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children.  
Brian Howard and Calvin Grissom talk about their children, too, and how they dance around the inevitable question when they come to visit, "Daddy, when you coming home?"

You try to change the topic, throw them off, "but they keep doubling back to the same question," Grissom says.

"It's the hardest question: you hate to hear 'em ask. After awhile, they give up. All they want to know is, 'When can we come see you again; who's gonna bring us; can we stay?'"

They are people whose low crimes merit harsh punishment and penalties. They are busting prisons and budgets, yet they shy from answering a child's simple question.

Their personal tragedies, multiplied by the thousands, are of great public consequence.

"Everybody agrees we can't build ourselves out of this problem," says Michael Mahoney of the John Howard Association, a prison reform group in Chicago.

Criminal justice officials at all levels know that real savings — financially and socially — are gained through diverting drug offenders to quality treatment instead of prison. Many of them are waging their own battles, increasing alternatives and funding in prisons and courts.

Mostly, it's we high-minded righteous ones on the outside, still clamoring for police to clean up the neighborhood, who don't have a clue about the high cost of zero tolerance.

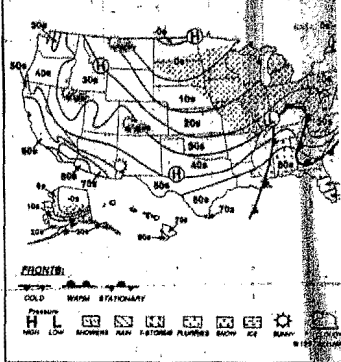

**In places, storm alert went unheeded**

CHICAGO — The great snowstorm of '99 was a no-brainer for weather forecasters who — thanks to modern-day radar, computers and satellites — had a bevy of information at their fingertips.

They knew early on that this storm would be BIG.

As heavy snow and winds began to sweep through the state New Year's night, forecasters urged residents to stock up and stay home.

Still, some Illinoisans didn't heed their warnings.

"They always say we're going to get 2 or 3 inches, and then it turns out to be just some flurries," said Jamie Silver, manager of a Thompson Food Basket in Peoria.

He didn't stock up in time, and storm-frightened shoppers cleaned out the store's milk and bread shortly after opening Saturday.

snow on Macomb, 15 at Joliet and Lincoln, 10 at Decatur, 14 at Galesburg, and about 13 on Bloomington and Peoria, the National Weather Service reported.

Gov. Jim Edgar on Monday declared the entire state a disaster area, making state money available to aid cleanup and recovery efforts.

At least 17 deaths in Illinois were linked to the storm. Most victims suffered heart attacks after shoveling snow.

Several other deaths — including a snowmobiler struck and killed by a train near Zion, and a frozen newborn found on the steps of a church on Chicago's West Side — appeared to be weather-related.

Forecasters had seen signs of what was to come more than a week in advance.

The first clue was an upper air disturbance off the east coast of Asia, tracked by sophisticated weather satellites as it turned into a storm system over the northern Pacific.

Factoring in movement of the jet stream

It was a different story when the state's biggest snowstorm ever hit Jan. 26, 1967 with little warning because "computer modeling was, relatively speaking, in its infancy," Skilling said. Satellites and radar also were much less sophisticated.

And that storm hit on a Thursday, when more commuters were on the streets, making abandoned buses and cars stuck in snow drifts in the middle of major thoroughfares a common sight. In contrast, most major streets in Chicago remained open throughout this year's storm and there were no major traffic accidents.

Even in January 1979, when the city's greatest sustained storm dumped more than 34 inches of snow over 10 days and helped boot an unprepared mayor out of office, weather technology was much less sophisticated than it is now, Skilling said.

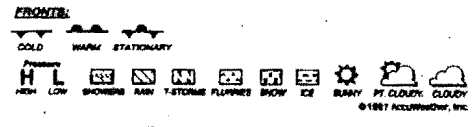
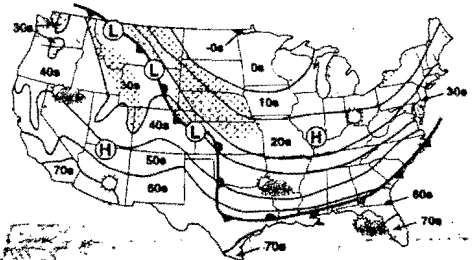

