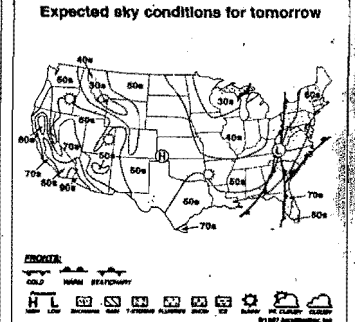

Death during police station scuffle ruled a suicide

CHICAGO — The death of a convicted murderer fatally shot during a scuffle at a South Side police station has been ruled a suicide, authorities say.

The Cook County Medical Examiner confirmed on Sunday that Reginald Cole, 38, of Chicago died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the mouth during a struggle with police on Saturday, said Chicago police Cmdr. Frank Trigg.

Initially, police didn't know whether Cole was killed by the self-inflicted gunshot or one of the shots fired by officers during the scuffle.

Cole was being interviewed by a detective about an old homi-

cide when he attacked the detective, Trigg said.

"He comes at the detective with a 7-inch spiked paper spindle," Trigg said, adding that Cole "snatched the gun from the holster" during a struggle with the detective.

Officers who responded to the detective's call for help found

Cole crouched against a cabinet with the weapon pointed towards the door, Trigg said. He said they fired a shot at Cole, which missed.

Then police heard the self-inflicted shot, Trigg said. An officer fired another shot, striking Cole in the left side.

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean futures retreated in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the release of estimates that paint positive pictures of this year's crops.

Corn prices inched lower, pressured by the report from Sparks Co. that pegged acreage at 9.508 billion bushels — higher than its previous estimate and slightly above the U.S. Department of Agriculture's latest numbers.

Wheat was little changed.

Soybean prices initially opened higher after Sparks forecast a U.S. crop of 2.681 billion bushels, lower than the October forecast by the USDA of 2.666 billion. But while the crop size is edging down, away from what had once been forecast to be a record, it remains large.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1/4 cent to \$2.55 a bushel; December corn fell 1/4 cent to \$1.98 1/4 a bushel; December oats fell 1/4 cent to \$1.12 1/4 a bushel; January soybeans fell 3 cents to \$4.79 1/4 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures both retreated in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle fell .25 cent to 68.42 cents a pound; January feeder cattle fell .45 cent to 82.27 cents a pound; December lean hogs fell .25 cent to 45.47 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies fell .08 cent to 63.17 cents a pound.

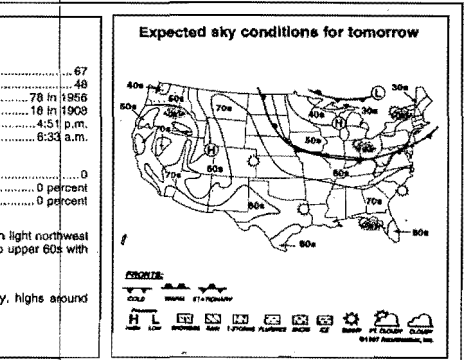

Stock prices post sharp rise

New government reports ease investor fears about inflation

NEW YORK — Stocks rose sharply today after the government's jobs report showed continued economic strength with mild inflationary pressures.

In midday trading on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 113.46 at 10,753.10. An early 193-point gain briefly put the Dow back within 500 points of the record close of 11,326.04 set on Aug. 26.

Broader stock indicators also gave back some of their opening gains, but remained sharply higher.

Poor's 500 index was up 15.50 at 1,378.14.

The early rally came after the Labor Department reported the nation's unemployment rate dipped to 4.1 percent in October, a new 29-year low, as 310,000 workers found jobs.

But despite the continued strength of the labor market, which can force companies to pay employees more and to raise prices, the average hourly wage grew by a tiny 0.1 percent to \$13.37 in October, less than many analysts forecast.

The data reinforced growing confidence that Federal Reserve officials may not need to boost the central bank's interest rates again when they meet in two weeks. The Fed has already

boosted rates twice this year in a bid to slow the economy and guard against inflation.

Bonds, which are less appealing in times of inflation, rallied after the report's release. As prices rose, the yield on the 30-year Treasury dropped as low as 6.02 percent, down from a two-year high of 6.37 percent just last week. The long-bond yield is a major influence on borrowing costs for businesses and consumers.

