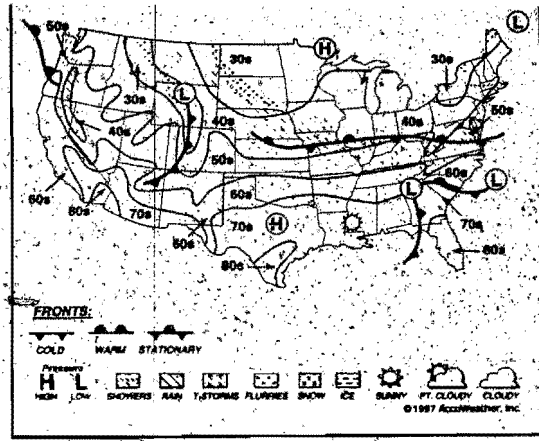

PLANNERS are raising questions about plans to expand a project bringing more passenger planes into O'Hare International Airport at a faster pace than before.

The test procedure to speed the pace of arrivals at O'Hare called Extended Compressorial Procedures, or ECAPS, today's editions, the Chicago Tribune said it is to be expanded today from two hours a day to the hours of 7 a.m. to 10 a.m., except when weather conditions are unfavorable.

The program divides air space near O'Hare into two lanes, one for fast planes and another for slower traffic. Planes in the fast lane are brought into O'Hare ahead of the others, lowering fuel costs and helping passengers make connecting flights. The lanes are 1,000 feet wide vertically.

Local controllers have threatened to add bigger buffer zones between planes, and their union has filed a grievance opposing the expansion of ECAPS.

Most troubling to the controllers is that the changes coincide with repeated malfunctions of a new radar system used to track aircraft, according to the Tribune.

"The controllers are very concerned (about ECAPS), because this is pouring too many planes into too small a gate too fast a rate," said Tom Granger, president of the National Air Traffic Controllers Association at the Terminal Area Approach Control center in Elgin.

**ABC workers stage one-day strike over insurance benefits**

NEW YORK — More than 2,000 ABC employees who work on such programs as "Good Morning America" and "Monday Night Football" walked off the job this morning, staging what their union said would be a one-day strike over health benefits.

There were about 1,100 strikers in New York, 600 in Los Angeles, 300 in Washington and 100 in San Francisco, union spokesman Tom Donahue said.

About 150 writers, editors and camera people also walked off the job this morning in Chicago and were picketing outside ABC-owned WLS-TV studios,

said programming chief Fran Preston.

"So far, we're up and running, but we won't really have a sense of how this affects us until the morning news," at 11:30 a.m. CST, Preston said.

Glenn sleeps in wired-up pajamas

Shuttle crew closes in on research satellite it had released

SPACE CENTER, Houston — John Glenn slept no more than 6½ hours in each of his first three nights aboard the shuttle Discovery.

But when he swapped his pajamas for a more awkward sleep suit — one wired with 23 sensors — he improved that time by a half-hour.

The 77-year-old was back in his sleep gear overnight for the second of four wired-up sessions that are designed to help researchers compare his orbital slumber with that of younger astronauts.

As soon as he got up this morning, he shed the sleep-monitoring equipment, popped an amino acid pill and had his veins pricked again for blood draws.

Discovery, meanwhile, closed in on a 3,000-pound satellite released by the crew earlier in the flight to study the sun. Retrieval was set for midafternoon.

"It's a good day to go and get a satellite," said Stephen Robinson, the astronaut in charge of the satellite capture. This morning's wake-up call — a rock 'n'

roll tune by Stevie Ray Vaughan — was radioed up as a tribute to Robinson; his nickname, because he plays in an astronaut band, is Stevie Ray.

The Spartan satellite was to have captured 1,200 solar images during two days of free flight. Using a mechanical arm, Robinson was to grab the satellite and return it to Discovery for Saturday's trip home.

Glenn's new pajamas consist of a head net and a body suit equipped with electrodes that are stuck on his head and chest to measure brain waves, breathing, eye movement and chin-muscle tension.

On Monday, after his first night of wired-up slumber, Glenn reported sleeping "very soundly" for seven solid hours, despite the getup.

