Ford recalling Explorers, Mountaineers

WASHINGTON — Ford Motor
Co. is recalling 876,413 Explorers
and Mercury Mountaineers to
replace faulty parts on the suspension system. Thousands of the
Explorers, the world's best-selling
sport utility vehicle, already are
under recall in connection with the
Firestone tire problem.

The recall affects 1995 through 1997 models of the Explorer and the 1997 Mountaineer. which have sway bar links that can break off, especially in cold climates. The sway bar connects the left and right front wheel control arms and helps control the pitch of the vehicle in turns. turns

The recall covers 846,591 Explorers and 29,822 Mountaineers.

Ford will notify owners by mail

SPRINGFIELD — A vast majority of the commercial customers who were offered the first chance under the deregulation law to choose a new electric company are sticking with their current providers, a state report found.

Under the Illinois law allowing electric deregulation, one-third of commercial customers were phased into the program as of Oct. 1, 1999. The remaining commercial users will be included Jan, 1. Residential

Customers sticking with current electric providers

and its dealers will provide free replacement links that are wider. The recall ends an investigation by the government's auto safety agency.

agency.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration opened a preliminary investigation into the problem on Sept. 20 after an agency employee having handling problems discovered a broken link on his vehicle.

problems.

NHTSA investigators went to their parking garage at the Transportation Department and examined 28 Explorers. Seven of the SUVs, all either 1995 or 1996 models, had repaired or broken links, so the agency opened an investigation to assess the scope of the problem.

At the time, a Ford spokesman said the company did not believe it was a safety problem, but further testing showed it could affect handling and safety, Ford spokesman Mike Vaughn said Thursday.

"We went back and we decided that, yes, there is a small risk at the extreme limits," Vaughn said. "We felt the right thing to do is administer it as a safety recall."

NHTSA has collected 13 com-plaints from owners who said that stability was reduced during a lane change or turn, especially at speeds above 40 mph. Ford received 262 owner and field reports of the problem, including two reports of minor accidents that may be related, Vaughn said.

He said most of the reports came from New England and Canada.

NHTSA officials say the sway ir problem did not cause tread sep-

arations on Firestone tires that were used on the Explorer. Bridgestone/Firestone Inc. has recalled 6.5 million of its ATX. ATX II and Wilderness AT tires. which reportedly have been involved in accidents that have killed at least 119 people and injured more than 500.

Most of the accidents involved the Explorer

Some observers point out that the broken links had the potential to increase the severity of an accident during a tire tread-loss.

"Any situation where a driver is going to have to make an emer-gency maneuver after a tire failure, a broken sway bar is only going to make handling more difficult, "said Sean Kane, president of Strategic Safety, an Arlington, Va-based firm involved in litigation against Ford and Bridgestone/Firestone.

Greenspan's comments triggered a huge rally on Wall Street as investors took comfort that the cen-tral bank was growing concerned about the threats to the overall econ-Dow Jones industrials soaring more than 300 points, and the Nasdaq more than 200 after Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan indicated the central bank was rethinking its ingress rate policy. Stocks soared on the possibility that interest rates might begin to decline. omy from a sharp sell-off in stock prices.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which had been up about 180 points before Greenspan started speaking, shot higher and was up more than 300 points at midday.

Greenspan's concerns about the slowing economy followed remarks in recent days by George W. Bush and his running mate, Dick Cheney, that recent signs of economic weakness pointed up the need for the Republicans' \$1.3 trillion tax cut.

In his speech on economic dan-gers, Greenspan specifically men-tioned the sharp plunge in stock

prices and the possibility this could cause a cutback in consumer and business spending. He also said ris-ing tensions in the Middle East could cause oil prices to surge unex-pectedly. pectedly

He also added that "I'm not only concerned about the death penalty, but I'm concerned about the whole criminal code we have in Illinois. There (are) without question a lot of people sitting in prisons today that didn't commit the crimes they are there for. They're all part an avalanche of regulations, rule proposals and executive orders streaming from the White House and government agencies in the final weeks of the cies in the final we Clinton administration.

