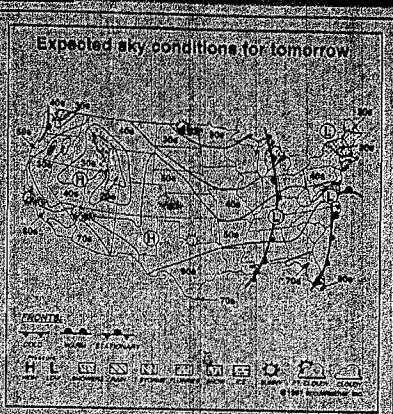

AT&T will offer phone service via cable TV lines

NEW YORK — AT&T Corp. has struck a deal to offer telephone service over Time Warner Inc.'s cable systems in 33 states, greatly escalating the long distance phone company's move into local service.

In addition to phone service, the joint venture will offer interactive digital television and high-speed internet service.

The deal comes as AT&T is close to completing its purchase of Time Warner's biggest rival in the cable TV industry, Tele-Communications Inc. That purchase is expected to be completed this spring.

AT&T said today its acquisition of TCI and arrangements with other cable TV companies will give it the potential to supply local phone service to 40 percent of U.S. households or 35 million homes over the next four to five years.

AT&T's acquisition of TCI is expected to be completed this spring. AT&T is talking with other cable operators about deals, but declined to elaborate.

Customers will pay about 20 percent less for the venture's package of long distance and local phone service than what

other vendors could potentially offer, AT&T chief executive Michael Armstrong told industry analysts this morning. In addition to phone service, the new venture will offer interactive digital television and high-speed internet service.

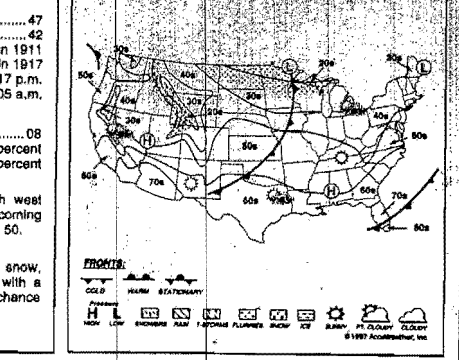

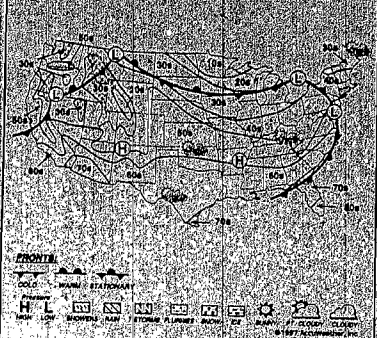



Suits prompt gun makers to fire back

ATLANTA — As his city welcomed the nation's largest gun and hunting trade show, Mayor Bill Campbell was filing a lawsuit against firearms makers, hoping to convince a jury that guns should be made safer.

But the gun manufacturers are firing back.

Unwilling to spend billions to settle litigation as the tobacco industry did, they are joining with the National Rifle Association to lobby state officials to prevent lawsuits that seek to recover the costs of gun-related violence.

"It may bankrupt us, but we are never going to settle," said one of the executives attending the trade show, Bob Baker, president of Freedom Arms Inc.

Five cities — Chicago, New Orleans, Atlanta, Bridgeport, Conn., and the unified Miami-Dade County government in Florida — have sued various gunmakers.

Mayors of other cities say they are planning similar litigation.

Campbell announced Thursday that the city has sued 17 manufacturers in state court, claiming their "inherently and unreasonably dangerous" products are designed negligently and do not have adequate warnings or safety devices.

Campbell promised last month to file the suit and said the city wants to make guns safer, much the way childproof medicine bottles, anti-locking refrigerators and seat belts have become common in recent decades.

But the firearms industry and the NRA, which boasts 3 million members and relies on more than 80 million registered gunowners, are using their considerable political clout to try to halt the lawsuits before the legal fees add up.

"What the mayors are going to find out is that a direct attack on the freedom to bear arms is the toughest briar patch they can jump into," NRA vice president Wayne LaPierre said.

"They think that there is no cost and this is a way to a quick buck, like tobacco money. But

their cost, politically and economically, is going to be high because we're determined to expose this for the sham that it is."