"It's easier to sleep with all that on up here than it is on the ground," he said, explaining that the electrodes don't dig into his skin in weightlessness as they had during practice runs on Earth.

Researchers hope the experiment sheds light on why as-

tronauts often sleep fitfully in space, a problem also experienced by the elderly back on Earth.

For undisclosed medical reasons, Glenn was barred from taking the hormone melatonin as part of the study. Dr. Charles Czeisler, a Harvard Medical School researcher, said that would not spoil the test.

With their nine-day mission half over, Glenn and his six crewmates enjoyed some free time on Monday. The oldest man ever in orbit used his time to stand on his head and watch little balls of water float around.

"Remember when you were a kid and you tried to stand on your head and drink water and get all swung around so you were out of kilter with your reference point? You do that same thing up here very easily," Glenn said.

Glenn also talked with his wife, Annie, for the first time since arriving in orbit last week and participated along with commander Curtis Brown Jr. in another news conference with reporters back on Earth.

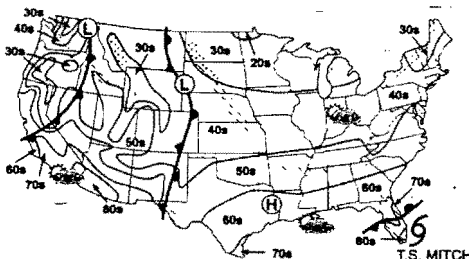

**Prominent family must return boy to ex-addict mom**

**CHICAGO** — A former drug addict today was declared fit to care for her 2½-year-old son, a boy at the heart of a custody battle involving a prominent alderman and his judge wife.

The ruling, making the child no longer a candidate for adoption, is a setback for Alderman Edward Burke and his wife, Illinois Appellate Judge Anne Burke, who have been foster parents for the boy since he was born with cocaine in his system.

Their efforts to adopt the child, known as "Baby T," sparked controversy in part because the Burkes are white and the child is black.

But their political power also became an issue, with the birth mother alleging that it had played a role in efforts to keep her baby from her.

**Democratic surge fuels Wall Street**

**NEW YORK** — Stocks surged higher today after Democrats staged a stronger than expected showing in House and Senate elections, results that likely will slow Republican attempts to impeach President Clinton.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 122.56, or 1.41 percent to 8,828.71, trading above 8,800 for the first time since Aug. 3.

The average of 30 blue-chip

factory orders continue to increase.

Orders to American factories rose 0.4 percent in September, reflecting jumps in demand from the military and for industrial machinery and communications equipment. Orders totaled a seasonally adjusted \$339.2 billion, the Commerce Department said.

Entertainment giant Disney surprised investors today, posting a profit of \$296 million for its latest quarter, a 24 percent

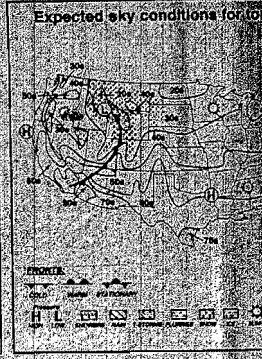

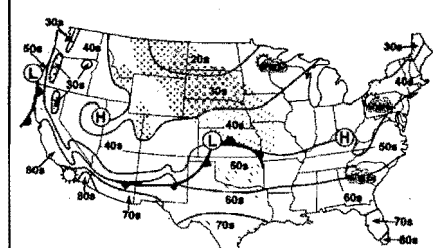

LITTLE ROCK, Ark — GTE Corp. says it will stop providing local telephone service in Arkansas and seven other states by the end of 2000 and focus on the nation's larger metropolitan areas.

The company hopes to raise between \$2 billion and \$3 billion by selling off its local op-

erations in the eight states, GTE spokesman Jeff Jones said.

In addition to leaving Arkansas, GTE also will sell all its local operations in Alaska, Arizona, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

It will sell some lines in California, Illinois, Missouri, Texas and Wisconsin, the com-

pany said.

Jones said GTE wants to do more marketing in the nation's top 50 metropolitan areas, where it can offer a wider range of services.

GTE said 200 or so potential buyers have expressed interest.

The sales will affect about 2,100 employees.