Experts on government policy say it's not unusual for a flurry of activity in the final weeks before a president leaves office. But rarely have the last-ditch regulatory efforts involved as many issues with poten-tially far-reaching consequences.

tally tar-reaching consequences.

Administration officials acknowledge that the 11th hour bitzard of rules reflects in part a determination by Clinton to fashion a legacy of major initiatives in areas of public health, the environment and worker rights.

and worker rights.

But business groups already are preparing for a counterattack, hoping that the incoming Bush administration as well as Congress and the courts will soften some of the new regulations and roll back others.

"What Clinton is trying to do is put the next administration into a regulatory straight jacket," complained Bill Kovacs, vice president for environment and regulatory affairs at the U.S. Chamber of

Commerce. "Once these regulations are in effect, it's very difficult to change them."

change them.

Six years ago Congress enacted a law that allows Congress to overturn any rule by majority vote within-60 days of the rule being issued.
But it has never been used on any of the thousands of regulations that have been issued.

The White House plays down the significance of the late regulations, saying every president wants to close out unfinished business as his administration winds down. Many rules were in the works for months, even years in some cases, officials say.

say.

"There's been ample time for the public to weigh in, for interest groups to weigh in, "White House press secretary Jake Siewert said.

Many of the regulations involve the environment including the one issued Thursday that requires pollution from heavy-duty trucks to be cut by 90 percent over the next decade and refiners to take virtually all of the sulfur out of diesel fuel.

Among the areas affected by the

Among the areas affected by the recent regulations and executive orders:

- privacy of health records.
- labeling standards for organi-cally grown foods.
- coal miners' ability to get benefits for black lung disease.
- pollution from cattle and pig feedlots.
- With energy prices high, GOP lawmakers have characterized the diesel rule and forest road ban as a threat to future energy supplies. Such claims are scoffed at by environmentalists.

EDWARDSVILLE—The fede EDWARDSVILLE—The feder-al government has released \$13.9 million to build an ethanol plant near the Southern Illinois near the Southern Illinois University campus here, officials

said.

The release of the money, which was expected, means that construction of the plant is tentatively set to begin next summer, said Brian Donnelly, executive director of SIEU's University Park. He said construction is expected to take 18 months to complete.

Donnelly, said the rest of the \$20.

months to complete.

Donnelly said the rest of the \$20 million needed to build the National Corn to Ethanol Research Plant will be covered with \$6 million in matching funds approved by the Illinois General Assembly.

That money, not yet released, nould be available soon, according

to Donnelly.

The federal money had been tied up in part while the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which will administer the grant, negotiated just how much it should receive to cover its administrative costs.

The agency had requested 3 percent, or \$420,000. But after haggling for months with Rep. John Shimkus, R-Ill., and other state law-


Shimkus, R-III., and other state law-makers, the agency agreed to take I percent, or about \$140,000, accord-ing to Steve Tomaszewski, a spokesman for Shimkus. The 20,000-square foot facility will manufacture the corn-based fuel additive and lease space to pri-vate companies to help finance the plant in the future.

SPRINGFIELD — A thermostat has been cranked to generate balmy air in the coconut-scented room, while children eat tropical salads of papaya and pineapple amid a sandbox, a fake palm tree and a paper

It's not quite the Caribbean after all the temperatures have been near-zero outside — but it's Ball Charter School's attempt to be a lit-tle different on the education map in

Illinois.

A recently released report from the Illinois Board of Education names the 2-year-old school as one of two charter schools statewide whose elementary students surpassed state averages on achievement tests.

Eighty percent of Ball Charter third-graders met or exceeded state goals on both the reading and math tests, compared to state averages of 20 percent and 69 percent, respectively. The school now has preschool through fifth grade but lacked a fifth grade last year.

Principal Harriet Arkley said a reason for Ball's success is that it is a magnet school open to children citywide.

citywide.

