Survivors include a sister, Rosemary Bode of Lincoln.

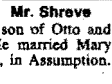

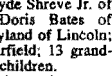

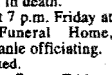

New report fires up Wall Street

NEW YORK — Stocks surged higher today after the government's employment report showed the U.S. economy added jobs at a slower-than-expected pace and that wage growth moderated in August, helping to ease fears about rising inflation.

In midday trading on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 227.33 at 11,070.54.

Broader stock indicators were also sharply higher. The Standard & Poor's 500 index was up 37.04 at 1,356.15, and the Nasdaq composite index was up 93.15 at 2,827.39.

Stocks rose after the Labor Department reported that employers added 124,000 jobs to their payrolls in August and that average hourly earnings, a key gauge of inflation pressures, rose just 0.2 percent from a year

ago. Both figures helped ease concerns that the economy is overheating and that inflation is accelerating. The report also showed that the Fed has raised interest rates for a third time since last summer, and that the Fed is moderating and inflation remains tame. Higher interest rates can help curb corporate profits by raising the cost of borrowing.

Bond prices also rose on the employment report, pushing yields on 30-year Treasuries down to 6.03 percent from 6.12 percent last Thursday.

The market has slipped recently because of a rise in oil prices, but analysts say it is a sign of a healthy economy. The report also showed that the Fed has raised interest rates for a third time since last summer, and that the Fed is moderating and inflation remains tame. Higher interest rates can help curb corporate profits by raising the cost of borrowing.

Bottler lands college contracts while on board

SPRINGFIELD — Soft-drink bottler Harry L. Crisp received exclusive contracts at eight Illinois community colleges during his 10-year stint as chairman of the board that oversees those schools, according to public records.

The soft drink deals could be worth millions over the next two decades for Crisp's company, Marion Pepsi-Cola Bottling Co., the St. Louis-Post Dispatch reported in a copyright story published today.

Some of the contracts were signed by Crisp himself while he was chairman of the state Community College Board, according to records obtained by the newspaper through the Illinois Freedom of Information Act.

Critics who question the ethics of Crisp's collegiate dealings are

calling them a bad mix of business and politics.

"Boy, that smells," said Jim Howard of Illinois Common Cause, a public policy watchdog group. Howard characterized Crisp's college contracts as "just this side of extortion."

Neither Crisp nor a Marion Bottling spokesman returned telephone messages seeking comment today.

Government officials are barred from doing business with state entities, under a new law passed by the Legislature this year. But the restriction doesn't apply to Community College Board chairman or other unpaid political appointees.

A spokesman for the state Attorney General's office said Crisp's soft drink pacts with the schools he oversaw apparently didn't violate any state statute.

State Rep. Jeffrey Schoenberg, D-Evanston, suggested that legislation is needed "to clarify how someone in that position should separate his roles" as public servant and private businessman. He wrote legislation that Gov. George Ryan signed last month that prevents public colleges from taking charitable contributions in exchange for contracts.

Schoenberg also has asked the state auditor and the Illinois Board of Higher Education to review Marion Bottling contracts with the Carbondale campus of Southern Illinois University and John A. Logan College in Carterville. Both deals include pledges from the company to make \$500,000 and \$50,000 contributions to SIU and John A. Logan respectively.

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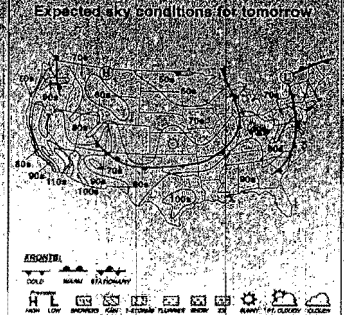

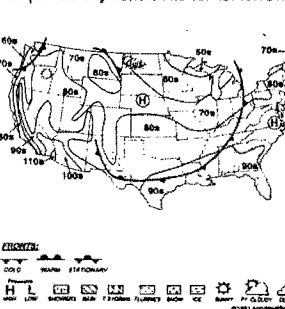

Paul Simon's wife will undergo surgery to remove brain tumor

CARBONDALE — Vision problems prompted Jeanne Simon, the wife of retired U.S. Sen. Paul Simon, to seek medical attention for what turned out to be a brain tumor.