In Georgia, where the Democratic attorney general and governor were both endorsed by the NRA last year, a bill banning such lawsuits passed the House and appears to be headed to easy approval in the state Senate.

Similar legislation is being considered in Louisiana, while the Wyoming Legislature is considering a law that would allow the attorney general to actually represent a gunmaker — if a gunmaker were sued.

Rep. Bob Barr, R-Ga., said he is considering federal legislation that would restrict cities from filing such suits.

Even if the cities won the lawsuits, they probably couldn't recover anywhere near the \$250 billion that the far wealthier tobacco industry paid the states to settle.

Only \$376 million in guns were sold in 1997.

Board of Trade

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Ryan still opposes death penalty moratorium

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. George Ryan remains opposed to temporarily halting executions in Illinois, despite yet another case in which new evidence suggests an innocent man spent years on death row.

"I know people use these reversals as an argument for a moratorium or why the death penalty should be revised, but an argument can also be made that the system is working as designed," Dave Urbank, spokesman for the Republican governor, said Friday.

The estate's long appeals process gave Northwestern University journalism class time to uncover evidence of the death row inmate's innocence, Urbank said. "The media is part of the system," he added.

Illinois in recent years has seen nine men released from death row. A 10th, Anthony Porter, was sent home on bond Friday after another man confessed to the 1982 murders for which Porter was convicted.

While some question the constitutionality of a moratorium imposed by lawmakers or the governor, death penalty critics say these cases suggest Illinois should halt executions and review why so many innocent people have been sentenced to

death. "I think we're facing an uphill battle, but we're getting closer with each revelation of truth," said Rep. Coy Pugh, a

Chicago Democrat sponsoring moratorium

Rep. James Durkin, R-Westchester, argued the Legislature could repeal the death penalty completely but not halt executions. Such a moratorium, if one imposed by the governor would improperly interfere with the judicial branch's power to impose the death penalty and set execution dates, he said.

Ryan would support a review of the death penalty process by not a moratorium, Urbank said.

Durkin said lawmakers would be better off focusing on why innocent people have been sentenced to die. He said a key part

of the problem may be that too many defense attorneys lack the training and experience to handle capital cases.

One scholar, however, said he doubts legislation imposing a moratorium would be unconstitutional. Judges play a role in executions, said University of Illinois

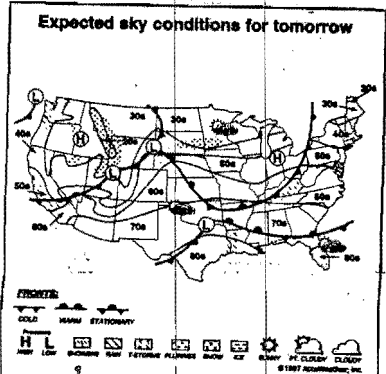

Call me Chuck and let me sleep, OK?

SPRINGFIELD — If a groundhog could speak — and there's no scientific proof that he can't — he'd likely scream at the top of his rodent lungs, "I know nothing about the weather so let me sleep."

He'd probably also ask to be called by his real name, which is "Woodchuck."

Woodchuck. Groundhog? Yes, they are one in the same. A member of the squirrel family, the woodchuck, who's also known as "squeal pig" in some countries, gets its nickname "groundhog" from its squat appearance, waddling gait and habit of living in the ground.

What most people know about the animal centers around the annual "Groundhog Day" ritual, when a groundhog appears from its burrow in search of his shadow.

What many people don't know is that the act was actually stolen — the legend was brought

Badgers aren't commenting on the theft.

Anyway, there are many other things about the groundhog that people may or may not know:

- Although it lives on and underground, the groundhog can swim and climb trees.
- It has four large incisor teeth for biting off vegetation and gnawing through roots when tunneling. These teeth keep growing, about 1/16 of an inch per week. Constant usage wears them down again by about that much each week.
- The burrow dug by the groundhog may be 5 feet below ground and extend for 30 feet.
- The groundhog prepares a nesting chamber, where it can sleep, and makes a separate excrement chamber for his toilet needs.
- The groundhog is a true hibernator: Its heart rate slows down to about four beats per minute, its body temperature is lowered to about 40 degrees

Groundhogs, by the way, aren't welcomed by golf course groundskeepers, farmers and gardeners. As vegetarians, they often destroy crops. Energetic diggers whose holes are also used by rats, mice and insects, skunks, raccoons, foxes, rabbits and snakes, they often leave piles of dirt wherever they feel like it.

