble paying higher wages without being forced to raise prices.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index was down 5.20 at 1,099.72, and the technology-heavy Nasdaq composite index was down 10.83 at 1,845.85.

Declining issues outnumbered advancers by a 9-to-5 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 275.20 million shares, up slightly from Wednesday's pace.

The NYSE composite index was down 1.81 at 572.76, and the American Stock Exchange composite index was down 0.86 at 742.47.

Overseas, Tokyo's Nikkei stock average fell 0.7 percent, Frankfurt's DAX index fell 0.3 percent and London's FT-SE 100 fell 0.9 percent.

Illinois fares poorly in report on children

Foundation says statistics about Illinois kids 'stick out like sore thumb'

WASHINGTON — Conditions for children in Illinois are worse than in any state outside the South and Southwest — including nearly all the state's neighbors and most other big-city states, a new study found.

The Annie E. Casey Foundation's 1998 Kids' Count report ranked Illinois 38th among the 50 states. The ranking was based on 10 indicators for measuring child well-being using figures mostly from 1995, the latest available.

"It does stick out like a sore thumb," said William O'Hare, the Casey Foundation's Kids Count coordinator.

Meanwhile, Wisconsin ranked sixth, Iowa 10th, Indiana 24th, Michigan 27th, Missouri 31st and Kentucky 40th in the study released in Washington.

One advocate for children suggested that part of the blame for Illinois poor showing could fall on the state's "over-reliance on property taxes to fund schools."

per capita in the nation has such poor child statistics, especially its infant mortality rate.

"I've asked that question dozens and dozens of times, but I never get a satisfactory answer," said Stermer, president

comprehensive social services initiatives that we find in other states," he said.

Of the 10 factors, Illinois performed the worst in the number of juveniles arrested for violent crimes. The rate soared from 195 per 100,000 youths between 10 and 17 years old in 1985, to 752 per 100,000 in 1995 — a 286 percent rise. It placed behind only New York, Florida and Pennsylvania.

"There's no talking ourselves out of the reality that we've got real problems with violence among adolescents," Stermer said.

In addition, while the child death rate declined 18 percent nationally between 1985 and 1995, in Illinois it went down just 6 percent. And the rate of teen deaths by accident, homicide or suicide increased 42 percent over the 10-year period in Illinois; it rose only 3 percent nationally during the

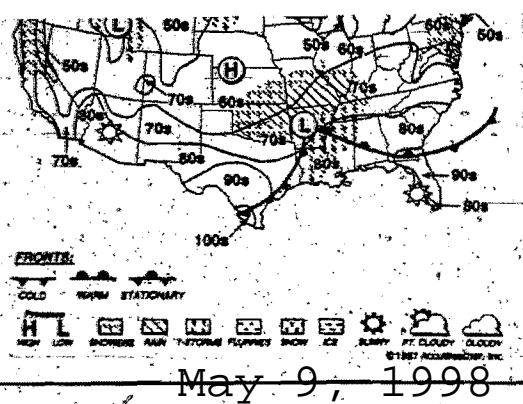

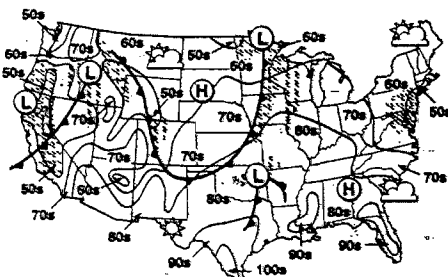

Feds are unable to insure safety of imported fruit

WASHINGTON — More than one-third of all fresh fruit and 12 percent of vegetables consumed in America now come from overseas. But a study released today by Congress' investigative agency said the federal government is unable to ensure that imported foods are safe.

The findings by the General Accounting Office could boost President Clinton's efforts to strengthen the Food and Drug Administration's authority to require that other countries adopt safe practices for fruit, vegetables, fish and processed foods.

If Congress passed pending legislation giving FDA that authority — which the Agriculture Department already has for imported meat and poultry — it would "provide greater assurance that the imported foods it is responsible for are safe," the report said.