Mrs. Simon, 77, will undergo surgery Thursday at Methodist Hospital in Houston. Doctors say the apparently malignant tumor, said Mike Lawrence, the associate director at Paul Simon's Public Policy Institute at Southern Illinois University.

"Paul described it to me as a small tumor," Lawrence said Tuesday. "I know Jeanne and Paul think the prognosis is good."

The tumor was diagnosed Saturday. Lawrence said Simon told him that no final diagnosis has been made, but that indications are that the tumor is malignant. He did not have additional details on Mrs. Simon's condition. Simon is accompanying his wife to Houston, where they are expected to remain for about a

week after her surgery. Mrs. Simon, a former assistant Cook County state's attorney, was elected to two terms in the Illinois House beginning in 1956. She ended her political career after marrying Simon, a fellow state representative, in 1960. The two honeymooned at the 1960 Democratic National Convention.

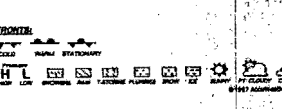

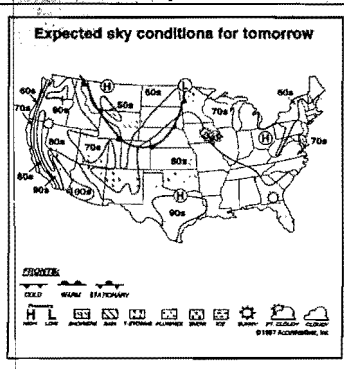

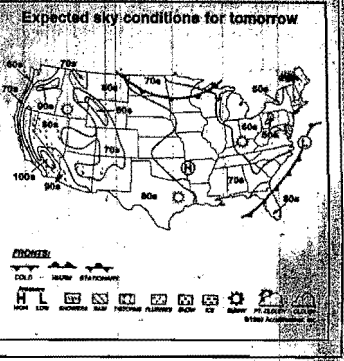

Apple was trading at 71 13/16, down 7 1/4 today.
Declining issues outnumbered advances by a 3-to-1 margin on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 340.57 million shares, up from Monday's pace.
The Russell 2000 index was off 4.68 at 428.61.

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Victim's daughter testifies at trial

BRAZIL, Ind. — The daughter of a 56-year-old pneumonia patient today recounted how former nurse Orville Lynn Majors injected something into her father's intravenous line seconds before the man's eyes rolled back and he died.

Tonya Cottrell testified in Majors' murder trial that she took her father, Freddie Wilson, to Vermillion County Hospital on Feb. 15, 1995, because he was wheezing and coughing.

The next day, her fiancé summoned her to the hospital, and

Majors escorted her into her father's room.

"He said my dad wanted me to know he loved me, and he (Majors) told me to be prepared for what I was about to see," Cottrell said.

Majors went to her father's bedside and injected something into her father's IV tube, she said, choking back tears.

"I assumed he was giving him something he was supposed to have," she told jurors.

"My dad's eyes just rolled to the back of his head, and he was gone," Cottrell said, breaking

into tears and dropping her head into her hands.

Wilson's death certificate said he died of pneumonia, but medical experts have testified his death was consistent with an injection of potassium chloride. Prosecutors allege Majors killed Wilson and six other patients with lethal injections.

Majors, 38, of Linton, has pleaded innocent to the crimes he's charged with. He has said he did nothing to hurt the patients he cared for.

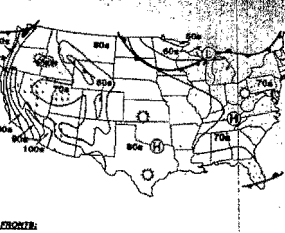

Abortions are down in Illinois

SPRINGFIELD — The number of abortions performed in Illinois declined slightly last year despite a jump in the number of women crossing the border to get abortions.

Some 4,517 out-of-state women had abortions in Illinois last year, a four-year high and a 15 percent increase over 1997.

Abortion critics responded by saying stronger abortion laws are needed in the state.

"I think the General Assembly should ask the question: 'Do we want Illinois to be the place where people come for their abortions?'" said Doug Delaney, executive director of the Catholic Conference of Illinois.

In all, there were 49,403 Illinois abortions in 1998, compared with 50,147 in 1997, according to statistics released Tuesday by the state's Department of Public Health.

ICC approves Ameritech merger

CHICAGO — Illinois regulators today approved the \$72 billion merger of SBC Communications and Ameritech, creating the nation's largest local telephone company.

