Ex-Decatur mayor, lawmaker James Rupp dies

DECATUR — James Rupp, a former mayor and state senator known as a politician of the people, has died after a prolonged illness. He was 80.

Rupp was Decatur's mayor from 1966 to 1976, then served in the Illinois Senate until 1986, when he was defeated by the late Penny Severns.

"Jim enjoyed being around people and visiting with people, which made him a pretty good politician," said former Decatur city manager Les Allen.

Rupp ran as a Republican when he unseated State Sen. Robert McCarthy, but considered himself committed more to the people than any political party.

Rupp was born in Kearny, N.J., in 1918, and served in the Navy during both World War II and the Korean conflict. He died Thursday.

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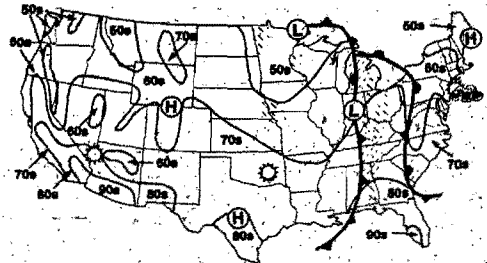

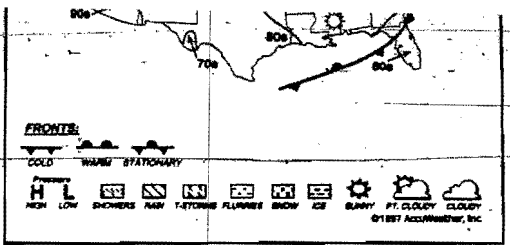

State reopens mound at Collinsville

COLLINSVILLE — The state has reopened one of southwestern Illinois' major tourist sites, Monks Mound, to the public after more than a year of erosion control work.

The 100-foot-high Monks Mound is the centerpiece of Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site, which draws about 400,000 visitors a year.

Site manager Neil Rangen said Wednesday the mound has been open for about a week. Rangen said a Capital Development Board officer decided that the repair project was complete enough to reopen the mound.

Erosion, caused by weather and visitors who disobey rules and don't use the steps to climb to the top, is now being resisted with four drains and a moisture-

monitoring system, Rangen said. The project also removed rotting wooden steps, replacing them with concrete repainted to resemble the original wood.

Originally estimated to cost about \$2.6 million, the repairs actually cost only \$740,000, Rangen said.

The repair work also led to the accidental discovery of a stone structure at least 32 feet long beneath the mound.

The structure was found Jan. 24 during drilling to construct a water-drainage system within Monks Mound.

"This is astounding," said William Woods, an archaeologist with Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville who is leading the investigation of the mystery structure. "It's so unexpected that it would never have

entered your mind before."

Monks Mound is the largest Indian mound north of Mexico and the largest prehistoric earthen construction in the Americas.

"This is one of the darkest days in the history of Northwestern," said Art Gillihan, president of the United Steelworkers of America Local 63.

The company said the wire division, which makes fencing and nails, hasn't been profitable in three years. The board of directors decided to cease production of agricultural, nail and lawn and garden product lines by the end of the year.

"We deeply regret having to make this decision," Northwestern chairman Thomas Gildehaus said in a statement released Wednesday. "But the accumulated losses of the last three years and the prospects for continuing significant losses make the decision necessary for the overall health of our company."

The company will continue to produce and market manufacturer's wire and cut rod products at its Sterling plant.

Man headed to adoption hearing nailed at courthouse on drug possession charges

EDWARDSVILLE. — A Glen Carbon man on his way to an adoption hearing was arrested on marijuana charges at the Madison County courthouse's security entrance, putting in doubt his efforts to adopt two children.

Wesley Earl Lowry, 34, was charged Thursday with misdemeanor possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. Deputies said they seized 4.9 grams of marijuana and a small pipe used to smoke it.


As his family, relatives and lawyer watched in shock, Lowry was handcuffed and taken to the County Jail. He later was released on \$2,000 bond.

Lowry's arrest caused the adoption hearing to be canceled. The state immediately took under review his family's application to adopt the two children, ages 6 and 4, who have been in the Lowry's foster care for


nearly two years.

His attorney, Barbara S. Joiner of Edwardsville, said she still hoped to salvage the adoptions. She said that if Lowry gets drug counseling, it might persuade the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services to proceed with the adoptions.

"I've been doing this for 19 years, and I've never had this happen before," she said. "It was traumatic to his wife and family."

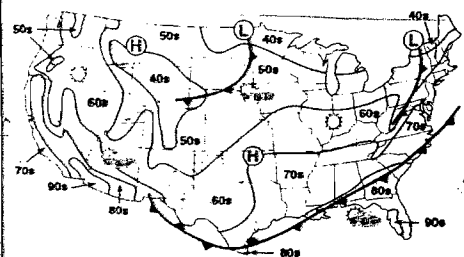

CHICAGO (AP) — Ideal harvest conditions undermined corn and soybean futures prices this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade.

The forecast for next week calls for above-normal temperatures and little or no rain in the Corn Belt. The remainder of this week also is expected to be mostly mild and dry, allowing farmers to accomplish much of the remaining harvest work.

The Agriculture Department said 57 percent of the nation's corn crop already is in storage bins and that in some areas soybean yields are running above expectations, indicating that the overall crop size may be understated.

The fine weather also has allowed winter wheat farmers to get 75 percent of their crop in the ground, below the year-to-year average but picking up.