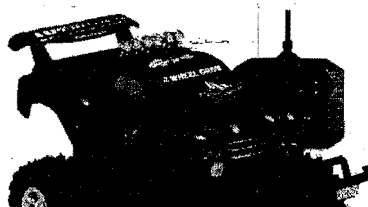

**WASHINGTON** — Rep. Chris Cox of California today withdrew as a candidate for speaker of the House, apparently assuring that Rep. Bob Livingston of Louisiana will

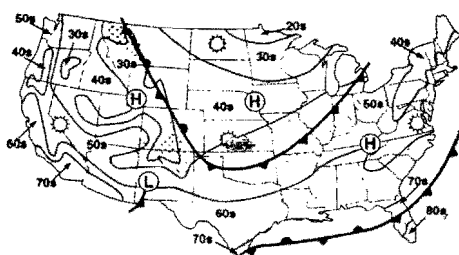

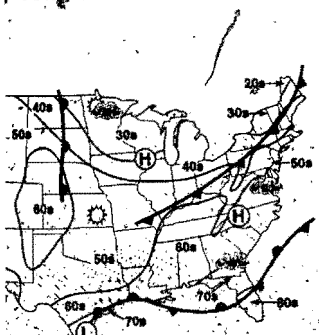

**Wall Street at noon**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Blue-chip stocks rose this morning, while the broad market sagged for a fourth straight day, extending a modest pullback after weeks of huge gains.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones Industrial average was up 58.70 at 8,882.52.

The blue-chip strength also boosted some broad-market indexes after a weeklong flurry of profit-taking that has barely put a dent in the market's rally.

The Dow's three-day losing streak has wiped out just 150 of the 1,500 points the blue-chip barometer had rebounded by since sliding below 7,500 on Oct. 8.

This week's downturn comes as investors wait to see if Federal Reserve officials will cut interest rates for the third time in two months when they meet on Tuesday.

While the rate cuts were meant to stimulate new business in a struggling global economy, the central bank was also looking to ease the flight of money from the world's equity and lending markets, a concern that has clearly abated.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index was up 3.65 at 1,124.62, and the Nasdaq composite index was down 3.55 at 1,859.56 after three days of big gains in the technology group.

Declining issues outnumbered advancers by a slender margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 297.48 million shares, down from Wednesday's brisk pace. Nasdaq decliners led by a 5-to-4 ratio.

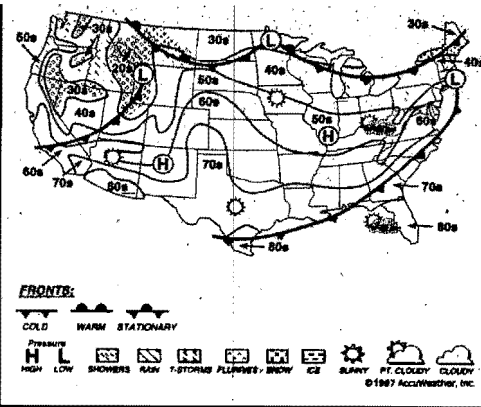

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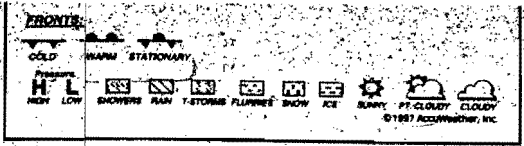

**Caterpillar to stand trial on pollution allegation**

PEORIA — A federal jury will hear a lawsuit asserting that contaminated waste used by Caterpillar Inc. to build a levee along the Illinois River 40 years ago poses a threat to the waterway.

U.S. District Judge Michael Mihm ruled Tuesday that there is a reasonable probability that the river will be damaged by the cyanide, sludge and other toxic substances used by Caterpillar to build up the levee in East Peoria.

"There is at least a realistic danger that the Illinois River will sustain a direct injury," Mihm said.

Caterpillar does not deny the dumping, which took place be-

The plaintiffs, Citizens for a Better Environment, had hoped for a summary judgment against Caterpillar, but a lawyer for the group said it believes it can win the lawsuit which seeks a cleanup of the site, before a jury.

"The case is going forward now," lawyer Stefan Noe said.

"We think our chances are good."