Illinois Commerce Commission Chairman Richard Mathias said the approval, which was approved on a 3-2 vote, will significantly enhance the competitive nature of the Illinois telecommunications marketplace and will be of true economic benefit to all Illinois consumers.

The ICC's approval comes with conditions attached and after more than a year of deliberations.

Consumer advocates and state officials had worked to block the merger, but they were overruled by the commission.

ICC Commissioner Ruth Kretschmer voiced concern that the merger would create "neeces" Illinois consumers.

"The evidence overwhelming shows that this merger will have an adverse effect on competition in Illinois," she said.

The Federal Communications Commission must sign off on the deal before it becomes final with the green light expected any day.

FCC staff has already recommended approval.

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Clinton makes ceremony of tax-cut veto

WASHINGTON — After weeks of partisan jockeying over taxes, President Clinton today vetoed the \$792 billion tax cut pushed by Republicans and approved by Congress to approve "tax relief we can afford" by year's end.

The president vetoed the bill at a wooden desk on a stage in the White House Rose Garden, before a small audience of Cabinet members, advocates for the elderly and others. It was the 26th veto of his presidency.

Clinton said he rejected the tax bill because it would "turn us back to the failed policies of the past" at a time when the nation is enjoying economic prosperity. He said he will seek to work with GOP leaders on an alternative tax plan "that reflects the priorities of both parties and the values of the American people."

"That would be a good bill I would happily sign," he said.

But on Capitol Hill, the battle lines were clearly drawn. Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said that by vetoing the bill, Clinton "has given himself a license to spend, and spend he will."

"President Clinton has once again put the needs of Washington above the needs of the American people, and that's too bad," Archer asserted. "Americans should know that the big blank check in Washington is drawn on their checkbook, and they will get stuck with the bill."

The tax bill would have used part of a projected 10-year budget surplus to reduce six federal income tax rates by 1 percentage point, cut capital-gains taxes, phase out estate taxes and the alternative minimum tax and ease the "marriage penalty" paid by many two-income couples. On nearly party-line votes, it passed in the House, 221-206, and in the Senate, 50-49, falling far short of the two-thirds majority needed to overturn a veto.

Clinton said such an ambitious tax cut reflected misplaced priorities — salvaging Social Security and Medicare should come first, he insisted. He also said it would absorb so much of the projected budget surpluses that federal programs from national parks to education could suffer deep, debilitating cuts. He has instead proposed cutting taxes

will create friction and heat.

"We're having a particularly dry year," Kukuck said. "Last year there were very few field fires because the ground was damp."

Central Illinois hasn't had a substantial rain for a month, triggering a flood of field work in the last week as farmers get much of their corn harvested.

"They're moving quick now because of the storms," that are in this week's forecast, Kukuck said. "As long as its dry, that's money in the bank."

While forecasters are calling for a stretch of rain that won't begin until tonight, firefighters were fearful more fires could break out in area fields today.

"When it's really dry, it doesn't take much for a field fire to go from small to large," Kukuck said.

One weekend blaze swept across 10 acres, including some standing corn, at 1:15 p.m. Sunday on Rodney Alberts farm ground at 1499 2100th St., two miles west of Lawndale.

Alberts said he believes a truck exhaust pipe touching some field stubble ignited his field.

"It was awful windy," he said. "Rural Atlanta and Rural Lincoln (firefighters) did a good job. I hope it never happens again."

Alberts, who wouldn't give an estimate of his loss, said he learned a lesson from the blaze.

"My advice for other farmers is if they don't have a disc on their tractor, get 'em out and book 'em up in case they need 'em," he said.

"A lot (of farmers) have a disc close by," Kukuck said. "Once they circle that thing (the field fire), it can't go anywhere. Probably a third or fourth of the fires we get, farmers are there with a plow. It cuts your job in half."

At 4:33 p.m. Saturday, Lincoln Rural firefighters helped the Atlanta department put out a vast field fire on the Hank Brandt farm at 1848 2250th St., just south of Atlanta.

"They just said it was quite large; I heard it burned up a combine," Kukuck said of that blaze, which he said took 1½ hours to extinguish, according to a Lincoln Rural report.

Neither Brandt nor Atlanta Fire Chief Ric Cheek could be reached for comment.