Whether or not the groundhog as a predictor works depends on whom you talk to. Folks at the National Weather Service know it only as folklore.

Even if they aren't the most accurate weather forecasters as if there is such a thing — groundhogs do have some value. Because they move a significant amount of dirt in the digging of their burrows, they are credited with valuable soil aeration.

And their hides sometimes are used to make cheap fur coats.

Benigni also picked up best

inated for "The Truman Show" and Benigni shared his nomination with writer Vincenzo Cerami for "Life Is Beautiful." The best film category received nominations for both the foreign language film and best movie was for the 1969 film "Z."

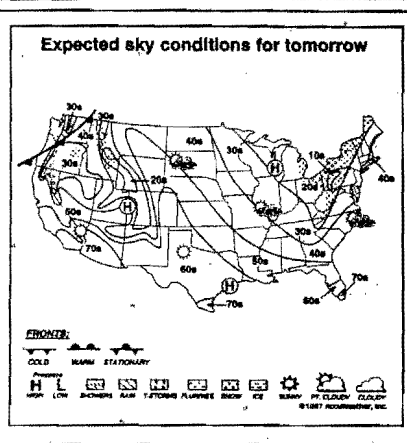

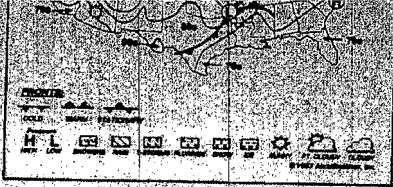

Senior executives from Volvo, which agreed last month to sell its automobile division to Ford Motor Co., have met with officials from Chicago-based Navistar to discuss a buyout offer, the Financial Times reports in today's editions. The newspaper quotes an unnamed source close to the talks.

The report speculated the deal could be worth at least \$3 billion but, added the price could be substantially lower if Volvo acquired only Navistar's heavy truck operations. The discussions may also only lead to some kind of alliance.

A takeover would more than double Volvo's share of the North American truck market, the report said.

Navistar International, the United States' third-largest heavy truck manufacturer, also makes medium-sized trucks and school buses, and builds diesel engines. It exports trucks and

ATLANTA — Watergate figure John D. Ehrlichman confessed to being too loyal to President Nixon — overriding his own judgments in order to do the president's bidding. "I went and lied and I'm paying the price for that lack of willpower," Ehrlichman said in a taped statement filed in federal court in 1977 before he was granted parole for his Watergate crimes.

"If I had any advice for my kids, it would be never to ever defer your moral judgments to anybody. That's something that's very personal. And it's what a man has to hang on to," said Ehrlichman, who had been Nixon's chief adviser on domestic affairs.

Ehrlichman, who suffered from diabetes, died from natural causes at his home in Atlanta on Sunday. He was 72.

Cops arrest 2 for killing at school

ELGIN — Two Elgin teenagers were held on murder warrants today charging them in the fatal shooting of a 14-year-old rival gang member at an alternative high school in this suburb northwest of Chicago.

A 15-year-old boy was arrested late Tuesday night at a friend's house in Wheeling on three counts of first-degree murder, said police Sgt. Tom Linder. The boy is accused of walking into the Ombudsman Educational Services center at midday last Thursday and firing multiple shots from a handgun into Hugo Rodriguez, of Elgin, who was killed.

The 15-year-old suspect was also a student at the school, and police have said Rodriguez was the shooter's intended target. The investigation has been viewed as a gang incident, but the motive is still under investigation.

Linder said. Police also arrested 19-year-old Pablo Morales of Elgin on three counts of first-degree murder. Morales is accused of driving the getaway car used after the shooting and was being transferred to Kane County Jail today.