The improving interest rate outlook propelled the shares of financial services companies, which should enjoy strong demand for loans. American Express was up 3 1/16 at 150 and J.P. Morgan was up 5 at 138 1/2 to lead the Dow's advance.

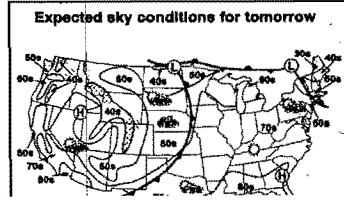

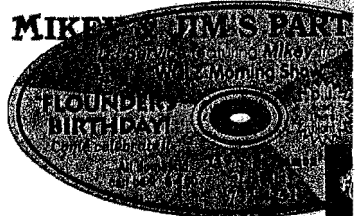

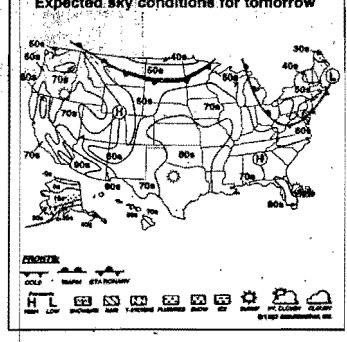

Bodies of three crash victims recovered from plane wreckage

CHICAGO — The bodies of two pilots and an Indiana businessman were recovered Friday after officials used a crane to pull the wreckage of a twin-engine aircraft from Lake Michigan.

The King Air 200 turboprop plane plunged into the water about 8:30 p.m. Thursday as it was attempting a takeoff from Meigs Field, a single-runway airport near downtown Chicago.

On board was passenger R. Roydon Ricks, an executive for the apparel-maker Hartmarx Corp. from Granger, Ind. Company officials also identified the pilots as Marc Derickson and John Powell, both of Michigan City, Ind.

Divers had searched the submerged plane late Thursday but found no survivors. On Friday morning, Chicago Fire Department officials brought in a crane on a private barge to pull up the wreckage in pieces.

Investigators for the National Transportation Safety Board said all the occupants were found strapped in their seats after the body of the plane was lifted from about 22 feet of water about 100 yards from the end of the runway.

David Bowling, an NTSB investigator, said witnesses told investigators that the plane used the entire length of the 3,900-foot runway before crashing into the lake. He said investigators also were trying to determine if tire marks on the end of the runway were made by the plane.

As they assemble the pieces of the plane, Bowling said investigators also will look at maintenance records, the pilots' training and flight history — and whether the plane's engines may have lost power.

Weather was the only factor that had been ruled out, he said.

The plane, which had originated its flight in Michigan City earlier in the day, was scheduled to land in South Bend, Ind.

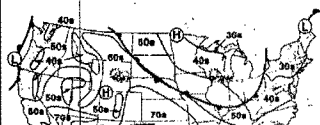

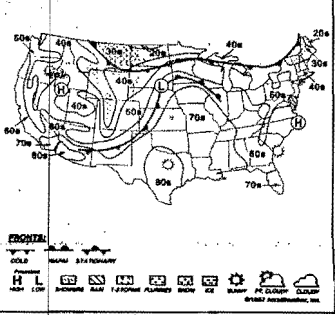

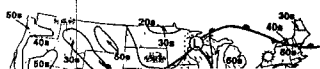

Lincoln police continue investigation into a hit-and-run accident that left a 19-year-old Lincoln girl injured at 3:15 p.m. Thursday at the corner of Eighth and College streets.

The girl was struck on her left side, she told police, and was taken to Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital by her mother. The girl was treated at the hospital and released.

The accident was reported to city police two hours after it occurred, according to the police report.

The girl reportedly was waiting to cross the intersection and was waved across by the driver of a minivan southbound on North College Street.

According to the police report, "At the time the girl was crossing, she said (the minivan driver) looked as if he was mad and, after she was hit, he drove off southbound, very fast."

The minivan driver is described in the report as a white male with dark hair, in his late 20s or 30s.

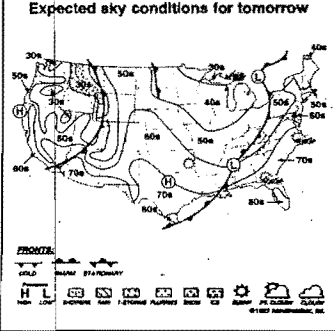

Wall Street serves up a rising surprise

NEW YORK — Stocks weren't supposed to go up this past week.