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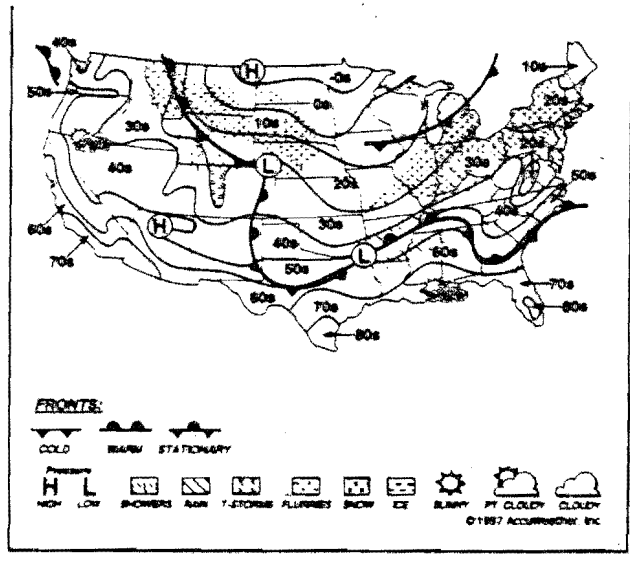

Expert who examined Jack Ruby, Patty Hearst dies

LOS ANGELES — Dr. Louis Jolyon West, a psychiatrist and cult expert who conducted examinations of Jack Ruby and Patricia Hearst, died Jan. 2 of cancer. He was 74.

West headed the psychiatry department and the Neuropsychiatric Institute at the University of California at Los Angeles for 20 years. He retired in 1989.

West frequently served as a court-appointed expert. He testified that Ruby, killer of President Kennedy's assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald, suffered from "major mental illness apparently precipitated by the stress of his trial and its aftermath." West was also one of four psychiatrists who examined Hearst, the kidnapping victim turned bank robber, before her 1976 trial.

The panel found she was sane and able to stand trial but recommended she should be treated before the trial, a recommendation ignored by the court.

West was the first white psychiatrist to go to South Africa to testify on behalf of black prisoners during the effort to end apartheid. He was a member of the White House Conference on Civil Rights in 1966.

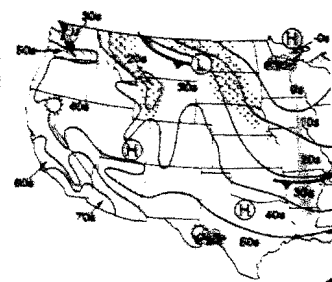

**Hog producers will share \$50 m**

WASHINGTON — Farmers trying to cope with the lowest hog prices in four decades will get \$50 million in government payments, the latest in a series of steps the Clinton administration has taken to shore up the ailing pork industry.

Vice President Al Gore announced the subsidies during a trip Friday to Iowa, whose caucuses kick off the 2000 presidential nominating season. Iowa is the nation's biggest hog producer.

"While we are encouraged by the recent strengthening in hog prices, additional aid is needed to help family farms that produce hogs meet their living and operating expenses," Gore said.

Critics said the money might help, but only a little. The payments would average less than \$600 a producer if they were spread equally among the 85,000 farms that derive most of their income from hogs.

"The administration's plan to shift dollars around sadly

amounts to only a drop in the bucket," said Rep. Larry Combest, R-Texas, who chairs the House Agriculture Committee.

Details about the payments have not been worked out, and Agriculture Department officials said they could not say yet where the money would come from. Hogs and other livestock normally are not subsidized by the government.

"No one in agriculture is going to turn down free money, but \$50 million is a relatively small number in relation to the kind of losses that are being experienced in the hog sector," said Ford Runge, a University of Minnesota economist who is advising potential Gore rival Bill Bradley on farm issues.

But Donna Reifschneider, president of the National Pork Producers Council, said it was the most the administration could do "within its discretionary powers, which should be a signal to Congress that immediate action is desperately needed."

In an additional Agriculture Department make an emergency \$80 million interest used to buy hogs with the swine cycle. That would million hogs out of the cycle and create prices, Gore said.

Hog prices hit a low of \$8 to \$10 a hundredweight in recent weeks, down from a year ago.