"The families, just in the making of the choice, are making a commitment that doesn't happen when they're assigned a school," she said.
Publicly funded but independenly managed, charter schools have fewer regulations than traditional public schools.

But because such schools became legal in Illinois only four years ago, it is too soon to draw conclusions about their test results, according to the state report.

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
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
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Lincoln man smoked for stolen cigarettes

Man pleads guilty to burglary; Sentenced to four years in prison for stolen cigarettes

A Lincoln man was sentenced to four years in prison or successful completion of prison boot camp after pleading guilty to burglary Tuesday to stealing three cartons of cigarettes from a gas station.

Michael W. Alley, 20, 904 21st St., broke into Bruns Service Center, 1510 Fifth St., in early July and stole three cartons of Marlboro Reds cigarettes.

Alley pleaded guilty to charges of burglary and criminal damage to property, both felonies, in Logan County Circuit Court Tuesday

As part of a plea agreement set

forth by state's attorney Tim Huyett, Alley was dismissed on a third charge of damage to property over \$300 for scratching two cars on a different day in a different location.

The court sentenced Alley to fou years in prison with a recor tion for the impact incarceration program, otherwise known as boot camp.

Alley is credited with 278 days already served and is ordered to pay \$368.87 in restitution within 6

Alley must also pay restitution for the cars he damaged, but a separate hearing Jan. 2 will determine how much he should pay.

If Alley successfully completes boot camp, his prison time may be reduced, the court report said, although he must serve a minimum of 120 days in camp.

Boot camp includes physical training and labor, military formations and drills, regimented activities, uniform dress and appearance, including a crew cut and no facial hair, military education and counseling.

According to Huyett, Alley broke window to force entry into Bruns a window to force entry into Bruns Service Center July 10. Fingerprints on the glass led to his arrest. Alley stole three cartons of cigarettes from inside the gas station.

Huyett dismissed a charge of criminal damage to property over

\$300 as part of the plea agreement. Alley allegedly scratched a Dodge Stratus and Ford pickup truck parked in a driveway in Lincoln July 5, the police report said.

The report said Alley scratched the cars on purpose, hoping to be arrested and reunited with his brother, who was already incarcerated.

Earlier in the day on July 5. Alley received a citation for drinking alcohol underage and tried to get arrested by claiming he battered his girlfriend, although witnesses told police he never touched her.

Testimony from friends and family said Alley has a drug problem, and they appealed to the court to send Alley to boot camp to aid his drug problem.

He posted bond and was released.

Illinois inmates train dogs for disabled

DWIGHT — Deborah Grenko gives the command and Skidd romps around an outdoor enclosure, climbing ladders, jumping through a hoop and balancing on a teeter-totter before trotting back to Grenko for a reward.

Grenko is more than a trainer of ur-legged companions for dis-pled people — she's also an mate at the Dwight Correctional

Advocates of the prison's new Helping Paws program, which pairs inmates with abandoned dogs and teaches them to train the dogs to assist the disabled, say it does as much good for the inmates as it does for the disabled and the animals involved.

"This program is made to the control of the disabled and the animals involved.

"This program is such a blessing

for us and for the dogs," said Grenko, who's been training dogs since May. "They were thrown away. We're in the same place. Now they have a chance to do good."

Inmates study and live with their charges, dogs rescued from pounds in the Chicago area. Most of the dogs have mixed pedigrees and many have survived in horrible con-

The students learn to train the ogs in basic and advanced service dogs on basic and advanced service dog commands and tasks and learn to care for them, including emergency medical care, before completing the 34-week course at Dwight.

Dwight.

At the end of the course, they earn a certificate from Lake Land College, showing they have completed the program and are skilled in animal care and training.

Prison warden Lynn Cahill-Masching said the program is exact-ly what the prison is looking for in

innovate programs for inmates.