The study did not conclude

that imported foods are more dangerous than those produced domestically, but imports grew more than 50 percent since 1990 to reach some \$33 billion in 1996.

There have been some high-profile incidents of illness from imported foods, including Guatemalan raspberries, Mexican cantaloupes and alfalfa sprouts from the Netherlands.

Sen. Susan Collins, R-Maine, who requested the GAO report as chairwoman of the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, said today the findings are "a serious indictment" of FDA inspection systems and promised four in-depth hearings this year to examine the problem.

"We have an obligation to look at the system and fix it," she told reporters.

As for increasing FDA's authority to check practices in foreign countries, Collins said, "I think we should consider it."

FDA spokeswoman Lorrie McHugh said the agency has "long recognized" it needs greater resources with the sharp increase in imports and "hopes that this report is a catalyst for congressional action."

The study found that the FDA's reliance on port-of-entry inspections meant that only 46,395, or 1.7 percent, of more than 2.7 million imported food shipments in 1997 were actually checked by an inspector.

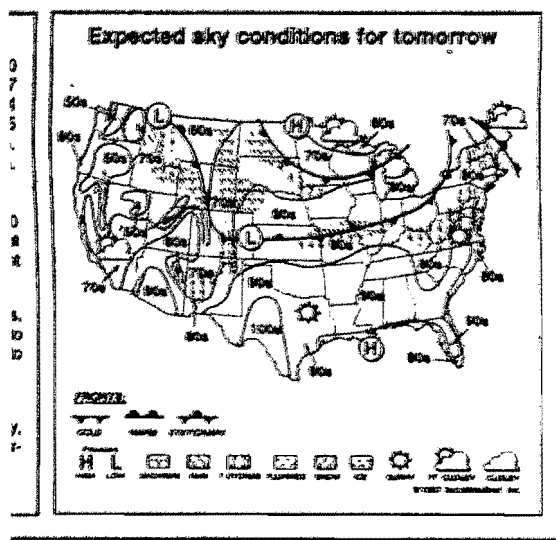

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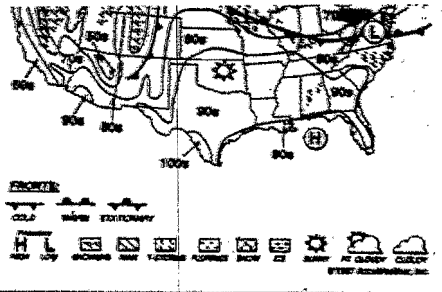

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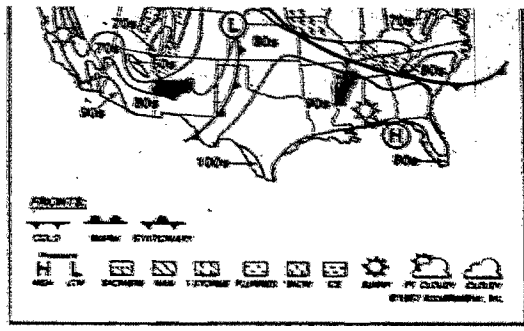

Judge places government's case against Microsoft on fast track

WASHINGTON — A federal judge today put the government's historic antitrust case against Microsoft on a fast track, setting a Sept. 8 trial date that was far sooner than the software company had wanted.

"With the greatest respect for your Honor, that isn't enough time for us," Microsoft attorney John Warden told U.S. District

judge even began to consider the case filed earlier this week by the federal government and 20 states.

But the decision was also a blow for the government, which had wanted Jackson to issue a preliminary injunction before Windows 98, the upgrade to Microsoft's flagship operating system, goes on sale next month.

Instead, the judge's decision

can begin shipping, either to stores or directly to consumers, personal computers with Windows 98 installed on them, Warden said.

Boxed copies of the software will go on sale in stores June 15, although the company's full-scale promotion and advertising of Windows 98 will not begin until June 25, Warden said.