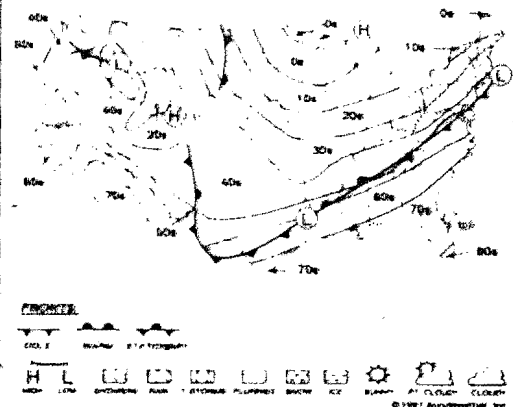

**Stock prices take early plunge, then rebound**

**NEW YORK** — Stocks were lower at midday but trimming their losses after President Clinton said he hoped the crisis in Brazil would be resolved in a satisfactory way.

Brazil's currency devaluation this morning sparked a sharp sell-off at the open. But the selling was short-lived, and by 10:15 the major indexes were cutting their losses.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average

was down 75.33 to 21,929.35. The Dow Jones was down 21.75 to 26,581.50 in the first hour.

Broad stock indicators were also trimming their losses. The technology-heavy Nasdaq composite index, which had been down 101 points at 9 a.m., was down only 17.99 at 10:30 a.m. The Standard & Poor's 500 composite was down 11.25 to 1,228.26, and cutting a loss of 22 points at 10 a.m.

Broad indexes were recovering along with Internet-related

stocks, which continued to show some resiliency. Yahoo! shares, which dropped as low as 332 in the first hour, were trading at 394.30 at 10 a.m.

Declining issues led advances to a nearly 20-to-3 on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to a heavy 464.45, up from Tuesday's pace of 340 million.

Stocks tumbled at the open after the head of the Brazilian central bank, Gustavo Franco, resigned. His replacement,

Francisco Lopes, immediately allowed the Brazilian curze the real to fall 8 percent against major currencies.

Brazil is important to markets because it is a huge porter of U.S. goods, and cause a bad stumble in its economy could send emerging markets tumbling through Latin America.

Brazil's stock market opened in a free fall, with the Bovespa index dropping 10 percent.

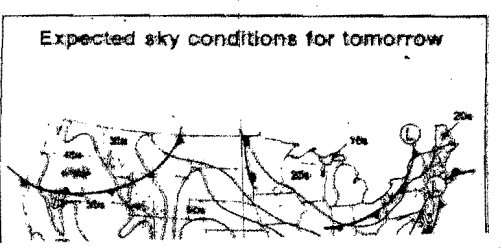

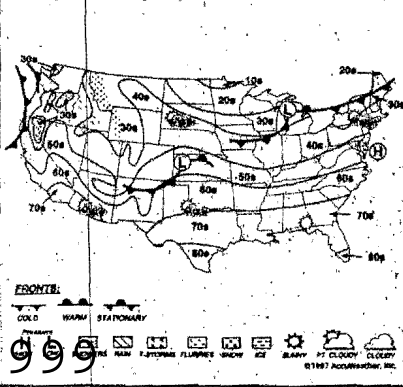

**DiMaggio bounces back, goes home**

**HOLLYWOOD, Fla.** — Once comatose and near death from a persistent lung infection, baseball great Joe DiMaggio has gone home to work on his recovery — and look forward to opening day.

DiMaggio, 84, was released Monday from Memorial Regional Hospital, where he had spent more than three months. He hopes to visit Yankee Stadium in New York to throw out the season's opening pitch April 9.

Mr. DiMaggio wishes to express his thanks to the doctors, ICU nurses and staff at Memorial Regional Hospital for help-

ing him recover from infectious pneumonia, as well as to the 250 million people out there who are praying for him," his lawyer, Morris Engelberg, said in a statement Monday.

Engelberg said DiMaggio was "looking forward to opening day in Yankee Stadium in April."

Hospital officials and DiMaggio's doctor's office refused to discuss his condition at the time of his discharge. DiMaggio will have 24-hour nursing care at his home in Hollywood, according to newspaper reports.

DiMaggio played in 11 All-Star games and 40 World Series in 13 seasons with the Yankees

and his 56-game hitting streak in 1941 is considered one of the greatest feats in sports. He was voted into the Hall of Fame in 1955.

DiMaggio entered the intensive care unit of Memorial Regional Hospital Oct. 12. He had a cancerous tumor removed from his right lung two days later, suffered pneumonia in his left lung and had fluid drained from his lungs several times.

When he slipped into a coma last month, cardiologist Dr. Earl Barron gave him a slim chance of surviving. But DiMaggio woke up and admonished his doctor for providing public updates on his condition.

**USDA to establish new gene research center on Cornell campus**

**IITHACA, N.Y.** — In an effort to provide a valuable resource of genetic data on key crops, the Agriculture Department will set up a national gene research center at Cornell University.

