Suits prompt gun makers to fire back

ATLANTA - As his city welcomed the nation's largest gun and hunting trade show, Mayor Bill Campbell was filing a lawsuit against firearms makers, hoping to convince a jury that guns should be made safer. Bui the gun manufacturers are

But the gun manufacturers are firing back. Unwilling to spend billions to settle litigation as the tobacco industry did, they are joining with the National Rifle Associa-tion to lobby state officials to prevent lawsuits that seek to recover the costs of gun-related

cover the cost violence. "It may bankrupt us, but we are never going to settle,'' said one of the executives attending the trade show, Bob Baker, pres-

Five cities - Chicago, New Orleans, Atlanta, Bridgeport, Conni, and the unified Miami-Dade County government in Florida — have sued various. gunmakers.

Mayors of other cities say are planning similar fitigathey tion.

Campbell announced Thursday that the city has sued 17 manu facturers in state court, claiming their "inherently and unreason-ably dangerous" products are designed negligently and do not adequate warnings or y devices. unpbell promised last month have safety devic

Campbell promised iast month to file the suit and said the city wants to make guns safet; much the way childproof medicine bottles, anti-locking refrigerators and seat belts have become com-mon in recent decades. But the firearms industry and the NRA which boast a million

the NRA, which boasts 3 million the NKA, which boasts 3 million members and relies on more than 80 million registered gunowners, are using their con-siderable political clout to try to halt the lawsuits before the legal fees add using the legal fees and using the legal fees add using the legal fees ad fees add up.

"What the mayors are going to find out is that a direct attack on the freedom to bear arms is the toughest briar patch they can jump into," NRA vice president Waynet a Dierre said





Yes, they are one in the same. A member of the squirrel fam-A member of the squirrel fam-ily, the woodchuck, who's also known as ''squeat pig' in some countries, gets its nickname 'groundhog' from its squat ap-pearance, wadding gait and habit of living in the ground. What most people know about the animal centers around the annual 'Groundhog Day' rit-ifat, when a groundhog appears from its burrow in search of his

from its burrow in search of his hadow.

What many people don't know is that the act was actually sto-len — the legend was bronch

the inert. Anyway, there are many other things about the groundhog that people may or may not know: — Although it, lives on and underground, the groundhog can swim and climb trees. swim and climb trees

swim and climb trees. — It has four large incisor teeth, for biting 'off vegetation and gháwing through roots when tunneling. These teeth keep growing, about 1/16 of an inch per week. SPRINGFIELD - City officials' latest message to wouldbe swimmers in Lake Springfield: "Use at your own risk

"We've decided after many meetings and things that we have done to lift the advisory on Lake Springfield," Mayor Karen Hasara said at a lakeside press conference Monday. The advisory had been in ef-

Hasara and the city's special medical consultant, Dr. Donald Graham, admitted they still do not know how the lake got contaminated with leptospira, the bacteria that causes the rare, water-borne illness.

But after careful tracking of anyone who might have been infected, authorities concluded there have been no cases

July, said Graham. The city's efforts to protect lake users will now switch to an education program.

Most people who became ill after being in the lake revealed some factors that seemed to make infection more likely, said Graham, including having open cuts on their bodies or swallow-

ing water. The city's education campaign will alert potential lake users to risks

these risks. And Graham said physicians and veterinarians in Springfield have been alerted to look for signs and symptoms of lep-tospirosis as part of the city's efforts to nip another outbreak. in the bud in the bud.

in the bud. The city also plans to begin regular water testing at five sep-trate lake sites to look for on-ganisms that get into the lake from continuation with human or animal waste. Leptospira is believed to have contaminated the lake through the urine of in-fectorianmals fected animals