"We're very program-oriented."
Cahill-Masching said. "I like the interface of resources of industry. Lake Land and the corrections system. We're trying to program inmates for successful reintegration into society." into society

To be admitted to the program, inmates must be referred as trust-worthy, minimum-escape risks, and they must have 16 years or fewer to serve. Prison officials said the program has been an overwhelming "There's zero student turnover

said Michael Cremeens, dean Lake Land's correctional program

Lake Land s correctional programs.

Lake Land has programs in seven state prisons, the largest correctional teaching program in Illinois and one of the largest in the country, said Lake Land president Robert Luther

Sandra Farnik, who founded the Clarence Foundation, a not-for-

profit organization dedicated to helping dogs and people, proposed bringing Lake Land's program to Dwight. State Rep. Jim Meyer, R-Bolingbrook, contacted corrections department officials and they liked the idea. Inmates who participate in the program said training the dogs can be inspiring.

Inmate Elizabeth Tolbert fin-ished training Leo, a rangy, affec-tionate white dog with a scarred face, just in time to qualify him for a special Christmas present.

"He was bait for pit bulls, left for dead," Tolbert said. "For Christmas, he got a family. Now he'll have a purpose and be loved."

Mary Durrette, who is training ner second service dog, said many numates feel as if they've hit bot-

Ice chunk nearly crushes

WAPPAPELLO, Mo. — Andy Burnett figured he was six inches from being crushed to death by a 500-pound churk of ice that blew off the top of a passing van.

Authorities say the accident serves as a reminder during this frigid stretch of weather in Missouri for motorists to clear ice and snow off their entire vehicles, not just from the windows.

The accident happened Dec. 19 on a two-lane road near this south-east Missouri town. Burnett was drying to work when a van coming from the other direction passed by.

Suddenly, a massive chunk of ice flew from the roof of the van and struck Burnett's 1999 Ford Contour above the windshield.

Police estimated the ice weighed 500 pounds. It caved in the front of the roof of Burnett's car as well as the windshield.

into the back seat of the car.

The front edge of the roof ended up about six inches from Burnett's head. He suffered a bump on the head and other minor injuries, but managed to keep control of the car and pull into a parking lot.

The driver of the van stopped briefly, then drove off without checking on Burnett's condition. Police are still looking for the driver.

Sgt. Brent Davis of the Missour State Highway Patrol said, "In all my 26 years on the force, I'd never beard of something like this."

"I saw the piece of ice start to come up off the van and head my way," said Burnett, "I had about an split-second reaction time and thought, 'this is going to hurt.""

The impact from the ice knocked the rear-view mirror and sun-visor into the back seat of the car.







Census sets stage for redistricting fight

Illinois will lose one of its 20 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives in 2003, based on data from this year's census released Thursday.

The loss, which had been predicted, sets off a battle among the state's lawmakers over the redrawing of congressional boundaries.

ing or congressional boundaries.
House Speaker Dennis Hastert,
R-Yorkville, and Rep. William
Lipinski, D-Chicago, already have
had several meetings, trying to figure out how to best protect their parties' incumbents. The state's delegation is now evenly divided.

Members of both parties are closely watching Rep. Rod Blagojevich, D-Chicago, who is considering a run for governor.

If he chooses to leave the House,

his district's population could be divided up among the others in an attempt to avoid the painful specta-cle of two incumbents facing off.

But Blagojevich Thursday made

no promises.

"In the coming months, I will make a decision regarding where I can best serve in the future, but regardless of that decision, I believe the 5th Congressional District should be included in any redistricting plan." Blagojevich said in a statement issped by his office.

In March: the Census Bureau plans to release more detailed country and local numbers that will enable the map-drawing to begin in earnest.

"Many people focus on the parti-san nature of the process, but in the end many of the decisions are dic-tated by the fraw numbers," said Hastert aide John McGovern.

While it's up to state legislators

to draw up new congressional maps, an agreement by Hastert and Lipinski is expected to be looked at favorably by the General Assembly, which will be busy redrawing state

legislative districts. Hastert works closely with Republican Gov. Ryan and Republicans also control the Illinois Senate. Democrats control the state House.

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