The environmental group sued Caterpillar, the world's largest earth-moving equipment manufacturer, in 1995 during a lengthy United Auto Workers strike. The union was originally one of the plaintiffs, but later dropped its name from the lawsuit.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is also investigating the site and should have a report finished by December, Noe said.

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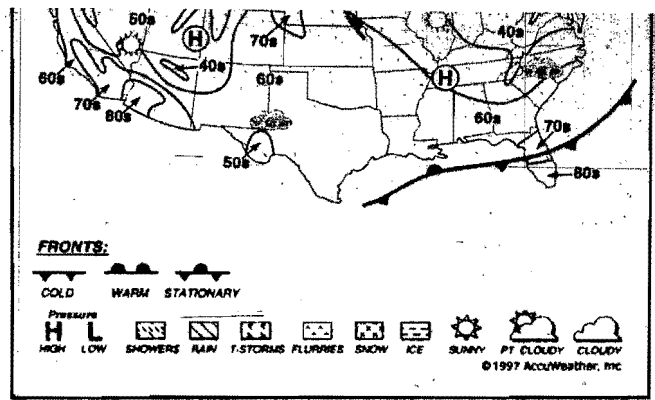

**Murder suspect shows up on doorstep**

CANTON — Richard Schmidt normally would think nothing of family friend Craig Herrick stopping by the house — he had stayed with the family on several occasions in the past three years.

But Wednesday afternoon was different.

When Schmidt's 16-year-old daughter answered the door of their Canton home and saw Herrick walking back to his car, she didn't call out or invite him in. She closed the door and called police.

"My daughter said he was here ... he was here," Schmidt said Thursday. "I got no idea what he wanted. I don't think he will (return) personally."

\$1 million bond was issued on Nov. 11.

Since that time, police have received numerous tips and reported sightings of Herrick. Fulton County Sheriff Dan Daly, however, said police have been unable to confirm any of the sightings.

Within minutes of Herrick's reported appearance Wednesday at Schmidt's 325 Spruce St. home, police from Canton, Fulton County and the state were on the scene, Daly said.

"We couldn't find him anywhere in the area," Daly said.

How Herrick could have strolled into Canton at 2 p.m., knocked on the door of a house he used to live in and then cruised out of town unnoticed

Chevrolet Cavalier, and the report said Herrick had stopped to get a newspaper.

Woodford County deputies searched areas north of Roanoke, including several abandoned houses, but turned up nothing, Sheriff Bill Meyers said.

Herrick is a white male, 5 feet 11 inches tall, weighing between 185 and 214 pounds, with brown hair, blue eyes and tattoos reading "Pride," "Tex", and "White" on his upper arms.

He drives a red-primer colored 1980 Chevrolet Monte Carlo with Illinois license plate number S54104.

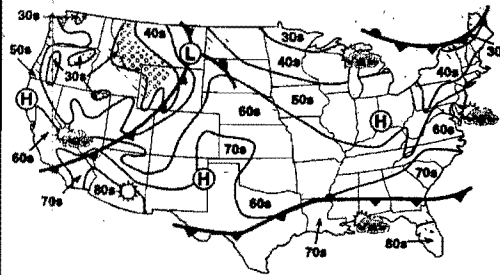

# European Union lifts ban on most British beef exports

BRUSSELS, Belgium — The European Union agreed today to lift a worldwide export ban on the vast majority of British beef, an official said. The development would be a milestone in the "mad cow" crisis that has pitted Britain against its EU allies.

A majority of the 15 EU farm ministers meeting in Brussels voted to scrap the ban on deboned beef despite continued opposition from Germany, according to an official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

British farmers were badly hit by the ban on deboned beef, imposed in March 1996 after Britain announced a possible link between mad cow disease in British beef and a fatal brain ailment in humans called Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease.

"That's quite a move forward," said Ben Gill, President of Britain's National Farmers

month at a meeting of veterinary experts. Eight EU countries at the meeting endorsed the beef export plan. Five opposed it and two abstained.

Today's decision will be followed immediately by a campaign to put British beef back on the plates of consumers throughout the 15-nation EU.

The Conservative government of Prime Minister John Major tried to get the ban lifted and threatened a confrontational policy of non-cooperation with the EU. The Conservative farm minister even refused to heed the call of the European Parliament to discuss the issue.

