





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Greenspan calls U.S. economy 'phenomenal'

THE ASSOCIATED PRESE

CHICAGO — Calling the per-formance of the U.S. economy in recent years "iruly phe-nomenal." Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan today credited a strong pickup in workers' productivity for the good times. good times

good times.

But he warned that the global recovery from a severe financial crisis remains fragile.

In a speech to an international banking conference in Chicago, Greenspan said productivity—output per hour of work—had clearly risen recently and he credited large investments being made in computers and other high-tech products of the information age.

It is this increase in productivity that has allowed the economy to grow as rapidly as it has in the past few years without fostering higher inflation, Greenspan said.

"The performance of the American economy over the past seven years has been truly phenomenal," Greenspan said.

His remarks today represented the most thorough view presented so far by the Fed in a debate among economists over what has been responsible for the extraordinary performance of the U.S. economy. The economy has survived the overseas turmoil and continued to expand at a strong clip without inflation.

But in his speech, Greenspan also warned that the gains in productivity cannot keep inflation at bay forever. He warned that the nation's longest peacetime expansion will be threatened at some point down the road by the tight labor markets.

Financial markets were jolted by Greenspan's warnings about the future. Bond prices fell sharply while the Dow Jones in-dustrial average was down 57 points at noon.

"Productivity is the good news, but Greenspan is warning that the good news won't last forever," said David Jones, chief economist at Aubrey G. Lanston & Co. in New York.

Scientists may learn valuable

lessons from killer tornadoes THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

NORMAN, Okla. — The vision of scientists taming deadly storms isn't likely to become a reality, researchers say. They don't even know yet how giant

reality, researchers say, They don't even know yet how giant tornadoes are born.

But a University of Oklahoma researcher who trailed the funnels that killed 41 people last week predicts more may be learned from that May 3 evening than a decade of storm chasing.

""" We're going to make quantum-leaps, I think — I hope," professor Howie Bluestein said Tuesday.

President Clinton, viewing the ruins Saturday of neighborhoods swept away in the storms, suggested seeing if the "frontiers of science can widen to the point where we can dilute the strength of the storm."

"We'll put Oklahoma at the center of that," he said.
But it's unlikely the strength

of storms is something that can
— or should — be tamed, said
Harold Brooks, research meteorologist at the National Oceanic
and Atmospheric Administration's National Severe Storms
Leberts in Nerrae

Laboratory in Norman.
Tornadoes spin from thunderstorms that hold the energy of
"an atomic bomb explosion per
cecond," he said. "If we take
that option away from the thunderstorm, it may respond in
some way that is eyen less
friendly than a tornado."

would support the cost of maintaining the equipment, such as a

Mountain peak records 1.124 inches of snow

"It was the slowest 2 inches of snow I've ever seen fall at Mount Baker," said spokes-woman Gwyn Howat, who spent Tuesday night at a lodge on the mountain so she could be there when it happened, "It was a bit like watching the pot boil." The record came as little surprise to ski center staff. In February, the mountain got so much snow they were forced to close the ski slopes for two days and to lengthen a 25-foot snow measuring stick that lay buried for days.

The center sold record numbers of season passes, used twice the usual amount of dyna-mite for avalanche control, and had to place classified ads for shovelers to help dig out chair lifts and cut down roadside snowbarks, Howat sald, The ski season on Mount

The record is unofficial until validated by the National Climate Extremes Committee — a process that could take several months, said Andy Horvitz, a climatologist at the National Weather Service's Office of Meteorology In Silver Spring, Md.



Bill Pittman of the Springfield Police Department attributed his city's stolen car recordkeeping surge to stricter recordkeepi standards. In the past, he sa officers were unlikely to take a stolen car report if it appeared the car was taken in a family dispute or as part of a drug transaction.

"We're not seeing a greater number of car thefts than before. But where we used to sort out whether or not to take a report. now we always take a report, Pittman said.

The FBI's figures were collected as part of its Uniform Crime Reporting Program, an annual analysis of crime statistics collected from 17,000 city, county and state law enforce-ment agencies. A final report is expected in the fall.

Several Illinois cities of less than 100,000 had substantial in-creases in car theft. Oak Lawn saw an 83 percent increase (from 135 stolen cars in 1997 to 247 in 1998). Decatur experi-finced a 47 percent increase (from 167 in 1997 to 246 in 1998).

While some smaller cities ap pear to have more dramaticpear to have more transactions in crime, authorities warned against reading too much into the figures. For example, police in Grayslake, population 16,967, reported 15 car thefts in 1998—a 150 percent increase from the six reported in 1997.

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



Rezulin, has. But in studies of
over 4,000 patients, Avandia has
not shown signs of such damage,
prompting some doctors to eagerly await the treatment as an
alternative for their patients.

Still, if liver damage is a rare alternative for their patients.

So the FDA stressed today that diabetics who try the new drug should have a liver test before beginning. Avandia, and then have their livers checked every two months durling the first year of therapy.

Anyone with symptoms suggesting liver problems should contact a doctor for a liver test, the FDA warned. Symptoms include unexplained nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, fatigue, anorexia and dark urine or Jaundice. If jaundice occurs, Avandia should be stopped.

Avandia is for Type 2, or adult-onset, diabetes, which afficies about 14 million Americans.