The new facility, the Center for Biogenetics and Comparative Genomics, is expected to open this spring, said Judy St. John, an associate deputy admin-

istrator. The USDA-funded center will aid researchers around the country and the world in the quest to discover all the genes in plants — like corn, wheat and rice — and plants in the family that includes tomatoes, potatoes and peppers. St. John said in a statement released Monday.

Genomics refers to the study of the gene map, and biogenetics is the use of computers to

can use computers to look for similar structures in genome databases of plants, humans, mice and other life forms.

Once a gene's function is identified, scientists can begin experiments to see if that gene can be rebuilt in a way to make it more effective. For example, disease-resistant genes can be moved into plants that lack re-

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Tobacco states do slow burn over Clinton threat

DURHAM, N.C. — Tobacco company executives and officials in states dependent on the crop had nothing but scorn for President Clinton's threatened lawsuit against cigarette makers and an increased tobacco tax.

This industry is under siege, Kentucky Gov. Paul Patton said Wednesday. "There's a limit to what this product can bear, and we're coming close to that limit."

Patton was among representatives from 11 tobacco states and four companies who discussed Clinton's speech as they met in Durham to work out plans for a \$5.15 billion trust fund to assist farmers hurt by the settlement of state lawsuits.

In his State of the Union speech Tuesday night, Clinton

said the federal government would follow the lead of states and sue tobacco companies to recover health care costs of treating sick smokers.

States won \$246 billion, mostly through lawsuit settlements, plus new restrictions on tobacco ads and other industry practices. Federal attorneys have studied the states' strategy.

Administration officials insisted that the decision was made after they determined the government has legal grounds to make its case.

"I have made the decision, after looking at all the information available, after going through the legal issues that are involved, that we can file a lawsuit," Attorney General Janet Reno said today in Washington.

Reno said the suit would be

filed "with all deliberate speed" but noted that the timing and exact legal claims would be worked out by a task force of civil division lawyers that is still being formed.

"There have been vast amounts of monies paid out as a result of this issue. And I think we've got to do everything we can within the law to try to recover that money" for taxpayers, Reno said at her weekly news conference.

Tommie Payne, senior vice president of R.J. Reynolds, said Clinton apparently wants more money from the industry and some political gain from the industry.

"The federal government already makes more money per pack on cigarettes than the companies make," he said. The

federal government makes 24 cents per pack, and R.J. Reynolds makes 9 or 10 cents."

Phil Carlton, a tobacco industry lawyer, said the companies would fight any federal suit "to the last day."

"If there's any federal lawsuit, if new taxes are added by Congress, it will have a terrible impact on the industry," he said. Cigarette makers called the potential federal suit "political."

Administration officials say the lawsuit is independent from Clinton's push to pass tobacco legislation in Congress, but they acknowledge a pending suit could put increased pressure on the industry to cut a deal.

Filthy-rich Revlon chief describes lavish lifestyle in child-support hearing

NEW YORK — The multimillionaire head of Revlon cosmetics testified in a child support battle that his young daughter eats about \$3 a day in food when she is with him.

Ronald Perleman, one of the wealthiest men in the country, reluctantly described his lifestyle and financial worth Wednesday when questioned by a lawyer for his third ex-wife, Patricia Duff. He is seeking almost \$100,000 a month to support

their 4-year-old daughter, Caleigh.

The hearing was held over child support, the question of permanent custody is to be settled in another court. Duff, 44, who was married to Perleman, 55, for about 18 months, has temporary custody of Caleigh.

Perleman, questioned by Duff's lawyer William Beslow, described his financial worth as approximately \$6 billion and described a life with private jets, yachts, deluxe vacations and lav-

ish homes.

Beslow said he wanted to show the court the standard of living Caleigh had enjoyed, saying she should be allowed to continue that standard.

He is seeking \$50,000 a month for direct child support, plus \$40,000 a month for housing and salaries for nannies and a chef, money for vacations, visits with relatives and a second car, bringing the total to around \$100,000 a month.

When Beslow asked how

much he believed Caleigh needed for food, Perleman replied, "When she's with me she eats about \$3 a day, worth of food," including cereal, ham, burgers and pasta.

Perleman is now paying \$12,000 a month child support, plus, as reported, \$125,000 a month for Duff for herself, an amount set in a prenuptial agreement.

Justice Franklin Weissberg cut short inquiries about Perleman's money.
