




PEORIA - A Peoria woman has been sentenced to nine years in prison for feeding bleach and soap to her infant son, who suffered ulcers and internal burns.



Major ag program changes in works

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

WASHINGTON - The Climon administration will seek significant changes in federal farm programs to provide additional income assistance to producers. Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman said today.

Glickman declined to discuss the proposals, which will be part of the president's proposed 2001 budget. Last Friday, the administration commodity prices

"We have an obligation to bring some significant proposals to the table and we will." Glickman said at a news conference. He acknowledged the difficulty of getting broad support among agricultural interests for major changes in farm policy.

Glickman says the 1996 Freedom to Parin law, which scaled back on government crop subsidies, left farmers without sufficient sup-

lion in emergency and over the past two years to reimburse farmers for weather-related crop failures and to compensate for a collapse in grain prices that occurred in 1998.

Farm income is expected to drop; \$7.6 billion this year unless lawmakers approve another bailout.

Study: Circumcision offers no help, no har

CHICAGO — Circumcising newborns offers practically no medical benefit but causes virtually no harm, according to a new study that tries to quantify the risks.

Researchers found that infants who undergo the procedure have only a 1-in-476 chance of complications.

from circumcision, only six urinary tract infections are prevented. And for every two complications, only one case of penlle cancer is presented.

The study does not judge whether the routine procedure is appropriate, but simply provides more information for parents and physicians, said the lead researcher, Dr. Dimitri Christakis, a pediatrician at the University of Washington Child Health Institute.

serious complications can require such things as reconstruction of the penis, he said.

The study was published in the January issue of the journal Pediatrics.

The findings came from a review of 354,297 beys born in hospitals throughout Washington state from 1987 through 1996.

The study found that 37 percent were circumcised during their newborn bospital stay. That number

Olney will lose bicycle factory

OLNEY — Hopes that the local breycle plant could withstand the pressure of growing Asian imports were dashed when Brunswick Corpanounced it would close the plant within six months as part of a restructuring.

Brunswick said Thursday that it could no longer maintain its Olney plant and two Mexican facilities and keep up with the accelerating page of Asjan imports, which has contributed to a 35 percent plunge in retail bike prices since 1997. All of the company's bike-making busi-

Brunswick spokesman Mel Kent said. "They keep getting worse and worse and worse as we go forward."

The closure, which should be complete within six months, will cost 750 jobs in Mexico and 325 at the Olney plant, which makes the Roadmaster brand of bieyele. About 240 people will stay on in Olney to staff the company's warehouse and distribution center, spokeswoman Kathryn Chieger said.

The move follows by just four months the decision by the nation's ton bike brand, Huffy, to close its

It was not entirely unexpected in Olney, despite the company's yow to stay put during a 1997 rally staged months after it purchased Roadmaster in 1996.

"I'm not surprised because the competition in the bike industry is so tight," Mayor Kelly Henby said.

Henby said he is optimistic laidoff workers will find employment in or near Richland County.

Brunswick also said it will shed its wagons, sleds and bicycle parts and accessories businesses, including the venerable Flexible Flyer brand. The company has not yet

Trump ready to run

Tycoon courts boisterous Reform Party leaders

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PALM BEACH, Fla — Greeted by a boisterous crowd of Reform Party leaders under the elegant roof of his \$100,000-per-member club, tycoon Donald Trump said Friday that he would become a "very serious candidate" for the presidency if they would have him on their thirdparty ticket.

Roughly two-thirds of the)70 party members gathered in the Gold and White Ballroom of Trump's Mar-a-Lago club raised their hands when he asked who among them would support his White House bid.

"We've come really from being a very successful businessman to being a very serious candidate;" Trump told the crowd. who were left out of his event last week with the leader of an opposing faction, Minnesota Gov. Jesse Ven-

"I'm very proud to be in the party of Ross Perot and Jesse Ventura," Trump said.