Relations with the EU improved considerably when Tony Blair became British prime min-

ister in May 1997. EU farm ministers approved a resumption of beef exports from Northern Ireland in March.

In 1995, before the ban, Britain exported about 70,000 tons, or \$1 billion worth of beef.

Now British exporters face the task of reclaiming lost markets.

"It will take some time, perhaps a couple of years and then we'll be back to our normal export trade levels," said Dr. John Mann, superintendent of Smithfield Market, Britain's largest meat market.

**Government orders recall of millions of baby playpens**

WASHINGTON — Millions of playpens are being recalled because they pose a hazard of strangulation for children wearing loose clothing or pacifier strings.

Eight children have died since 1982 when strings around their necks or their clothing got caught on metal rivets sticking out of the playpens, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said Tuesday.

According to the commission, the 9.6 million recalled playpens are portable mesh models that can be folded for travel and storage. They carry the brand names Bilt-Rite, Evenflo, Gerry, Graco, Kolcraft, Playskool Pride-Trimble and Strolee. Some were

strings has been prohibited since 1977, but that does not keep parents from putting pacifiers on string or ribbon after they get them home.

The agency repeated its warning that a pacifier should never be hung around a child's neck.

Two of the eight manufacturers are out of business, but the other six are offering a variety of remedies, including repair kits and cash awards upon proof that a potentially dangerous playpen has been destroyed.

The safety agency said consumers should check the outside top rails of playpens for protruding metal rivets, which are similar to nut and bolt fasteners but have fixed heads than can neither be removed nor tightened.

Broader stock indicators also posted modest losses as investors locked in some gains from a rebound that's carried the Dow nearly 2,000 points higher in about six weeks.

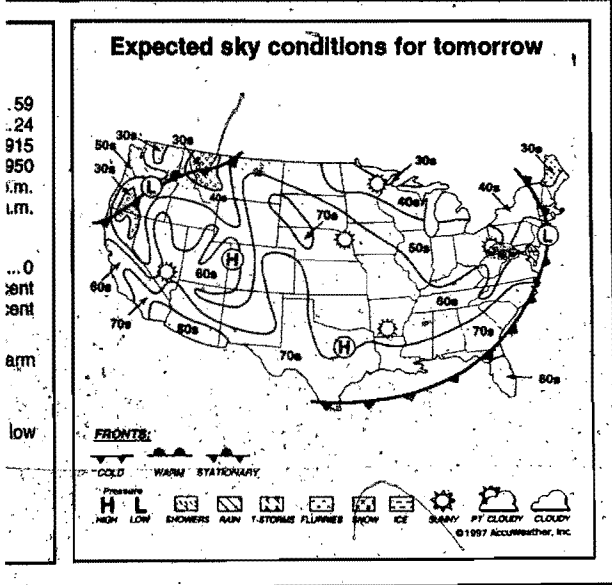

**State money gives boost to school bond issues**

SPRINGFIELD — Voters approved 80 percent of the school building-bond questions this month, encouraged by a program that supplies matching state construction money, educators say.

Of 76 school district requests to borrow money for building projects across Illinois, voters approved 61, according to State Board of Elections figures released this week.

Last spring, 71 percent of building questions passed, according to the Illinois Association of School Boards. But the overall success rate in the previous 18 elections, going back to November 1989, was just 48 percent.

Lawmakers in December created a \$1.4 billion, five-year capital program to provide state money to schools that are overcrowded or need repair. That

might have persuaded voters they wouldn't have to pay with local property taxes alone.

"Many times, people vote against a bond referendum not because they don't know the needs, but because there's a general resistance to property taxes," said Walt Warfield, executive director of the Illinois Association of School Administrators.

Since last spring, state grants totaling \$254 million have gone to 71 school districts, said Dan

Egler, deputy director of the Capital Development Board. Another \$100 million will be allotted as early as next week to districts that recently succeeded at the polls.

Voters in the Nov. 3 election also agreed to more taxes for programs that do not get state assistance. Twelve of 23 school district requests to increase property-tax rates for the education fund — things such as teacher salaries and books — won approval.