Wheat for delivery in December was 3/4 cent lower at \$2.90 1/4 a bushel; December corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.21 1/4 a bushel; December oats were 1 1/4 cents lower at \$1.14 1/4 a bushel; and November soybeans were 1/4 cent higher at \$5.52 1/4 a bushel.

Cattle futures were lower but other livestock and meat contracts were higher at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October cattle were 12 cent lower at 64.45 cents a pound; October feeder cattle were 22 cent higher at 70.77 cents a pound; December hogs were 38 cent higher at 48.75 cents a pound; and February pork bellies were 20 cent higher at 48.85 cents a pound.

Moline students shun hemp essay contest

MOLINE — Earlier this spring, a class of sixth-graders wrote letters demanding a billboard for hemp-oil shampoo — featuring what looks like a marijuana leaf — be moved from sight of their school.

Now seventh-graders, many of the same kids have rejected a chance to compete in a \$2,500 scholarship essay contest offered by Alterna, the Los Angeles-based company that makes the shampoo.

Why? Their principal says they didn't like the essay topic. Why hemp is not a drug.

"There was not even a hand that someone would want to participate," said John Deere Middle School Principal William Burrus. "Our kids chose not to do it. They objected to the marijuana leaf, which I think is the symbol for the company's shampoo."

Oil from hemp, a form of the cannabis plant that contains very little of the narcotic ingredient of marijuana, THC, is used in some Alterna's hair products, said Kimberlee Jensen-Mitchell, spokeswoman for the company owned by Moline native Don Christal.

But advocating drugs was not the goal of the essay contest, and essays promoting narcotics would have been rejected, Jensen-Mitchell said. She said the purpose of the essay topic was to promote non-narcotic uses of hemp, as in making textiles and paper.

"It is a completely misunderstood substance. It is my job to dispel the myths and misinformation," she said.

The scholarship would have been placed in a trust fund until the student reached college age. Burrus estimated it would have been worth about \$8,000.

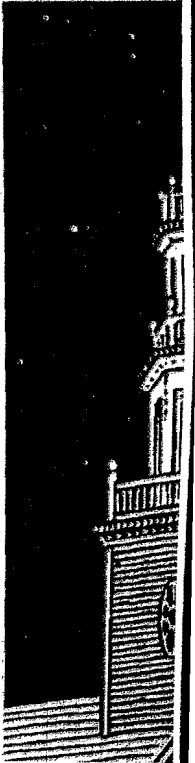

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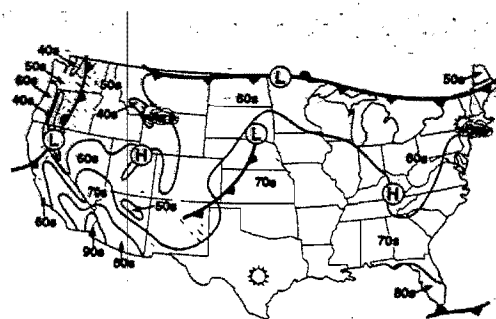

CHICAGO — A United Methodist Church pastor who conducted a marriage ceremony for two gay men has been hit with a complaint that could be the first test of the church's ban on same sex marriage, the Chicago Tribune reported today.

The Rev. Gregory Dell performed a homosexual union ceremony at Broadway United Methodist Church on the city's North Side in September. A complaint was filed with church officials after the ceremony.

preme court of the 9.5-million member denomination declared a prohibition against gay unions was binding church law.

Dell could face a church trial and lose his job but offered no apologies and said he would not stop performing homosexual unions.

Dell has been a leader of a movement within the Methodist Church to recognize same-sex unions. He estimates that he has performed 35 homosexual unions during his 30-year career.

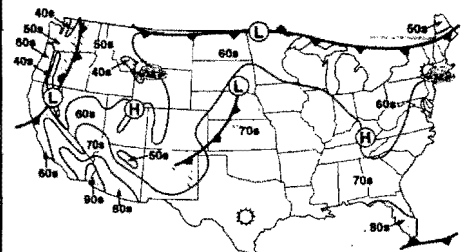

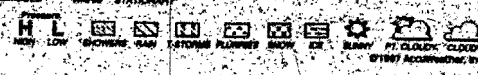

Foes line up to speak against Ameritech takeover

CHICAGO — Illinois government officials and a consumer watchdog group say telephone customers could face higher rates and reduced service if regulators allow a planned takeover of Ameritech by SBC Communications.

The Citizens Utility Board, Attorney General Jim Ryan and Cook County State's Attorney Richard Devine submitted testimony Wednesday to the Illinois Commerce Commission contending the merger threatens competition and could result in a severe cutback in Ameritech's

work force.

The \$60 billion merger, announced in May, would combine two Baby Bells into a local telephone colossus that would cover 13 states and control almost a third of the nation's phone lines.

The testimony from CUB, Ryan and Devine recommends that the ICC only approve the deal if certain safeguards are imposed. These include guarantees that service standards will be maintained, that SBC will maintain a significant work force in Illinois, and that a portion of the savings generated by the merger

will be passed on to consumers.

"Our primary concern is to protect consumers by preserving competition and ensuring quality service," Ryan said in a statement Wednesday. "As it is currently proposed, we have significant reservations about the merger of these telecommunication giants."

Chicago-based Ameritech and San Antonio-based SBC say the merger will be good for consumers and say getting bigger is the key to boosting competition and expanding jobs and innovation.