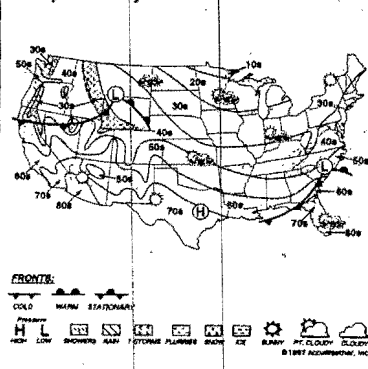

Doctor convicted of sex abuse loses his license

SPRINGFIELD — The state has revoked the medical license of a suburban Chicago doctor who was convicted last year of sexually abusing a female patient in a West Chicago nursing home and accused of similar improprieties at two other nursing homes.

Dr. Luis D'Avic of Skokie hasn't practiced medicine since his license was suspended in November 1997, according to Tony Sanders, a spokesman for the Illinois Department of Professional Regulation.

At that time, The Associated Press reported that D'Avic was practicing with a medical license in good standing despite four accusations of fondling nursing home patients and a 1992 misdemeanor conviction in Cook County for sex-related battery against a male patient in a hospital clinic.

D'Avic was sentenced to six months in jail last May after being convicted in DuPage County of fondling a woman at a West Chicago nursing home in January 1997.

The complaint filed by the Professional Regulation Department alleges similar fondling incidents at nursing homes in Winfield in 1996 and Northbrook in 1997.

Holocaust survivor sues pharmaceutical firm Bayer

TERRE-HAUTE, Ind. — German pharmaceutical giant Bayer AG participated in World War II atrocities committed by Nazi doctors who experimented on Jews, according to a suit filed by a Holocaust survivor.

Eva Mozes Kor of Terre Haute filed the lawsuit Wednesday in U.S. District Court here. With her sister, Ms. Kor was among the hundreds of sets of twins experimented on by the infamous Dr. Josef Mengele at the Auschwitz concentration camp.

Bayer paid Nazi officials for access to those confined in concentration camps and collaborated in Nazi experiments as a form of research and development, plaintiff's lawyer Irwin B. Levin said.

It is impossible to put on a

vidual and corporate evil that the legal system may ever see," he said.

She claims that Bayer monitored and supervised the experiments. Her lawsuit states that prisoners were injected with germs known to cause diseases "to test the effectiveness of various drugs" manufactured by Bayer.

The lawsuit seeks unspecified damages and the recovery of profits it maintains Bayer earned as a result of such research.

For decades, Bayer has denied any involvement in the experiments, refused to offer any compensation and refused to disclose information according to the lawsuit.

Police nab fugitive wanted for deaths of woman, fetuses

FORT JACKSON, La. — An Illinois fugitive accused of killing a pregnant 20-year-old and her twin fetuses in Fulton County is in custody in southeastern Louisiana because of reckless and destructive driving on the grounds of a Civil War fort, authorities say.

Craig Herrick, 21, of Woodford County, Ill., waived his right to an extradition hearing Thursday, Fulton County State's Attorney Edward Danner said.

Herrick is accused of bludgeoning and suffocating Tammy Jo Thompson of Cuba, Ill., then dumping her body in a lake at the bottom of a strip mine. Her husband reported her missing Nov. 1, and her body was found three days later.

Mrs. Thompson was 5 months pregnant, and the arrest warrant charges Herrick with murder and two counts of intentional homicide of an unborn child.

Capt. Charles Guey of the Plaquemines Parish Sheriff's Office said Herrick apparently had been working for 2 1/2 to three months as a carpenter for

an oilfield service company in Venice, La., 775 miles south of Cuba and near the mouth of the Mississippi River.

About 4 p.m. Wednesday, the security officer at Fort Jackson, 10 miles upriver from Venice, called the sheriff's office because a car was "cutting up the grounds, cutting doughnuts," Guey said.

Two deputies went over, looked at the circular gouges in the mud, and drove around until they found a muddy car. They talked to the driver. And, because the car's steering column had been shattered — often something done to stolen cars — they checked its serial number.

The primer red 1980 Monte Carlo was Herrick's, and the driver fit his description. Herrick had last been seen near his home in Woodford County, Ill., driving that car.

Herrick, who will turn 22 on Nov. 28, had been living under the name Chris Miller — a Fulton County resident — and gave deputies that name, Guey said.

He said the deputies arrested Herrick for reckless driving and driving without a license.