The crowd, pumped up by wine and hors d'oeuvres, applauded and cheered.

Perot's right-hand man, former national chairman Russell Verney, said he welcomed Trump into the race.

"This is him reaching out to all parts of the Reform Party, and that's good," Verney said. He acknowledged it's in the party's interest to encourage a race between two marquee names — Trump's and conservative columnist Pat

But some in the crowd greeted Trump with skeptical questions rather than open arms, probing whether his interest in the race is an interest in the Reform Party, or in his own future.

One woman pressed him on whether he would attend the Florida Reform Party's convention next weekend in Tampa. Trump said he's "looking at that very seriously."

Another asked whether, if the party's presidential nomination went to someone else, he would still contribute money to the Reform Party to help build it. He hedged, saying he could not support it if it nominates Buchanan, for example.

"If I agreed with an opponent and the views of an opponent who got the nomination, I would absolutely support" the party, he said.



The era of cheap oil began end ing last March when the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries cut production by 4.4 million barrels a day. The oil producers were determined to end a world oil gliff and push up prices that fell as low as \$11.37 a barrel in Debruary

OPI-C an often undisciplined cartel, managed to hold down pro-duction this time. U.S. oil supplies are now at their lowest level in several years and the International Energy Agency warned Thursday markets "are tight and getting tighter

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



Study links heart ailments to baldness

CHICAGO Men who are losing the hair on the crowns of their heads have up to a 36 percent increased lisk for heart disease "events" including heart attacks and bypass surgery, a study found

Men with a receding hairline are not at increased risk, but those going bald at the crown should pay special attention to their blood pressine and cholesterol levels and lead a healthy lifestyle, researchers said

"It's similar to having a family story for a disease. You can't listory for a disease. You can't after your family history or your baldness, but there are many ways to modify your risk factors," said to modify your tisk factors," said Dr. JoAnn F. Manson, one of the study's authors and chief of pre-ventative medicine at Harvard's Brigham and Women's Hospital in

Manson's study, published in Monday's edition of the Archives of Internal Medicine, found that the greater the hair loss on the top of a man's head, the greater the risk

Balding men with high choles-terol levels had almost three times the risk for heart disease when compared with men with a full head of hair who also had high cho-

Out of the total pool sampled, about 1,500 men reported a coronary event. Balding mon accounted for 62 percent of that total.

Established risk factors for heart disease include hypertension, high blood pressure and cholesterof and a sedentary lifestyle.

Past studies have confirmed a link between hair loss and heart problems, but this study is among the largest. It also is one of the first to include detailed information about different patterns of baldness and to identify the risk pattern in men of all ages.

The study, co-authored by sever-al doctors in Boston, analyzed bald-ness patterns of 22,000/male doc-

Couple gets prison for bilking black churches

EAST ST. LOUIS A Datase couple accused of scanning pre-dominantly black churches out of hundreds of thousands of dollars after promising to help them finance new churches are headed to prison.

Solomon and Rosalind Scaile were sentenced Tuesday to nearly three years in prison in a construc-tion financing scheme.

Prosecutors said the couple preyed on churches in the South and Midwest that were having difficulty

raising money from banks and other financial institutions.

The Scaifes promised "turn-key projects contracts to finance, design, build and furnish church huildings, prosecutors said.

But not one of the projects was completed, and some of the money raised was diverted for the Scaifes' personal use, prosecutors said.

They said the Scaffes also promised congregations a mechanism by which members of the congregation could finance the project through the purchase of bonds secured by a



"If we're going to hold back and tie the hands of law enforcement, crashes and fatalities are just going to multiply over and over again," he

Dart and other Jawmakers have tried to pass versions of the bill three previous times, but the bills died before becoming law because many legislators weren't aware of the problem in their communities, he said. Since May 1999, law enforcement officials and anti-drunken driving organizations have held many contunnity meetings across the slate to raise awareness.