For one thing, the Federal Reserve raised interest rates, effectively undoing its three rate cuts of 1998. For another, oil prices rose to the highest levels since the Gulf War, sparking fears that inflation is on the way.

The bond market abhorred the news. But what happened to stocks?

"Equities bounded past Pluto and are now exiting the solar system," said Scott J. Brown, chief economist at Raymond James & Associates in St. Petersburg, Fla.

The stock market looked almost indestructible over the week. The Nasdaq composite index continued its stunning run to new records, the Standard & Poor's 500 set its first new record since July and the Dow Jones industrials closed above 11,000 for the first time since September.

The rally makes it tough to remember that just a month ago, the Dow was struggling to stay above 10,000.

Since the Dow bottomed out at 10,019.71 on Oct. 15, it has risen 9.8 percent. The Nasdaq has risen 23.3 percent since then.

Few analysts are surprised that stocks are heading higher. November, December and January

are typically the three best months of the year. Corporate profits are strong, and the Fed believes its latest move will keep inflation from cutting into those profits.

All the same, some analysts detect a bit of froth atop the market's latest wave.

"The way the market is behaving right now is not all that rational,"

said Sung Won Sohn, chief analyst at Wells Fargo. "The market is so used to good news that investors have developed a tendency to look through rose-colored glasses."

At least twice this past year, investors brushed off news that could have toppled a weaker market.

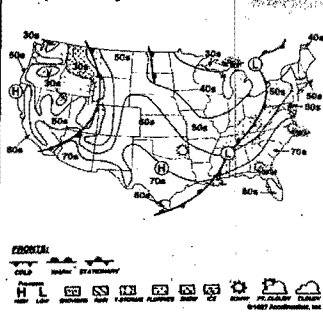

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Mental health workers finally ending strike

GODFREY — Union workers at a home for developmentally disabled adults are expected back at work this week more than four months after going on strike.

Members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees who work at the Beverly Farm Foundation approved a new contract in a vote Sunday. The agreement was reached by negotiators Friday night.

Beverly Farm executive director, Monte Welker says employees will most likely begin returning to work on Tuesday.

About 375 members of AFSCME Local 3784 walked off the job in July in a dispute over stalled contract negotiations. The U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ordered management to return to the bargaining table this month.

Welker said when a wage increase in July is included, employees will see a total in-

crease of 6.5 percent an hour across the board. Starting employees will now be paid \$6.45 an hour, he said.

During the strike, state Rep. Lou Lang, D-Skokie, claimed there were unsanitary conditions inside the south-western Illinois home, which houses about 400 people.

But the Illinois Department of Public Health said state inspectors who were at the home daily saw nothing to indicate residents were in danger.

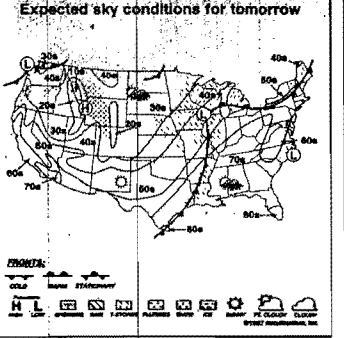

Decatur protestors arrested after rally

DECATUR — Five counter-demonstrators who showed up for a racist group's rally against the Rev. Jesse Jackson were arrested after a clash with police.

Four of the protesters, members of the Chicago-based group Anti-Racism Action, allegedly sprayed a park district ranger with pepper spray as they attempted to approach white supremacist Matt Hale and his followers, Decatur police Sgt. Rick Jones said. The officer was not seriously injured, he said.

A fifth member of the Chicago-based group was arrested after the rally for allegedly spray painting an anti-Hale message on a park pavilion, police said.

The first incident occurred Sunday at a local park about 30 minutes before a Hale-led rally was to begin, police Cmdr. Rich Ryan said. Hale and 10 members of his World Church of the Creator sought refuge in a park bathroom during the incident, police said.

The four anti-racism protesters were arrested on preliminary charges of resisting arrest, mob action and aggravated battery of a law enforcement officer.

About 50 people showed up to

armed with pepper spray separated about 20 protesters from the white supremacists and their supporters, while the groups traded taunts and insults.