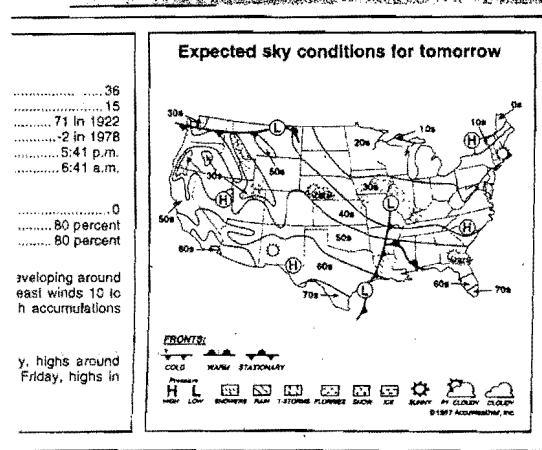

Lake Springfield leptospira alert will be lifted

SPRINGFIELD — City officials' latest message to would-be swimmers in Lake Springfield: "Use at your own risk."

"We've decided after many meetings and things that we have done to lift the advisory on Lake Springfield," Mayor Karen Hasara said at a lakeside press conference Monday.

The advisory had been in effect since July.

Hasara and the city's special medical consultant, Dr. Donald Graham, admitted they still do not know how the lake got contaminated with leptospira, the bacteria that causes the rare, water-borne illness.

But after careful tracking of anyone who might have been infected, authorities concluded there have been no cases of leptospirosis in Springfield since July, said Graham.

The city's efforts to protect lake users will now switch to an education program.

Most people who became ill after being in the lake revealed some factors that seemed to make infection more likely, said Graham, including having open cuts on their bodies or swallowing water.

The city's education campaign will alert potential lake users to these risks.

And Graham said physicians and veterinarians in Springfield have been alerted to look for signs and symptoms of leptospirosis as part of the city's efforts to nip another outbreak in the bud.

The city also plans to begin regular water testing at five separate lake sites to look for organisms that get into the lake from contamination with human or animal waste. Leptospira is believed to have contaminated the lake through the urine of infected animals.

The bacterial testing will act as a sort of early warning system for overall water quality, said City Water Light and Power water division manager Tom

Logan County Health Department workers voted overwhelmingly on Friday to join the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees.

The final tally was 24 in favor of the union, and 9 against.

In the absence of a challenge to the voting, the labor board will certify the union as the "exclusive collective bargaining agent" of the health workers.

Ultimately, AFSCME Council 31 organizer Russell Vogt said today, the health department workers will form their own local and elect their officers. In the meantime, he said, "we will be with them every step of the way."

Vogt said he expects the state certification "within a week," and submission of a contract proposal to the health department within a month.

The official move to unionization by health department workers began Nov. 23, when they filed a petition with the labor relations board asking for AFSCME representation.

That petition included full-time and part-time workers, including clerks, health educators, sanitarians, janitors and maintenance workers, home health aides, public health nurses, and other registered nurses.

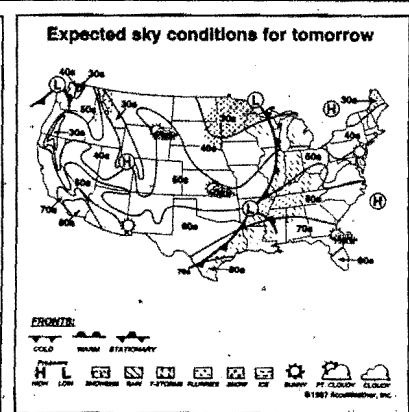

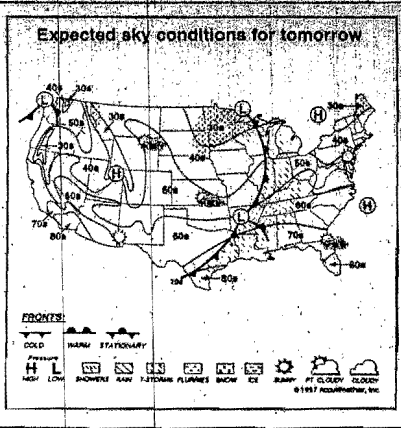