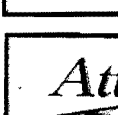

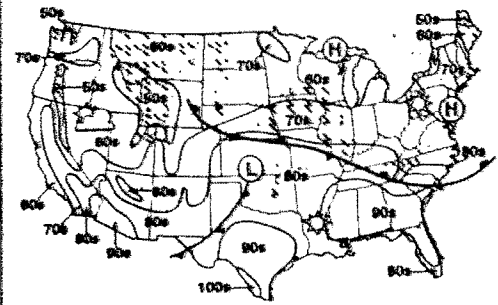

Inside the cafeteria where 15-year-old Kip Kinkel allegedly opened fire, the bullet holes have been patched up and painted over. And students were

welcomed back with a free, hot breakfast.

For those who couldn't face going back inside, breakfast was also offered in an adjacent courtyard.

"Some students will never feel comfortable going back in," said Randy Harvey, the school's director of personnel.

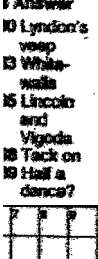
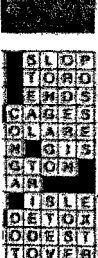
Wearing jeans and backpacks, students held hands and bowed their heads in prayer, sang "Amazing Grace" and read aloud the names of all 24 people

Some brought flowers of their own to put on the fence before they walked inside.

"I'm kind of scared in a way," said 16-year-old Jessica King. "It's going to tearjerker for a lot of people. Everyone is going to come together today."

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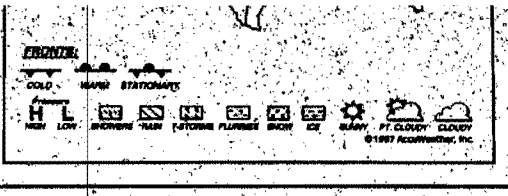

School settles discrimination suit

SPRINGFIELD — School of- ficials say they were right to deny a girl the lead male role in a musical, but they agreed to settle a gender discrimination complaint filed by the girl.

Sara Zinzilieta's smooth, strong tenor voice helped win her the sailor lead in the school's version of the Gilbert and Sullivan musical "The Lass that Loved a Sailor," more commonly known as "H.M.S. Pin- afore."

But school administrators overruled the decision made by Doug Hahn, a theatrical produc- tion expert hired as play direc- tor, to cast her in the part. Hahn quit in protest and the play "Working" was done instead.

Officials say the Springfield High School senior was denied the lead male role because they wanted to encourage boys to participate.

"It could happen again," said school Superintendent Robert Hill. "We believe the school code says we can pick males for

traditional male roles and fe- males for traditional female roles."

Attorneys involved in the dis- pute drafted a settlement Thurs- day in which the school district admits no wrongdoing but agrees to make changes in how it handles future human rights complaints. A State Board of Education hearing officer agreed to recommend the deal to the board next month.

The Coalition to Promote Hu- man Dignity, a group of 25 com- munity organizations, alleged in a complaint with the state board that Zinzilieta had been the vic- tim of gender discrimination, even though she was given the chance to take a female part calling for a soprano voice.

Zinzilieta, who plans to major in music at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale this fall, was relieved the matter seems to be resolved, but she differed with school officials who argue there was no dis- crimination.

"I believe that is false," the 17-year-old said. "Whether it

was or not, I hope that it never happens again in the future to anybody else."

After the settlement was pro- posed, Hill offered the first pub- lic explanation.

He said the school's choral music director had initially agreed with Hahn's casting decisions, but later indicated misgiv- ings to the principal.

"Part of her reason was that she believed that there was a male who tried out for the role who was extremely capable of playing the part, and she be- lieved in the long term the mu- sic program would be served by encouraging male participation by casting males in male leads," Hill said.

The principal overruled Hahn's casting and had the au- thority to do so, Hill said.

Don Craven, the attorney for the coalition, said Zinzilieta did not get the male role for a sim- pler reason: "It's because she is a girl, and that is not a good reason."

CHICAGO — A Chicago funeral home has agreed to stop charging extra fees to families of people who die of AIDS and will pay \$3,000 in damages to one such family, the Justice Department announced Friday.

An agreement between the government and the Vasquez Funeral Home resolved a complaint that the home violated the Americans with Disabilities Act by charging an extra fee for embalming an individual with AIDS.

"Families whose loved ones have died of AIDS should not have to face the added burden of discriminatory surcharges," said Bill Lann Lee, acting Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights.