Hale said he came to protest Jackson's involvement in a controversy over the expulsion of six Decatur high school students for fighting in the bleachers at a September football game.

Jackson led several days of marches and rallies in Decatur — even getting arrested last week — to call attention to what he said is unfair treatment of the students. The expelled students are black, but Jackson has said fairness, not race, is the central issue.

Hale said he has gotten calls of support from Decatur residents angry over Jackson's involvement.

The students originally were expelled for two years, with no chance to attend alternative school. Under pressure from Gov. George Ryan and Illinois' school superintendent, the school board reduced the expulsions to a year and allowed the students to attend alternative school.

Jackson wants the students reinstated in regular school in Jan.

Lawyers squabble with state over fee related to tobacco suit settlement

SPRINGFIELD— Attorneys who helped Illinois win \$9.1 billion in a nationwide tobacco settlement are now at loggerheads with the state over how much they should be paid.

The lawyers, who were awarded \$121 million in legal fees by a national arbitration panel in September, have slapped a lien against the state's windfall, contending that they are owed as much as \$910 million.

Illinois Attorney General Jim Ryan, whose contract with the attorneys had promised them 10 percent of any settlement, has retained former Illinois Attorney General Tyrone Fahner to fight the lien at no cost to the state.

"He is not willing to entertain any proposal beyond the \$121 million," Ryan spokesman Dan Curry said.

Seattle attorney Steve Berman, whose firm was the lead national counsel for Illinois in the tobacco case, would not say exactly how much the lawyers want in order to have their lien lifted. But he acknowledged they had sought \$400 million from the national arbitration panel.

"We had a contract with the state, and we want to make sure we don't waive any rights," Berman said.

Curry on Tuesday said the attorneys told the state of the lien several weeks ago but agreed in a letter received Monday to allow for

Illinois to collect the full \$9.1 billion of the settlement, which is being paid out in years.

Berman said while the lien suspended for the first year, would remain in place to future payments to the state \$910 million, the amount firms contend is contra their.

The arbitration panel set national settlement allowed award legal fees without re-contract between attorney; individual states; Berman's policy was unfair.

"We fronted all the costs, took all the risk," Berman said. "Nobody had a gun to (Ryan) head."

State finds demand is light for new way for businesses to file sales tax returns

SPRINGFIELD — The state is giving businesses a new way to file their sales-tax returns, but the early demand has been light.

The Illinois Revenue Department is experimenting with electronic filing for some businesses.

Owners simply call the department and punch in the relevant numbers on the telephone keypad.

Only 300 businesses of a possible 51,000 took part during the program's first month.

"That is a modest beginning, but we expect that it will grow," said Director Glen Bower. "It cuts down on the amount of paperwork they (businesses) have to do."

He says both the state and the taxpayer benefit from reducing paperwork.

Eventually, Bower hopes most taxes will be filed and paid electronically.

The program started with businesses that file simple sales-tax returns every month.

Next year it expands to include quarterly and annual filers.

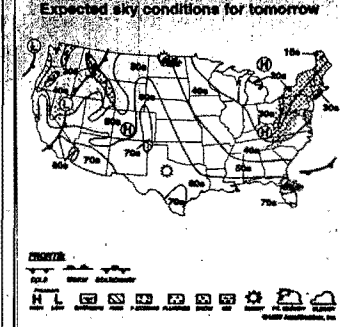

Consumer confidence rating soars

NEW YORK — Consumer confidence surged in November, rising for the first time in five months.

The Conference Board said today that its index of consumers' willingness to spend rose to 135.8 in November from a revised 130.5 in October.

The increase was greater than analysts had expected and left the index only about 4 points below its peak of 139 in June, which was the highest reading in more than 30 years.

Consumer sentiment is an important economic indicator, since consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of the nation's overall economic activity. The sharp rise in November bodes well for the nation's retailers at the start of the holiday shopping season.

"A booming economy and a strong job market have consumers in a confident, free-spending mode," said Lynn Franco, the Board's director of consumer research. "With increasing numbers of consumers expecting their incomes to rise, it's not surprising that \$4,000 leather bags and \$3,000 cashmere coats are selling briskly, along with \$15 Pokémon toys and \$25 computer mouses."

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
